Dear Rural School Advocates of Iowa Members.

We are still concluding the 2015 Legislative Session as this membership renewal invitation comes to your school district. RSAI has much to celebrate, being an effective voice at the table for students in rural school districts. We checked another priority off our list of legislative priorities, as reported in your RSAI weekly legislative update:

**HF 646 PPEL Flexibility for Transportation Repair:** This bill allows districts to use PPEL funds to repair or maintain transportation equipment if the costs of the repair for a unit of equipment exceed \$2,500, beginning July 1, 2015. House and Senate both unanimously approved the bill, which was signed by the Governor on May 12.

There were six pieces of legislation addressing the issue of inequitable transportation expenditures in the lowa House. Most received a positive subcommittee vote, but none was debated in the House Education Committee. Despite lack offurther progress to the Governor's desk, we can celebrate that the awareness of this issue has been elevated. As of this writing, language in the Senate Education Appropriations bill, HF 658, requests an Interim Study Committee to consider issues of student equity, including but not limited to transportation expenditures. Additionally, another RSAI priority, extending

the sunset of the state penny for school infrastructure, SF 477, received a strong bi-partisan vote in the lowa Senate, keeping it alive for consideration in the lowa House next Session. With school funding yet unresolved and other issues on the table, there is much work for us ahead.

The Leadership Group of RSAI is grateful to you for your membership, your advocacy and your support. With membership growth at such a good pace, the RSAI leadership group voted to lower dues to \$750 per member district for the 2015-16 school year, which will face confirmation at the RSAI Annual Meeting on October 7, 2015, in Ankeny. We hope your district board members and superintendent can attend and help craft the priorities for RSAI to carry forward into the 2016 Legislative Session. The enclosed invoice is priced based on that leadership decision.

Please let your Regional Representative hear from you, regarding needs and concerns, or celebrating a strong educational success in your district. RSAI is a grass roots advocacy organization and counts on member participation at the regional meetings in July to begin crafting our legislative platform and this year in particular, determining the best transportation equity policy recommendation we can craft to move that issue forward in 2016.

# 2016RuRal School advocateS of Iowa legISlative PRIoRitleS

#### **Transportation**

A cost equalization formula should compensate for excess cost of transporting students in rural districts. Transportation funds compete with educational programs in the school's general fund.

#### State Penny for School Infrastructure

Extension or repeal of the sunset.

#### **At-Risk Funding**

Appropriate sufficient funds to address an increasing At-Risk population and change the formula so that it reflects the actual number of At-Risk students.

#### Standards, Assessment and Technology

RSAI supports the Iowa Core Content Standards and an aligned test, including technology and bandwidth required to adequately administer the assessment.

#### **PerPupilFunding**

Set state supplemental rate of growth no lower than 6% for the 2016-17 school year and 2017-18 school year.

#### **Operational Sharing Incentives**

Maintain the incentives and provide additional capacity to school districts to improve educational outcomes for students.

#### **Equity in the Formula**

Raise the state cost per pupil to the maximum district cost per pupil of all districts in the formula.

#### funding ConceRnS

- Funding of education is based on enrollment, which, in rural lowa, has been slipping for a long time. As enrollment declines, funding follows.
- Iowa population growth of 2% from April 2010 to July 2014 is behind the national average of 3.3%.
- In Iowa, we have 51.5 persons per square mile compared to the national average of 87.4, yet the Iowa funding system has no acknowledgement of population sparsity, transportation costs or understanding of necessarily rural schools in the school foundation formula like other rural states.
- 38 districts no longer exist at the end of 2015, reorganized or dissolved since 2000...all from rural communities.
- The challenge of attracting and retaining great teachers and staff, with many teaching positions declared "shortage areas", is even more difficult in rural communities.

#### tRanSPoRtation ConceRnS

- Large geographic districts with relatively fewer kids combined with mandated busing siphonsmoney from our educational fund.
- In some rural districts, transportation costs exceed 10% of the General Fund Budget.
- Budget pressures including sharing and consolidation efforts demand even more spent on transportation.

#### local ContRol

- Required to pay out of General Fund for Farly Retirements of those 65 or older.
- Cannot repair the very things we use PPEL/SAVE funds to buy such as buses with the same funds.
- Flexibility in drop out prevention plans to target at risk students' needs as determined locally.

#### at-Risk

- Significantly rising poverty among rural lowa families is creating additional pressures on schools where funding has not changed in years.
- From 2008 to 2015, Free & Reduced eligibility increased from 33% to 41% of total school enrollment.
- Meanwhile, drop out prevention changes capped districts at 2.5%
   5% of regular program district cost.





### 2015 Legislative Priorities and Action

At the RSAI annual meeting on October 25, 2014, members approved the following legislative priorities to guide advocacy during the 2015 Legislative Session. Action during the session is included in bold text below.

<u>Transportation Equity</u>: Supports a mechanism that covers school transportation costs with state and/or local funding that does not unreasonably disadvantage property tax payers in property poor districts or compete with general funds otherwise spent on providing education to students. With at least 6 bills introduced in the House and language to study transportation in the Senate, there has never been more conversation about school transportation then during this session. Watch for 2015 Interim Committee to study this issue.

