SAUL OF TARUS - PAUL FOR CHRIST

ARTICLE I

"Saul, Saul, Why persecutest thou me?" And he said, "Who art thou Lord?" And the Lord said. "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest: it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." And he trembling and astonished said, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" And the Lord said unto him, "Arise and go.

But rise, and stand upon thy feet: for I have appeared unto thee for this purpose, to make thee a minister and a witness both of these things which thou hast seen and of those things in the which I will appear unto thee."

We have talked about the call of Abraham, of Moses, and of Gideon. Elisha was called to bear the mantle of Elijah and be endued with a double portion of his spirit but none have transformed men and influenced nations as much as when the Lord called "Saul, Saul," and he answered "Who art thou Lord."

Saul was born in the City of Tarsus, probably in the year of 5 A. D. The city was one of the world's greatest centers of commerce, industry and learning.

It was here that Saul was brought up in a Jewish colony and reared a devout Pharasee. Even though a Jew by birth, yet a Roman citizen, which in later years was to prove of great value in his ministry.

Saul's brilliant mind was a sign of leadership which caused him to be marked as a rabbi while young. As a teenage youth he was sent to the University at Jerusalem to study at the feet of Gamaliel. It was while here at the school of Judaism that he heard of Jesus and His ministry in the hills of Galilee.

Saul was filled with such zeal and determination that he felt all heritics against Judaism should be punished or put to death. He was so convinced that the Mosaic Law was right he endeavored to keep it to its fullness. Heroically and at times even desperately he tried to carry its tenants to perfection.

While exceeding mad" at the sect of the Nazarenes he gave his approval for the stoning of Stephen. It was this persuasion that was to be his until his blinding experience

on the road to Damascus. He was journeying to Damascus with papers of authority to bind and bring to Jerusalem those followers of Jesus.

These acts of violence and hurt, meted out by Saul, were to be his to receive in the labors that now lay ahead.

Standing as a parallel to Moses, Saul was in his early years trained and disciplined for his ordained work. He was learned in the Old Testament Scriptures and gives over 200 references in his writings. Tarsus was a city of Greek culture ranking with Athens and Alexandrea where he acquired himself with the Greek gentiles. His home was the cross roads of commerce from many parts of the Roman World.

Saul, a Jew, yet born a Roman c tizen could travel without restrictions to all the then known civilized world. He was a cosmopolitan that could speak at least three languages of his day. Hebrew his mother tongue and language of the Scriptures, Aramic, the language Christ used, and Greek the common language was his for the using. Also in order to support himself he had followed the crafts and became a worker of Canvas that gave him Financial independence.

As Moses was learned in all the ways of the Egyptians for leadership: thus Paul was fitted to be "All things to all men." A Jew to the Jews, a Roman to Romans and a man of the crafts to men of labor. He was at ease in the presence of a slave or a king and with his store house of knowledge could deal with any philosophy of his day.

Saul of Tarsus was a man of such vehemence and power that he was head in whatsoever circle he moved, whether as Saul the persecuting Pharisee, or Paul the laboring missionary. If he was chief of sinners, he became chief of saints. If he was the man of action whirling over the Roman Empire, he was doing it with constructive statesmanship with no less a purpose than to bring the Roman Empire to the feet of Christ.

Saul's life was filled with intense patriotism. Few things gave him keener anguish of heart then the refusal of his Jewish brethren, his kinsmen according to the flesh, to take Jesus as the Messiah of Promise. He did on one occasion boast that he had Abraham to his father and of the tribe of Benjamin.

Saul's father was indeed a Hellenist and lived in one of the great Greek cities of the world, but he was loyal to the traditions of Palestine and was at heart a real Jew, though actually one of the dispersion. One other detail is certainly known about his father. He was a Roman citizen. The time came when Saul would take great pleasure in saying: "But I am a Roman born."

We do not know how long the family had been in Tarsus. At any rate Saul's father was a man of position in the Jewish Community and was able to send his son later to Jerusalem to school. He may have been a man of some wealth. The fact that he was a tent-maker and taught his trade to his son does not prove anything, since Jew's generally knew a trade and taught it to their sons. This custom stood Paul in good stead later. There is every reason to think that Saul was proud of his father.



Knowledge." Pro. 1: 7. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." James 1:5. So when we come to a place of worship there is a right way to let your feelings and wishes be known to Him. To cut our flesh, to yell with out reason, and to exalt the flesh is all in vain, even as the heathen do. . On the other hand do not let a formal attitude k'll real worship.

