Together, Touchet teachers have three hundred thirty-eight years of teaching (not counting any new staff that have been hired this summer). Merri Bussell is the most senior teacher, with thirty-seven years of experience. Five of them graduated from Touchet High School (Barb Brown, Debbie Ortiz, Donnetta Elsasser, Missy McKeown, Sonny Elsasser). Six of them have taught their entire careers at Touchet (Cathy Plucker, Teri Lesmeister, Jackie Helm, Donnetta Elsasser, Guy Gregg, and Sonny Elsasser). Two of them taught here, relocated, and then returned to Touchet (Nancy Morgan-Bloch and Keylee Gaffrey). There are two sets of husbands and wives who both teach at Touchet (Donnetta and Sonny Elsasser, Debbie and Jorge Ortiz). Eleven of their children have graduated from Touchet High School, and fourteen of their children are presently attending Touchet Schools. They graduated from a range of colleges and universities including Washington State University, Eastern Washington State College, Eastern Washington University, University of Idaho, Whitman College, Whitworth University, and Western Washington State College. Over half of them have earned Masters of Education degrees.

CONTINUING EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS



The first continuing Education Scholarship is in memory of Eileen Collier, who graduated from Touchet High School in 1919. She left a contribution to the Touchet Educational Foundation in her will when she passed away at the age of 102. This year, we awarded **two** Eileen Collier scholarships, for \$1000 each. The first one is awarded to *Miguel Preciado*. Miguel graduated from Touchet High School in 2008, and will be a senior this fall at Gonzaga University in Spokane, majoring in business with a concentration in Law & Public Policy, and a minor in criminal justice. He expects to graduate spring 2012.

The second Eileen Collier Scholarship is awarded to **Shiloh Akari** who graduated from Touchet School in 2008. Shiloh is a senior at Washington State University Tri Cities majoring in elementary education with a minor in bilingual education. She also plans to graduate in May of next year. Shiloh wrote in her application, "I want to make a positive difference in the class-room and teach children something new every day, just as they teach me in return."

The Making a Difference Scholarship in memory of Katie Nolan is for \$1000, and has been started by her family to encourage others to follow Katie's example of service to others, offering hope and inspiration. Katie Nolan was born and raised in Touchet, and graduated from Touchet High School in 1998. She graduated from Philadelphia Biblical University in 2002. She was working on a Master's degree in social work at Portland State University when she died in a climbing accident on Mt Hood in December 2009. Teachers work as advisors to classes, clubs, and activities. They coach sports. They serve on various educational and school-related committees. They attend seminars and workshops. They train on new curriculum. They continue to learn and complete coursework. And, of course, they teach!

The teaching staff of Touchet Schools has undergone some changes over the past few years – five of our most experienced teachers have retired. Five doesn't sound like much, but it is 25% of our staff, and together they had more than 150 years of teaching experience! How a small rural school district fills this loss is truly a challenge, especially when one considers all the requirements of certification.

When the most senior of us graduated from college, we were awarded K-12 certificates, which meant we were certified to teach any subject, grades K-12. We selected regular majors and minors (elementary education, for instance, didn't exist). After graduation, we were required to pick up an additional forty-five credits, which certified us for the remainder of our careers. Three of us (Merri Bussell, Gary Dorman, Cathy Plucker) still have that K-12 certificate. This certificate was very helpful to small schools, because teachers could be assigned to any and all positions. For instance, Mrs. Towery's first assignment at Touchet was teaching German - she gradually took on the English courses. Mrs. Gary was hired to teach reading remediation - she eventually found herself the head of the math department.

Over time, the teacher certification program changed. For awhile, graduating teachers were required to complete a Masters of Education program; however, that requirement was later dropped. The K-12 certificate no longer exists - graduating teachers today get a narrow band of certification (such as grades K-8, 6-8, 9-12), with notation of specific subjects they are certified to teach. This certificate requires that teachers return to college to pick up an additional fifteen credits every five years to keep certificates valid.

In addition, those teachers with vocational certification have to continue to earn credits in order to keep their vocational certification current as well. An additional certification program that is available is the National Board Certification. After a minimum of one year of study, teachers complete portfolios and undergo rigorous testing. Five of our teachers have attempted this program. Debbie Ortiz, Veronica Ogden, and Gary Dorman have been awarded National Board Certification.