<u>PPEL Consistency</u>: The repair of items allowed to be purchased with PPEL funds should also be an allowable PPEL fund expense. **HF 646 was signed by the Governor on May 15. One small but mighty step forward.** 

Funding and Flexibility for At-risk Students: Resources for serving at-risk students should be based on need, such as the number/percentage of students eligible for Free and Reduced Price Lunch, rather than enrollment of the district. Districts should be given flexibility in determining the expenditure of at-risk resources to support students to graduate college/career ready for success. Education Appropriations bills in both House and Senate approved more flexible use of dropout prevention funds based on district determination of at-risk, still on the table.

State Supplemental Assistance 6%: RSAI supports a goal to get lowa's investment in education to the national average. Iowa is now more than \$1,657 per pupil below the USA average level of expenditure. Funding per pupil for the 2015-16 school year must be determined ASAP as the 2015 Session convenes and set at an adequate level, no lower than 6%. Per lowa law, funding for the 2016-17 school year must be set within 30 days of the Governor's budget announcement in the 2015 Session. RSAI supports a per pupil increase for 2016-17 no lower than 6%. School funding still pending as the 2015 Legislative Session closes down!

<u>Operational Sharing Incentives</u>: Opportunities to achieve efficiencies, share capacity to operate, and redirect resources to educational programs, should be maintained and expanded to provide additional capacity to school districts to improve educational outcomes for students.

Extension of State Penny for School Infrastructure: RSAI calls on the lowa Legislature to repeal the sunset of the state penny for school infrastructure. SF 477 was approved by the full Senate, 37:13 and is sitting in the House Ways and Means Committee, still alive for discussion in the 2016 Session.



#### RSAI Legislative Update March 31, 2016

Not much action this week as House and Senate rethink budget targets, getting ready for appropriations work. Thanks for all you do to advocate for lowa's children!

**School Funding:** SF 174 and SF 175 conference increases state cost per pupil and categoricals by 2.25% for FY 2017 was approved March 23, but still has not arrived on the Governor's desk for his signature. Thank legislators for getting it done, but encourage more timely action in the future. Next Step: **Set the FY 2018 state cost per pupil this year before adjourning.** Senate passed bills at 4% (SF2092/SF 2093). Ask House members to act.

**Education Coalition Fact**: Set State Cost per Pupil for 2018 before Adjournment! This publication explains the rationale for the timeline that exists in Iowa Code, the impact on planning if the timeline isn't followed, the recent history of missing the deadlines and new revenue setting process that requires REC to set the FY 2018 revenue estimate (which they set at 4.1% at their March meeting) so no better time than the present to act on the 2018 state cost per pupil. RSAI is part of the Education Coalition, comprised of AEAs, ISEA, SAI, RSAI and UEN.

Water Quality and the State Penny for School Infrastructure: The House Republicans presented an alternative for funding water quality, which would divert \$25 million current collected in sales tax to a water excise tax for water quality. This bill, HSB 654, would lower state general fund revenue by \$25 million and reduce SAVE fund revenue to schools by \$2 million. The House Ways and Means Committee approved the bill today. It will receive a new bill number soon.

**State Penny for School Infrastructure:** four bills that extend the state penny, along with other policies, are in the House Ways and Means Committee. No official action was taken this week, but conversations are ongoing. Continue to help your legislators understand how SAVE has reduced or prevented an increase in property taxes, how school leaders would appreciate flexibility to use some future SAVE funds for transportation or cost per pupil inequities, and the need to act soon as the bonding capacity window is shortening. See last week's newsletter for details about the bills and key policy questions on the table.

#### Bills signed by the Governor:

<u>HF 2261</u> **Joint Investment Trusts:** this bill requires joint investment trusts to follow federal law and GASB standards. RSAI is registered in support and the Governor has signed the bill.

<u>HF 2336</u> **DE Technical Corrections:** this bill cleans up old Code references, deletes programs no longer operating, and makes technical changes. RSAI is registered as undecided and the Governor has signed the bill.

#### **Bills on the Move:**

<u>HF2450</u> Parent Opt-in to Human Growth and Development this bill, by House Oversight, would require parents to sign permission for students to attend content or courses or conferences including human growth and development curriculum. RSAI is registered as opposed to this bill. The bill is on the House Calendar.

<u>HF 2284</u> **Voucher Pilot Project**: this bill creates an appropriation for school savings accounts for nonpublic school students in Waterloo (120 low income students) and Sioux Center (70 low income students), provides just over \$5,800 per pupil and allows any funds remaining at graduation to be used for college. RSAI is registered as opposed to this bill. The bill is assigned a subcommittee, with Reps. Rogers, Devoe and Mascher, holding their first meeting next Tuesday.

HF SF 2304 Boarding School Regulation: this bill sets up a process for state government to certify and monitor boarding schools. The bill is in response to occurrences at the Midwest Academy in southeast Iowa. RSAI is monitoring this bill which has been amended by the House Oversight Committee and moves to the House Calendar.
