Let anyone with ears listen! - Matthew 11:15

When I was a child, I used to be afraid of the dark especially after seeing a scary movie or reading a scary book. I would ask my mother to leave the door open to my room. As I got older, my fear began to disappear and I became more assertive and analytical about my dreams and my fears of the dark, so I would have my mother close the door; however, she would always keep it open just a crack. I began to realize how important that became to me as I grew into adulthood and had my own children. In our society we are quick to shut people out of our lives for various reasons out of fear, anxiety, anger. We try to shut people out and sometimes we are shutting ourselves in as well. We might not even know the difference. I think what Jesus teaches us is to keep the door open a crack let the light in a bit or let the fresh air in too. We have a cliché "Take what they say with a grain of salt." That is, consider what some says with a wider context – given them the benefit of the doubt – pay more attention to what's behind the words or the intent. Don't be so quick to shut the door! To react so quickly! And before you judge, decide what is right or true, consider what's in your heart and what God has done for you, and more so, in Jesus Christ for you.

In Genesis, God declares that it is not good for you to be alone and so God creates a partner, others to help create and live together. So why would we want to shut ourselves off from those God places in our path – what is laughter without someone to share it with? What is joy without others to rejoice with you? What is grief without someone to sit in it with you and listen? What is love all alone? It's not always easy but we need it more than ever!

During these 40 days of Lent, I invite you to take on a new discipline. Well, the discipline is not new, but it does take intention and practice. I would like you to practice listening and responding to what you hear. Listening on text or social media is not what I'm writing about here. You need to be with people to listen. Body language, cadence of words, inflection and finally actual words are essential to listening. You will need to ask questions and spend time to listen for understanding as well. As you practice with friends and family, you will discover the door opening wider and wider to the world around you. Take it a little at a time.

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of prayer and time to listen and respond to you every day. Thank you for the gift of Lent so that we might practice the disciplines of spiritual growth together as we reflect on your sacrificial love shown on the cross and the promise of new life, for the sake of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord we pray. Amen.

Tuesdays from 7:30pm — 8:30pm during Lent on Zoom - One of the greatest frustrations of the Christian life is having to wait for God to act. We wait, sometimes for years, for our prayers to be answered, for our deepest longings to be fulfilled. Some devoted Christians get stuck in dead-end jobs even though they feel certain they could serve God in greater ways if only He would open the opportunity. Why doesn't He? Some wait for a godly spouse, some couples wait for the gift of children, and some, who have dedicated their lives to serving the Lord, wait in disappointed bafflement as their work seems to yield no fruit. Why?

As Christians, we yearn to serve the Lord, to step forward and obey Him like the great heroes of the Bible, but we are confused, waiting for clear orders, kept at a distance by the invisible barriers of God's silence, His inaction, or His unhurried pace. In "When God Takes Too Long", Joseph Bentz examines the mysteries of God's timing and shows Christians how to thrive in the midst of one of life's greatest frustrations--waiting. He offers those who have been discouraged by a life of waiting a chance to alter not only their perspective on waiting, but also their actions in response to it, transforming this frustration into a positive force that will enrich and change their lives.

"When God Takes Too Long" addresses:

- How not to wish (or wait) our lives away
- How to better understand the nature of time
- How to master the discipline of waiting
- How to cast off the boundaries of time to view our lives from an eternal perspective

Pastor's Report:

Notes:

- Humbled by general fund checking account, big blessing, finance is an indicator of congregational health, but can lead to sense of complacency. Need to continue to look for ways to build on it.
- o New members are not so new. Will be seeing "familiar" faces at future services where those faces will be officially introduced as new members. This couples with updates to church roster/directory by Lesa, very proud of that. It is important to keep members included on communications, so it is a frustration because we don't have the necessary information until they are officially members. It's important to have new member ceremonies during the service to it is a public affirmation of their admission to the congregation. It's important to make sure people are ok with the new member process, so far it has been "OK".
- Congregation meeting and budget planning as a highlight of the last month.
- Parochial report was very exciting and ahead of time. Per report attendance, congregation and funds have gone up.
 Shouldn't get a call from the bishop because of positive news in the report. Credit to Lesa because "she's a planner", and so numbers/data arrive early. Pastor is appreciative.
- Every year we get a call from Synod to reconfirm commitment for support to Synod. Percentage has not changed for a long time. Another factor is that PLC gives to a lot of organizations directly. Pastor has directed the Synod to the financial reports to demonstrate pattern of giving.
- Pastor visited two people in the hospital simultaneously, which has never happened before.
- Discernment process upcoming. PLC handled it well last time, better than other churches that Pastor has been a part of.
 We accomplished all our goals. Portends well for the future.

