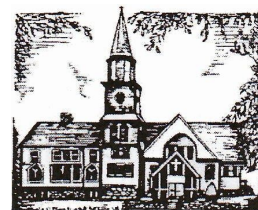

A Word From Rev Jackson



Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Blessings on each of you during this season of Advent.

Celebrating Christmas in 2020 is a whole new experience for us. One of the side effects of the pandemic is that it causes us to slow down and reflect on what is truly important about the Advent and Christmas seasons. The decorations will come and go, but the true spirit of the season is what will carry us through the advent of God coming to earth through His only son, Jesus, change our lives and/or our outlook? These are just a couple of the questions we should be asking from now until Christmas Day and beyond. The advent of Jesus's birth made a big difference in the life of John the Baptist. Consider the words Zacharias spoke about his future son, John, in Luke 1:76-79. "And you, my child, will be called a prophet of the Most High; for you will go on before the Lord to prepare the way for him, to give his people the knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins." The coming of Jesus gives us, as Christians, a clear path out of darkness and sin for our entire lives. This is the main reason that we rejoice! All the symbols of the season point to the heart of Christmas which is the birth of Christ. The tree reminds us that He is the creator of the tree, that is, the tree of life. The wreath teaches us that God's love for us is eternal. The candles are a reminder that Jesus is the light of the world shining in the darkness. The candy cane takes the shape of a shepherd's crook, representing the humble shepherds who were the first to worship the newborn Christ. We follow the star that points to Jesus as the one true way. The angels sing out the good news that Jesus is born. Finally, we reflect on the manger, the symbol of His birth that would bring salvation to the world.

This may be a difficult year to put up decorations. We may not have that "Christmas spirit" as much as usual. Perhaps for a while, we should try to tune out the bad news. Maybe we should sit with our cup of Christmas cheer, reflect on our nativity scene, and think, pray, and meditate on the one who saved us and loves us the most, Jesus.

Then after and throughout these days of Advent, let us gather safely in church and in our homes, and remember the true meaning of this holy season. Let us thank Him for the good things that have happened in 2020. Then, just maybe, away from the noise and distractions, the spirit of Christmas will come to us and fill our souls.

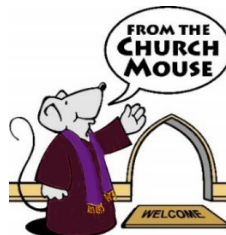
