# **STEADFAST IN FAITH**

Zech. 12:10-11; 13:1; Psalm 63: 2-9; Gal. 3:26-29; Luke 9: 18-24

This Sunday is the 12<sup>th</sup> Sunday in the Ordinary Time of Liturgical Year C. Tomorrow is June 24<sup>th</sup>; the feast of the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist. In today's gospel, when Jesus asked His disciples, "Who do the crowds say that I am?" Some said, "He was John the Baptist..." This gives testimony to what Jesus said about John in Matthew 11:11: "I assure you that John the Baptist is greater than anyone who has ever lived." John the Baptist was a great man because he did not only prepare the way for Jesus, but he suffered and died for what he believed. He died for the Truth! Like the great prophet Jeremiah, God called John the Baptist before he was born. His parents were advanced in age. His mother was barren, but God can always make possible what human beings may consider impossible: "Have no fear ...because I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord." In Luke 1:13, the Lord, through His Angel said to John's father, Zechariah: "Do not be afraid ... because your prayer has been heard."

Couples who have known each other for a number of years and possibly even gotten married would be the first to admit that knowing one another is an ongoing process. In fact, it should be in order to remain exciting. So also is our relationship with Christ, it is an ongoing process. You and I learn to grow each and every day in our relationship with Jesus. In your busy daily schedule, if Jesus where to stop by and ask you, "Who do you say that I am?" I wonder what your answer to Him would be. It is funny that when things are going well with us we have a different picture and perception of God than when things are not going the way we want them to go.

However, the God we worship is a God that manifest Himself to us even in our lowly state, "The Son of Man must suffer greatly and be rejected by elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed and on the third day be raised." You and I have much to learn about Jesus. By the example of His life, He teaches us not to run away from the challenges that we face in our effort to serve Him in our fellow brothers and sisters. Jesus knew that those who would follow Him would sometimes have to risk their lives in order to be His true followers. As St. Peter exhorts us, we must resist the Tempter and be "steadfast in faith, knowing that your fellow believers throughout the world undergo the same sufferings" (1 Peter 5:9). There are Christians in Communist, Islamic and dictatorial countries that are being persecuted every day. You and I are fortunate that the greatest suffering or sacrifice most of us have to deal with as Christians is to keep the Commandments and to give up one hour a week to attend Mass - still many find even that too hard.

To such people, Jesus says, "If anyone wishes to come after Me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow Me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will save it." Like John the Baptist, you and I may find God's call and our mission very overwhelming and intimidating, but we must trust and listen to the Lord say to us, "Do not be afraid," because "with the Lord everything is possible." Like the Psalmist, when we are confronted with difficulties we must let go of ourselves and cry out, "My soul is thirsting for You, O Lord my God." You must remain steadfast and confident that "The God of all grace Who called you to His eternal glory through Christ Jesus will Himself restore, confirm, strengthen, and establish you after you have suffered a little" (1 Peter 5:10).

# **OUR CHURCH & THE CHANGING WORLD**



It is unfortunate that some terms become so misused that their original meaning is obscured. One such term is prophecy. In the media today, Nostradamus is referred to as a prophet. Some televangelists declare themselves to be prophets, promising alternatively gloom and doom or prosperity for the believer. Others of the more secular

ilk, would like to tell us who is getting married in the future or divorced, who is having a baby, and where the next natural disaster is apt to hit. For us as Christians as well as our Jewish brothers and sisters the true prophet is one who "stands in the breech." He or she proclaims God's judgments and mercy. Like Amos, John the Baptist, Catherine of Siena, and more recently Mother Teresa and Dorothy Day, they show us the will of God as we strive to reform ourselves and the world in the face of the power of evil and nihilism. It can be argued that the Second Vatican Council under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit is truly for us a prophetic voice.

The final document: The Church in the Modern World (Gaudium et Spes) though written fifty years ago and promulgated in 1965, certainly fits the description of a prophetic warning that should awaken in every human heart the necessity for personal reflection and universal action. Before many of the "advances" in science, technology, and politics we have in our midst, the Council Fathers alerted all to the path we seem to be on as a civilization. "The spiritual uneasiness of today and the changing structure of life are part of a broader upheaval, whose symptoms are the increasing part played on the intellectual level by the mathematical and natural sciences (not excluding the sciences dealing with man himself) and on the practical level by their repercussions on technology. The scientific mentality has wrought a change in the cultural sphere and on habits of thought, and the progress of technology is now reshaping the face of the earth and has its sights on the conquest of space. ... The accelerated pace of history is such that one can scarcely keep abreast of it. The destiny of the human race is viewed as a complete whole. ... Mankind substitutes a dynamic and more evolutionary concept of nature for a static one and the result is an immense series of new problems calling for a new endeavor of analysis and synthesis." They go on to describe attitudes and morals in such a way that one might suspect they were in a time machine which landed in 2013.

Like all prophecies, the future is not determined. Freely man can choose to move away from those situations that have caused dehumanization, cultural depression, and domestic and worldwide conflict. We can make it our purpose to join with others of good will to rid our society of bigotry and hatred, we can choose to teach our children the ways of conservation of goods and appreciation of their value, and we can take the time to enjoy our spouses and children and experience the art, music, and writings of a generation now past but has much to say to us. We can rejoice that the Lord has given us the understanding of the bishops most of whom are now in eternity but whose contribution to our faith experience is extremely relevant. How do we turn our society towards the life-giving values of Christ and His Church? It is not to be always negative. But it is to identify those elements in our community which are positive, work with others who share our understanding, and to remove the elements which are destructive by witnessing in our own lives to the great gifts we have received from the Almighty. We are created for joy, let us live that way.
