Feast of the Assumption of the Holy Mother of God

In the Orthodox tradition, icons often are referred to as windows to heaven. This is because, through their visual depictions, icons help us understand complex matters of our faith, which are hard to comprehend and grasp. Today, we celebrate the Assumption of the Holy Mother of God into heaven. The icons and miniature paintings portraying the Assumption of St. Mary are extremely rich in elegant and ancient symbolism, guiding our minds and teaching us about the spiritual significance of the feast. This is especially important since the Assumption is not mentioned anywhere in the Bible, and we must rely on the church tradition and religious art to help us learn about this very important and sacred event.

The Assumption icons offer a great message of hope and have been used to explain the Christian view of death to children as well as adults. They portray Mary in a coffin surrounded by the apostles and sometimes three early church bishops. Above the Theotokos, we always find Jesus, holding in his hands the soul of his mother, pictured as a baby in swaddling white clothes. This symbolizes St. Mary's birth through death into new and eternal life with God. It is important to note the reversal of the roles. While typically it is Mary portrayed holding baby Jesus, in Assumption icons, this changes, and it is Jesus holding baby Mary.

Death is the ultimate enemy of life. It is irrational, ugly, violent and destructive. And no matter how informed we are and how much we believe, death is also always very painful. If you lost a loved one, if you struggle with grief, how comforting it is to reflect on the hope that the Assumption icons offer. How consoling it is to learn that our loved one is in the loving embrace of Jesus, who cares for them and carries their soul in his hands to a place of safety and peace. Ultimately, these icons are a reminder that the feast of Assumption is not merely a story about what happened to St. Mary but also an invitation to believe and desire God, so we too, one day, will be greeted and embraced by Christ and find rest and refuge in his loving arms.

As we celebrate the feast of the Assumption of St. Mary, the Armenian Church through the framework of its life-giving liturgy offers a wonderful alternative approach. Many other churches and denominations around us celebrate the feast with beautiful liturgies, festive processions, hymns and prayers. But there is something extraordinary and peculiar happening in the Armenian Churches. We bring grapes to church, place them on the altar, bless them with prayers of healing, distribute and consume them as a medicine for our souls and bodies. Why grapes? What is the spirituality behind this ancient ritual? And what does it teach and remind us about? (Continued on the back page)



Vartavar History and Celebration

Known as Vartavar, this festival is a beautiful blend of history, tradition, and pure, unadulterated fun. Participants of all ages drench each other with water, creating an atmosphere of laughter, playfulness, and unity.

Vartavar's origins are steeped in Armenia's pre-Christian history. The festival was initially dedicated to Astghik, the ancient Armenian goddess of water, beauty, love, and fertility. According to legend, Astghik would sprinkle roses and water to spread love and fertility across the land. The name "Vartavar" itself is derived from ("vart" means "rose" in Armenian and var means "to burn/be burning", this is why it was celebrated in the harvest time). After the Christianization of Armenia, the Armenian Apostolic Church identified the rose with the transfiguration of Jesus and Vartavar continued to be celebrated along with the Feast of the Transfiguration. Some claim it comes from a tradition dating back to Noah, in which he commanded that his descendants should sprinkle water on each other and let doves fly as a symbol of remembrance of the Flood.

When Armenia adopted Christianity in 301 AD, the festival was integrated into the Christian calendar. Today, it is celebrated 14 weeks after Easter, coinciding with the Feast of the Transfiguration of Jesus Christ. This melding of pagan and Christian traditions has helped Vartavar endure through the centuries, maintaining its significance and charm.

On the day of Vartavar, Armenians take to the streets armed with buckets, water guns, and any container that can hold water. The goal is simple: get as many people wet as possible. The streets become a playground, where no one is exempt from a good-natured soaking. From young children to elderly adults, everyone participates in the festivities, embracing the chance to cool off in the summer heat and enjoy each other's company.

Water fights break out in towns and villages across the country, and even tourists are welcomed into the fun. It is a common sight to see strangers laughing together, all differences washed away by the unifying power of water. For many, it is a day to forget worries and simply live in the moment.

While the playful aspect of Vartavar is evident, the festival also carries deeper symbolic meanings. Water, essential for life, represents purity, renewal, and the sustenance of nature. By drenching each other in water, participants symbolically cleanse themselves, seeking renewal and the blessings of nature and the divine.

In modern times, Vartavar has also become a symbol of cultural pride and continuity. It is a reminder of Armenia's rich history and the resilience of its traditions. As the world rapidly changes, festivals like Vartavar provide a sense of identity and continuity, connecting generations and fostering a sense of community. The Armenian Report

Traditionally, every family and person would bring grapes from their gardens to the church. They would pick the very best their harvest had to offer. Grapes from the rich and poor, peasants and princes, men and women would all be placed together on the altar for a blessing. The differences and divisions of the community melt away and a powerful symbol of unity and sacred community emerges. Now the very essence of the grapes is transformed, now through the holy sacrament of our spiritual unity in love and faith in Christ the grapes are transformed into communion that has the attributes to heal and restore our bodies, minds and souls.

This ancient Armenian ritual is a reminder about two important things. First, it reminds us that when we bring forth the best we can offer to the world, our families, spouses, friends, work, education, community and parish and do so with love and not merely because of duty, pity or guilt a powerful transformation takes place. Our gift of time, our offering of love is transformed into a remedy that heals, forges a new spiritual reality and a dimension which allows God to enter our world, enter our families, our lives and parishes, renew and rejuvenate them with his blessing and presence.

This wonderful service is a reminder that we are not alone, that God works and touches our lives through our spiritual family our parish. It is a reminder that we are really the grapes, that when we bring our prayers and love, our wounds and struggles and put them all together we are transformed into a living communion, the very body of Christ. It is a reminder that, in the same way that each individual grape is connected to the stem, we too are connected to each other. We feed from the source of empowerment that is our heritage, our faith. In the sacred garden of our community, we grow together, suffer and struggle together, lift and hold each other up, withstand winds and storms together, fight heat and drought together. Always and in all things, supporting, helping, forgiving and loving each other.
