ou know how you go to high school, meet people, and never expect to see them again. That was David Senter. We spent about two years together at MTA, had maybe five conversations, and did not speak again until about two years ago. What led me to reach out to him was a shared journey--that of a rabbi leaving the Orthodox

movement. We spoke many times, before and after I accepted the position as Rabbi at Shaarey Israel. His expertise in kashrus, his compassion and our parallel odysseys quickly cemented a friendship. When we

reacquainted he was Rabbi of Temple Israel of Portsmouth, NH, a sizable Conservative synagogue. His love for his congregation was palpable.

Sadly, our parallel odyssey is over. Over the past year we spoke several times about his battle with cancer, a battle he has lost. To quote his official obituary, *Rabbi Rafael David Ross Senter passed away peacefully at The Hyder House in Dover, NH with his beloved family at his bedside on December 1, 2017. The funeral took place at The Rosenbaum Yeshiva of North Jersey and burial was at Riverside Cemetery in Saddlebrook, NJ.*

He was ordained as a rabbi in 1985. After a successful career in the business world he decided he wanted to make his mark on the world as a pulpit

rabbi. He has served two congregations in NJ, one in NY and most recently served as the spiritual leader of Temple Israel of Portsmouth, NH where he leaves behind a congregation of nearly three hundred families. He was committed to furthering interfaith dialogue between people of all religions and cultural backgrounds. He loved children and bringing people closer to their Jewish roots.

Rabbi Senter had an important local connection. What follows is a quote from an article from The Times of Israel about his "flipping" from the Orthodox movement, for which he told me he is forever grateful to Rabbi Craig Scheff.

"I was not your typical OTD," Senter says, using an Orthodox neologism for one who has left the faith – an acronym for Off the Derech, or path. "I never gave up wearing a yarmulke, but I felt there wasn't a place for me anymore in the frum community."

For two years, Senter didn't set foot in a synagogue. Then one day a man walked into his bagel shop and asked him to cater an event at a nearby Conservative temple, Orangetown Jewish Center. Senter, then 35, agreed, and on Simchat Torah he found himself back in shul, albeit a very different one from those to which he was accustomed.

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THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian History

Warning! This article contains unrestrained political opinion (and joy). Reader's discretion is advised.

T f I forget you, Jerusalem, may my right hand forget its skill. May my tongue stick to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you; if I do not raise Jerusalem over my greatest joys. (Psalms 137:5-6)

I saw history made this week. Many of us did. When the President made his statement recognizing Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, the world took notice.

If there is one place in the world that I want to be right now, it is at the Western Wall. I want to put my hands on the stones, close my eyes and pray. I want to thank the *Rebono Shel Olam* (Master of the World) that another step towards our ultimate redemption may just have occurred.

The President's actions are not without its detractors and naysayers. To some, this will bring on the apocalypse. Violence will break out all over the Middle East and the world because of the President's naiveté and just plain lack of sophistication. Surely, he remembers the time Arik Sharon visited the Temple Mount and caused an Intifada? (If he didn't, he was reminded of this in a letter sent to him by a prominent senator.)

Then there are those who bemoan his "breaking with our allies." After all, if they all believe that Jerusalem should not be recognized the capital of Israel, should we not go along? We don't want to have any disagreements because who knows where that will end up.

Then there are those who just don't see this as a big deal. After all, what has really changed on the ground? Jerusalem has been the capital of Israel for 68 years now and they do not need the United States to validate their existence. The move of the embassy is not imminent and, in fact, is expected to take several years. US passports will not associate Jerusalem with Israel as a birthplace. So, the argument goes, what has really changed and what is there to celebrate?

Let me go through each and every one of these positions.

Regarding the violence, it seems to me that those who make that argument have very short (or very selective) memories. When the PA was offered **7he Scroll...4** 98% of their demands by Prime Minister Ehud Barak, they walked away from the table. They could have had peace right there and they spurned it. A short time later, Sharon went to

the Temple Mount and they had an excuse for violence. Many do not believe that visit was the cause of the violence, merely the excuse. I count myself among those.

Israel unilaterally withdrew from Gaza and turned it over to the PA. This, one would argue, was a huge concession. What have they received in return? Rockets and tunnels for terrorists to use and attack Israeli citizens?

Let us not forget that our tax dollars, which are used to send aid to the Palestinians, assist the Palestinians in paying stipends to the families of terrorists who blow up, shoot, stab and run down innocent civilians.

The history of Palestinian Authority actions show they they do not need a reason to be violent. So, let's not for a second believe that anything the President has said will increase the danger one iota. At best, it is yet another excuse.

Even if there is a possibility of violence, is it really good policy to cave to threats of violence? Should anyone tell me that it is, I recommend a review of British policy in the 1930s to see where appeasement leads.

