Music

Music has long been a feature of Toft life, and for such a small village, Toft simply bursts with musical talent. Muriel Peach, Toft's oldest native resident (b. 17 October 1915), recalls a time some 90 years ago when men would sing in the tap room of the *Red Lion* pub (now the *Tai Yuen restaurant*), where her parents were the publicans. Much later, in the 1970s, anyone passing through Toft and dropping into the *Red Lion* might have stumbled upon one of the informal music sessions where Toft denizens such as Archie Badcock could be heard in full swing. Occasional informal sing-song sessions continued at the pub until it became a restaurant.


Music has always marked the village's celebrations, such as the 777 anniversary year of Saint Andrew's Church, the 2000 Millennium celebrations, Christmas carols both indoors and out on the village green and around the village streets, the annual Maypole dance, harvest suppers and the Queen's Silver and Golden Jubilees, where young and older residents have performed, either in the choir, or else singing, playing a variety of instruments and dancing. Pantomimes, Reviews, the Beer Festival and dedicated musical evenings run by Toft Social Club in the People's Hall have been another opportunity for Toft to show off its extraordinary musical talents. More recently, the Spring Festival brought together local performers in the 2011 'Local Folk' Concert. Saint Andrew's church has been host to the excellent Toft Choir, which rehearses regularly in the Methodist chapel, as well as the recently established Toft Gallery Band, which plays and sings church music in ancient styles. Until its demise in 2011, the Toft Barbershop Quartet also provided entertainment on many occasions at different village venues, including its farewell concert at the Methodist chapel in February 2011. Over the years, music was also provided on keyboard at Toft events by Pauline Jacklin. At present, Toft boasts several folk and pop/rock bands that perform at village events, including Kat and the Old Dogs, Fire in the Cellar and The Toft Session. Toft even has its own set of jigs and a traditional Spring Carol, composed by members of the Toft Session and played at village events.

Toft is not just the home of amateur musicians. The Finkel Brothers, Humf and Harry, of School Lane, have taken their jazz guitar playing to a high professional standard (watch them on You Tube playing at 11 Mill Lane: http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jcULQwFpyXE&feature=fvst). Val Sinclair of Eversden Close sings jazz professionally at venues across East Anglia. Vicky Unsworth of Mill Lane, a singer who excels in modern songs and songs from the musicals, is also heading for a professional career in music. Meanwhile, all of these professional performers frequently share their wonderful talents with the people of Toft and perform at Social Club events.


And all the while, informal 'house sessions' take place around the village where musicians gather just for the fun of making music.