Especially this is true in seeking definite answers and experiences from God. Salvation, sanctification and the Bapt. of the Holy Spirit come in perfect worship. Also healing and direct leadings and other direct needs. God knows you, and you must come to Him as He alone knows you can. Be intelligent in your worship and God will reward you greatly.

Third, is Responsibility

Possessions bring responsibility. Where much is given, much will be required. Luke 12:48-"For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required: and to whom men have committed much, of him they will ask the more.' Remember back when you became responsible for a few odd jobs, then to where you were going, and for a returning hour, and with whom you were going. Later on perhaps you became the owner of a car and were that much more responsible, not only to parents, but to the law. Your manner of worship became deeper and included your sions as well as you. The knowledge of higher education had to be put to use to God's Glory . . Out of self and into Him in full worship became a must. Here you met the tithing test, of giving of your substance unto the Lord. . In giving you found a great blessing and became a blessing in a new sense.

Fourth, Confidence is Exercised

This involves trust. Meekly taking the road of faith and hope and obedince. . . "Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth." Matt. 5:5. Surely you must Trust in the Lord, delight yourself in Him, and commit your every step to His care. Read Psa. 37: 3-5. You have confidence-vou know that your prayers are going to be answered, you know that your work for the Lord is going to be rewarded. Foolish to you are any who would suggest that God is not real or that He does not hear your prayers or see your walk before Him.

Fifth, Our Worship Must Be Powerful

"I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth—." Rom. 1:16. Let us worship Him in Spirit and in truth-Our worship must touch the very core of our being. Matt. 22:37. "Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love (Worship) the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind." Powerful prayers, Holy Ghost directed prayers, will bring powerful re-

Sixth, Worship Must Be Continual

Matt. 24:13 reads, "But he that shall endure unto the end, and the same shall be saved." "No man, having put his hand to the plow. and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God." Luke 9:62. "Now the just shall live by faith: but if any man draw back, my soul shall have no pleasure in him." Heb. 10:38. There is no other way only to worship the Lord every day. ARTICLE IV

The next major change that one may expect in the fourth kingdom will be the revival of the empire into ten federated nations answering to the ten toes of the image of Nebuchadnezzar's dream and the ten horns of the fourth beast. Daniel 2:40-44; Daniel 7:7, 17, 24. The ten federated nations of the revived empire will have the Beast or Anti-Christ as its supreme ruler. Revelation 17:12, 13

The ten nations in the revived empire will embrace all of the territories that were once in the Eastern and Western Roman Empires. It is quite probable that nine of the ten nations are in existence today. - 1. In the latter years. v. 8. In the latter days. v. 16.
- 2. At a time when many Israelites shall have returned to palestine. vs. 8, 11, 12, 16.
- 3. Before the great tribulation.

We arrive at this conclusion for the following reasons:

- A. This invasion takes place when the Israelites are dwelling safely and are at rest. vs. 8, 11, 14. This could not be said of a nation which has gone through three and one half years of the great tribulation.
- B. The reason for this invasion is to plunder, to gain wealth. There will be an altogether different reason from this for the armies of the world to gather to Jerusalem just prior to the battle of Armageddon. Then it will be for the purpose of destroying Jerusalem and the Jewish Nation. Zechariah 12:1-9; 14:1-3.
- C. In this invasion no mention is made of any armies except those of Russia and her allies. At the battle of Armageddon there will be armies from every nation of the world. Revelation 16:12-16; Revelation 19:19.
- D. The Anti-Christ will eventually rule the entire world. Anti-Christ kingdom shall devour the whole earth, and shall tread it down and break it in pieces. Daniel 7: 7, 8, 23, 24; Revelation 13:7.

Before the Anti-Christ can have power over all nations Russian power will have to be destroyed. it will be destroyed by the Lord Himself during this invasion. Ezekial 38:18-23; 39:14.

E. The battle of Armageddon will be fought by the Lord Himself at the time of His return. Revelation 19:11-16; Zechariah 14:1-4; Isaiah 63:1-6. This battle will be fought by the Lord causing sending pestilence, cloudbursts, tremendous cosmic disturbances, hail storms, earthquakes, and electrical storms of lethal severity. The soldiers of the invading armies will fight and kill one