As for "breaking with our allies," I think there is another word to use to describe this: Leadership. "Leading from Behind" was nothing more than a cowardly oxymoron. You cannot lead from behind. When you lead, you are blazing new trails for others to follow.

And there has been some movement on that score. In quick fashion, several nations have made similar declarations. The Czech Republic, The Philippines, and several African nations have all followed suit. Will others? Time will tell. It's early. But the move by the United States has broken through the dam of denial.

Finally, to the question of what has not changed. This, of all the positions, has the most potential merit because, in reality, not much has changed on the ground. Still, I strongly disagree with it for a simple reason: It is something new. For the *(continue)*

first time in my memory, since the establishment of the PA, an American President has taken a public stance that does not treat the Palestinians as poor, abused children. I see a message to Mahmoud Abbas and the Palestinians that reality must be accepted. The simple fact is that Israel has a right to declare its capital where it likes. No other nation in the world has other nations recognize their capital in any place other than where they establish it to be. France could recognize St. Louis as the capital of the United States but that would not make it so.

The President clearly said that this is not something new. This is what has always been and to say anything else is lunacy. One would think that this is not something that should be so earth shattering but the fact of the matter is that *no US President has ever made that statement as policy*. And that, my friends, is something new and exciting.

Up to this point, I cannot think of a single time that the Palestinians have been truly called out by the International Community for their intransigence nor can I remember anyone giving Israel the credit for having taken significant steps toward peace. While Israel ceded the West Bank and Gaza to Palestinian control, the Palestinian Authority *still does not recognize Israel's right to exist*.

Albert Einstein is reputed to have defined insanity as "doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results." Ever since the Palestinian Authority was created by the Oslo Accords in 1993, US policy has been the same: Support the Palestinians, help them build a state and pressure Israel to make concessions. It clearly hasn't worked.

Oh, and before I close, let me clarify one other thing. Many nations of the world have stated that they cannot recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital because it must be "negotiated." Well, if that is a subject for negotiation, it is one of many including the borders of a future State of Palestine. Yet, the PA has been launching a unilateral diplomatic offensive to get their state recognized by the world community. So much for the sanctity of "negotiations."

When the President recognized what is, in effect, reality, I think a message was being sent to the Palestinians that the rules have to go both ways. I think that, for the first time, an American President had the courage to get up and call a shovel a shovel. And that, I think, will ultimately strengthen the American hand in the ultimate peace negotiations because they will insist on an even playing field. The PA may not like it but it may just force them to come to the table and finally, for the sake of their children if for no one else, make peace. One can only hope.

If there is one central theme in all of *Torah* it is the theme of *Hakarat Hatov*, acknowledging good. The *Mishna* in *Yoma* has several sections in which is mentions the name of people and families "in praise" for actions they did. Other are mentioned, in the words of the *Mishna* "to their shame."

It has been a matter of ironclad policy for me never to mention the names of public people, especially politicians, in these pages. Mentioning names can detract from a message and give it a patina of blatant partisanship. I will keep to that policy in these pages. It is important, however, those that were responsible for this historic decision, as well as those who supported it in the Congress should receive our thanks on this issue. As for those who spoke out against it, I feel that they should know our displeasure. Members of the Senate who voted, on June 5th of this year, in favor of reiterating the Jerusalem Embassy Act only to speak out against this latest development a mere six months later should especially know that we recognize their hypocrisy and perfidy and that we will not forget.

Every Shabbat, we pray for the welfare of the government. We ask that *Hashem* give the government the wisdom to "deal kindly with us and all Israel." *Hashem* has always watched out over us. When Israel has been in danger, he has always led the United States to our side to assist us when we needed it most. No American administration has ever truly abandoned Israel in its hour of distress. Nixon sent arms to Israel and Obama funded the Iron Dome. We must give thanks to *Hashem* for having given them the wisdom and courage to act as they did. But we must also give thanks to individuals where thanks is due. That is the true *Torah* way.

May Hashem give his people strength and may Hashem bless his people with peace.

But it felt right, and Senter soon became a regular, helping make the minyan. He was asked to serve on the board, then the ritual committee.

"There were things that were hard to wrap my head around," said Senter.

"When he first came to our synagogue, he didn't understand there were people other than the Orthodox who actually cared about halachah, and he was so impressed to discover that we did," recalled Orangetown's Rabbi, Craig Scheff. "I think he found a measure of sincerity in the Conservative community that he respected and eventually realized he could live and be comfortable within that system."

Losing a friend is always painful. Losing a respected colleague adds to that pain. Together, my friend and I explored the challenges of pursuing a life we knew was true to ourselves but would drive a wedge between us and either family or friends. Rabbi Senter's accessibility, humility and sense of humor made everything we talked about so much more meaningful. Professionally, his commonsense approach to the balance between Jewish law and practical living helped guide me in my early days at Shaarey Israel. I am forever in his debt.

May his soul be bound up in the bonds of *Eternal life*.

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
