It's a New Year! A New Year marks a fresh start, a clean slate. And this is appealing to many of us because, let's face it: life can be hard. We can all think of struggles and challenges and heartaches we experienced over the past year, and we hope for a better year to come. We can easily call to mind those things left undone - those plans and projects we never quite got around to. The past has had its share of pain and disappointments, and we can long for something more, something better.

And if things have been going relatively well for us, we want to keep the ball rolling. We all may have hopes and dreams for the days to come.

This such a widespread feeling that nearly all cultures have traditions surrounding the New Year that symbolize hopes and dreams for the year to come. At our house, we ate black eyed peas on New Year's Day, as we always do. They are a southern tradition that relates to good fortune in the coming year. Cabbage, sauerkraut, and greens of various sorts can symbolize money and prosperity. There is a Spanish tradition of eating 12 grapes at midnight as the New Year begins, one grape at each strike of the clock, symbolizing luck in the coming 12 months. (In some traditions you are supposed to be sitting under a table when you do this – and if you are going to the trouble, you might as well go ahead and get under the table.) In some Asian cultures, noodles are eaten on New Year's Day, with the long noodles symbolizing longevity and long life.



Along with these fun traditions can come resolutions — ways we are intending to make personal changes in the year ahead. Perhaps you have made a resolution.

Taking a look at how things are and how we would like things to be is a good exercise – not only as individuals but as a church. As we look back at the past year, we have much for which to be thankful.

God has truly blessed us in so many ways. At the same time, we live in a changing world, and taking stock of where we are and how best to serve in this time and place is worth some time and prayer.

We will be making plans for a church planning event where we will take time to think about where we are as a church and where God is leading us; be watching for details. I'm all for black eyed peas, cabbage, and grapes — we could use health and prosperity and some luck. But a little prayer, discernment and conversation together can't hurt as we try to follow Jesus together. I'm looking forward to the year ahead!

Local Mission Funds Distributed

As a church we budget funds each year to assist local mission efforts and help those in need in our own community. In December we sent \$600 each to four different organizations that address different areas of need.

<u>ACCESS</u> provides help for women and children who are survivors of domestic violence, including safe housing. We have long supported ACCESS and have served as a drop-off site for household item donations.

MICA (Mid-Iowa Community Action) serves children and families with a variety of health, nutrition, and housing services including a food shelf and dental clinic in Ames.

<u>NAMI-Central Iowa</u> is the local chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness. NAMI provides support, education, and advocacy for those whose lives are affected by mental illness, including a drop-in wellness center.

<u>The Bridge Home</u> provides shelter, support, and a way forward to individuals and families experiencing or on the verge of homelessness.

December Special Offerings

Our church received two special offerings in the month of December. We received a total of \$1135 for the **Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering**, which provides a thank you check to retired ministers and missionaries and their widowed spouses as well as emergency assistance for retired clergy. We received a total of \$1250 for our **Christmas Offering**. Half of this amount will go to the Bridge Home and half will go to our church's benevolence fund, which provides help for persons who come to our church in need of assistance. Thank you for your generous gifts!

Our love and prayers are with Malcolm, Lynette, and all the family of Pat Johnson, who died on November 30. Pat was enrolled in the cradle roll of First Baptist Church in 1930 and was a part of our church nearly all of her life.
