

# Grace & Peace from the Pastor's Desk

Tucked between the books of the prophets Jeremiah and Ezekiel is a short book, just 5 chapters long, the book of Lamentations. According to the Harper Collins Study Bible the book's name in Hebrew is "How!" The book is associated with the destruction of the temple in 70 B.C. The author is unknown, perhaps many persons worked together to express the sense of bewilderment, loss and anguish felt by the people of God. It is written in poetic form and may have been expressions of grief used for a service or services of public mourning after the destruction of Jerusalem. (New Revised Standard Version. NRSV. Harper Collins Study Bible, 1989, *Division of Christian Education of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.*)

The first word of the opening verse gives the Hebrew name, "How lonely sits the city that once was full of people!" (NRSV) and informs the reader that this book is written for a specific purpose. The Jewish people calling the book "How!" resonates with the loneliness and the unspoken question, "How?" Even though the book was written to mourn the loss of a way of life, a loss of everything the people knew, some of the verses can utter our deepest cries of mourning. "See, O LORD, how distressed I am; my stomach churns, my heart is wrung within me, because I have been very rebellious" (Lam. 1:21a&b, NRSV). "With a yoke on our necks we are hard driven; we are weary, we are given no rest" (Lam. 5:5, NRSV). "Why have you forgotten us completely? Why have you forsaken us these many days?" (Lam. 5:20, NRSV). These verses may speak to you, they may help you express your feelings of loss, of exhaustion, of wrongdoing.

Yet in the middle of the book, we find a few verses in Chapter 3 which make it seem as though there needs to be a break in the lamenting. It is as though an aside is taken to remind everyone who God is, how God responds to our cries for help. It contains one of the strongest reasons for hope... "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. 'The LORD is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him'" (Lam. 3:21-24, NRSV). Then a few verses later we are reminded "The LORD is good to those who wait for him, to the soul that seeks him. It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the LORD" (Lam. 3:25-6, NRSV).

The Bible is the living Word of God because it speaks to us in all of our experiences, and we can hear again the Word of the Lord and find it speaks to us in a way we never heard before.

# CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE-CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

At the Congregational Meeting on August 8, 2021, the assembly voted to approve the expenditure for 4 LAARS Mascot boiler units, pumps, piping and labor to replace the failed boiler unit to the Education Wing and to update the existing boiler unit to the Sanctuary. The total cost to replace the boiler system is \$58,803.64.

A Capital Campaign is currently underway to raise funds for the cost



of the new boiler system. A designated fund has been set up. A rummage sale is being considered for a possible Fall date. If you are a Thrivent member you can apply for a grant from the Action Team program as we proceed with our fund raising.

#### Stewards of God's Creation - Green tip

Fall is a great time to plant trees. Consider planting in your own yard or helping someone who does planting and non-native species removal at various locations including **Presque Isle**.

Planting native trees is important. Native plants and native insects have coevolved over long periods of time so that native insects, particularly caterpillars of moths and butterflies, can eat native plants. These caterpillars are the prime food source given to nestlings by parent birds. According to Greg, there has been some alarming research that both native insect populations and native bird populations have declined over the last few decades by about 30% and the correlation seems to be tied to the lack of native plants for food since non-native plants generally have created toxins that native insects haven't co-evolved with.

There is lots of information about native tree species available online. One good source is from PA-DCNR -

www.dcnr.pa.gov/Conservation/WildPlants/LandscapingwithNativePlants/Pages/default.aspx. It includes a listing of many native tree and other plant species in groups for sunny/shade and dry/moist. For example, red maple for sunny moist areas, redbud for sunny dry areas, flowering dogwood for shady moist areas and shagbark hickory for shady dry areas.


WELCA has shared the following two letters and they are asking our members to consider signing and mailing them in support of the National Human Trafficking Resource Center Hotline Notification Act. We ask you to prayerfully consider and then if you are so inclined, to sign these two letters and mail them, as a member of the Immanuel congregation.

**Pennsylvania is one of several states,** according to WELCA that does not have any clear signage laws to help victims find assistance if they are being trafficked for sex or labor. We do make a difference, letting our lawmakers know that we are committed to eliminating Human Trafficking.

We have been encouraged to copy & share these letters on our church letterhead and have a letter writing campaign - this is our attempt to share and honor this request & concern in PA.

The current signage in Pennsylvania rest stops pertaining to human trafficking is located only in the lobby and does not include information on what human trafficking is and how it occurs. The National Human Trafficking Hotline identified in 2018 that 268 victims were identified in Pennsylvania. The Human Trafficking Institute reports in 2019 in PA there were 145 new criminal cases and 88 civil cases of human trafficking in PA. Victims are often transported from one city to the next on Pennsylvania highways and "sold" multiple times.


