Meet Leslie Botchway, MPT



Leslie Botchway is a physical therapist that works at the West Kearney Mercy clinic. He recently sat down with us to tell us about his journey. Leslie was born in London, England to parents from Ghana, West Africa. He graduated high school in Nigeria, he attended college in London for two years and later got his masters in physical therapy from the University of Nebraska in Omaha. Prior to becoming interested in physical therapy, he was studying aeronautics in Tulsa when he met his wife who is from Nebraska. They have two children, a 24 year old son and a 22 year old daughter.

Leslie's work with developmentally disabled adults in Tulsa spurred him to become a physical therapist. When he finished his degree in 1999, he and his family moved to the Springfield area.

Leslie has worked in the hospital, managed a private clinic and worked in Mt. Vernon and Ash Grove. Leslie believes race still plays a role in his interactions with white America. He says, "It is especially hard when your kids go through tough times because of their mixed race." On handling racism he states his faith sustains him and gives him courage. His pastor tells him, "racism is a sin problem, not a skin problem".

Leslie experiences a covert type of racism here in the Ozarks. He can always feel the tension in the room when he walks in for the first time. Sometimes he wonders if it is his name or his race that throws people off because they may be expecting to work with a female and end up with a black man. Leslie feels like he has to prove himself and earn the trust of his patients due to his color but says, "I like the challenge of representing the black race in a field that has relatively few professionals of color." Being a physical therapist and sensing the subtle tension of racism can be challenging. Rather than a 10-15 minute office visit, physical therapists walk with their patients for weeks if not months of the recovery process. He does get close to many of these patients and earns their trust as they come to see him as a competent and caring professional.

Leslie's advice for our readers:

- 1. Refuse to see yourself as a victim.
- 2. Make your presence known by being your best.
- 3. Have a voice in the community and make it count.