Excited for doing this again after ten years. Usually works best when a new pastor is coming into a church. But also works for a pastor to "renew" his call, it feels very timely.

- Ash Wednesday & Lent. Lent guide is complete. Will be sent out to whole congregation via email.
- First communion coming up, it is believed to include five members.
- Fish Fry coming up. Sign ups to go out and posted.
- Jolly family is joining. Swans will be joining.
- TV13 will be conducting spot light on the new food pantry location.
- o It was noted that baptism to funeral was a positive ratio.
- Appreciation vocalized for service hours worked at food pantry by Pastor, although it's likely this has always been on the report.
- It was noted that Zoom Bible Study is an important part of PLC that is led by Pastor.

New Business:

- Council Retreat
 - Chris to discuss venue with others
 - Date set for March 5 from 1 -6 p.m.
 - Goal is to distribute materials ahead of time for review.
- Schedule for Committee Reports at Council meetings
 - It has been a long-time goal to get each committee to come to council meetings to be heard.
 - Planning to have six committee leaders come in April and seven in June
 - o Chris to schedule. Info to be provided in advance.
 - Pastor would like to add in some administration topics (reimbursement, do we have access to our money?, other little things) Pastor to obtain a list of discussion topics from Lesa.

Sound update

 Chris met with A/V guy, who is consolidating information to provide proposal. Chris requested a proposal for two options: basic and "Cadillac". Once proposal is available it will be shared, which will be the basis for additional competitive quoting.

New cleaning crew?

 Meeting needed with the cleaning crew to set expectations, define areas where there is need for improvement, and ultimately make sure challenges in the eyes of PLC are property communicated. Can Mark do that? Need to make sure there is some grace due to the employees (troubled individuals).

Parsonage

- Someone who is very interested in moving. Kim is Haylie Clark's mom.
- o Property committee is currently evaluating repair needs.
- Nels is moving out spring break.
- Parsonage is a net positive due to housing shortage. Might be useful in future pastor search, could be a differentiator.

Old Business:

- West Windows, install date?
 - Frustration. It was determined Story Const had not ordered new windows after all, although it has been believed the windows were in stock for some time.
 - Fortunately, Munn is ordering windows at original price.
 Story Construction should have them in 3-4 weeks.
 - Need to plan to get pews through hole when windows arrive.
- Kumla Dinner/Steak Fry/Fish Fry
 - Only need from council is for people to sign up to help.

Social Work is Rewarding Work

A child saying "mom" for the first time at 3 years old, a parent getting a job that brings them joy – these are successes that are important to Mallory Berkenpas, Service Coordinator in LSI's Early Childhood department in Sioux City.

Mallory has been an employee of LSI for more than a decade, and has held many different roles in supporting children and families. "My heart lies in working with children and families and prevention work, because I've seen the value in it. I see how important it is. I wish more people knew and understood and valued the work that is done in the early childhood period because it is so crucial," said Mallory.

She expressed that one of the most rewarding parts of her job is being able to see, experience and walk this journey alongside these families, who along the way, make these small or big strides – whatever that means for them.

"Maybe the child says 'mom' for the first time at 3 years old, which is something that has happened in our program. That's a big win for this child that didn't speak from zero to three years old, and did because of the interventions we helped that family find," said Mallory. "All of those successes are so important to me and also my staff – being able to see them grow, build their skill set and feel good about their work."

"Social work can be so hard... so I think being able to see those small and big wins along the way is important," said Mallory.
