HELPING THE HOMELESS "GO INSIDE"

In life, I often find myself in a position where this joke is applicable: "How many psychologists does it take to change a light bulb? Only one. But the lightbulb has to want to change."

So too is it true when applied to that subset of the homeless population that refuse to "go inside". You can build all the housing that you want, but it means nothing to someone who simply refuses the offer to go inside. So, what happens in that situation? What happens to the person who just won't go? Is our community simply forced to accept the presence of the offen highly agitated, consistently unpredictable homeless whose presence on the streets has the most immediate and significant impact on the quality of life in Sherman Oaks?

I have been writing and talking about this issue for months now. SOHA's Homelessness Committee has dedicated its efforts at understanding and working to mitigate exactly this issue. To be sure, some of this population is served by hard-working and dedicated politicians and non-profits who work with these homeless at the ground level and can sometimes, after extensive and repeated efforts, convince someone to "go inside". But often that is not the case for various reasons (mental illness and drug and alcohol addiction top among them).

So, what can be done? Can we find a way to forcibly remove people from the streets and lock them up? Put simply: no ... we cannot. First, the law does not permit it. Second, that is not a solution to the problem. That process fosters the "revolving door" approach that even the police have lost interest in pursuing.

No matter how we slice it, the first part of the solution is money. Without funds, we cannot harness the resources needed to proactively address this problem. Of course, we have been throwing money at the problem for many years and no matter what incremental reductions in this population are achieved, the homeless in this category continue to suffer on the streets and their presence continues to drain the sense of community that we have worked so hard to build here in Sherman Oaks.

There has been much attention paid to the political position that asserts that homelessness can be solved with housing. Again, that is true for most homeless but not all. In order to solve this issue, it seems, we will need a combination of love, money, grace, new laws, resources and (yes) housing – and we'll address all these at our May Homelessness Roundtable.

DOES LOCAL CONTROL MATTER?

Everywhere we turn people are talking about "local control". What does that really mean? The California Constitution recognizes the right for cities to choose between being a Charter City or a General Law City. LA is a Charter City. Therefore, it operates under its own city charter that has the force and effect of state law regarding municipal affairs. Land use has always been under the control of the city because it is considered a municipal affair.

Because the state declared a housing crisis of "statewide concern", the state took control over Charter Cities' land use, forcing cities to zone more land for housing. Cities no longer have control over how and where their cities grow, how high or dense a development becomes, whether the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA, one of the most progressive environmental protections any state has enacted) is enforced, and whether public input is considered. Through the numerous state laws being enacted, the right to control a city's future is determined more by developers and the state than the city itself.

The loss of local control over housing starts with the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA). It is prepared by the state and identifies the state's housing needs based on projected state population growth, vacancy rates, and household overcrowding during an eight-year cycle. Each city is allocated their housing numbers and needs to show the state they have enough zoning to accommodate their mandated housing.

The RHNA numbers allocated to each city for this current cycle are so high – more than double the previous cycle in most cases – that many cities could not find enough zoning to achieve their state-mandated housing goals. Not meeting these

goals opened cities to monetary penalties and their right to control their own development. Many cities have questioned their RHNA numbers, and a state audit was conducted. The findings were damming. The RHNA methodology was found to be flawed and the data not accurate. Independent researchers weighed in and stated that the housing numbers were mistakenly double counted, causing the massive increase in "needed" housing units. But the state has not backed down and instead threatens cities with major penalties if they do not meet the RHNA requirement within the next 8 years (2021-2029).

Will cities ever regain their right to plan their own communities? With a pending lawsuit and a possible ballot initiative to regain local control, we will find out. We will keep you updated on their progress.



AIRPORTS UPDATE

Van Nuys Airport "VNY" Update by Nancy Sogoian – Airport issues are complex, technical and involve local, state and federal entities, including LAWA (LA World Airports, which manages LAX, VNY, and other airports), BOAC (Board of Airport Commissioners), and FAA (Federal Aviation Association, which determines flight patterns, hours, and more). VNY's Bonseph Helinet proposal ostensibly modernizes and expands an old hanger facility used for medical, TV news, and other helicopter services. However, Bonseph Helinet's proposed lease does NOT specifically preclude the rebuilt hanger from housing (or flying) jets, and therefore omission = permission for expansion of jet flights at VNY.



Bonseph is a builder of hangars, terminals, and office space which partnered with Aeroplex Group (property management services) to complete the VNY Bonseph North Facility in 2021, exclusively occupied by Sun Jets – which expanded flights from VNY.

Helinet Aviation provides a variety of helicopter services including charter – and boasts a new 6-seat, twin-engine helicopter. While we support modernization of the old hangar site, this proposal opens the door to increased jet flights and more charter helicopters. Our CD4 Council Office agrees Bonseph Helinet's proposal in current form is a back-door

loophole for expansion of flights and believes the lease in current form should not be approved by City Council. Stay tuned ...

Burbank Airport "BUR" Update by Jay Weitzler – LA GETS A "WIN" IN THE BUR TERMINAL CASE! Last month, the Ninth Circuit Court directed the FAA to address deficiencies in its construction noise analysis, in its cumulative impacts analysis, and the resulting deficiencies in its Environmental Impacts analysis. Though only a partial win since it dealt only with construction noise for Burbank's new proposed terminal and not issues directly related to aircraft noise, pollution and resulting health problems, it will at least delay construction of the new terminal since they need to file a satisfactory EIR. There is no question that a new terminal will increase operations and make the noise and pollution much worse than it is now. We still must deal with these very serious issues, and we will keep you informed of new developments.

UPDATE FROM OUR COUNCIL OFFICE

First, I'd like to extend my gratitude to SOHA and Vice President Bob Anderson for allowing me to share updates about our office's work in their newsletter! This month I'm excited to discuss our ongoing work to combat homelessness in Sherman Oaks.

When I took office in December 2020, my first priority was addressing the homelessness crisis that had been worsening for several years – there were over a dozen larger street encampments in the district along our sidewalks at the time. In response, we built the largest Homelessness Team of any Council office and got to work bringing the inhabitants of those encampments indoors.

Several of our Encampment-to-Home efforts occurred in or near Sherman Oaks, including the Coldwater Canyon/101 underpass, the Van Nuys Blvd/101 underpass, and Fruitland/Ventura. Through our work, we housed every resident at those locations last year.

Our most recent Encampment-to-Home program has also been in Sherman Oaks – this time in the Library Square and Van Nuys/Ventura Boulevard area. Because of unique needs here, we convened regular meetings with the Mayor's office, County Supervisor Lindsay Horvath's office, LAHSA, the County Department of Mental Health, and local service providers to coordinate resources. Our Homelessness Team was on the ground there almost every day. One by one, people were enrolled in case management, matched with shelter, and moved indoors.

In just a few weeks, we've seen real results. A significant number of people experiencing homelessness have moved into shelter already, resulting in four oversized vehicles and multiple tents being removed from the street. And the work continues – more people are scheduled to go indoors this week. I'm extremely grateful to our city and county partners, the neighbors whose input and patience have helped this work be successful, and the members of SOHA's Homelessness Committee who contributed their time and energy. Through partnerships like these, last year we were able to achieve the first reduction in street homelessness in Council District 4 since 2016.

Ending homelessness is possible – but it takes resources, patience, and hard work. You have my word that we'll continue to work tirelessly until nobody in the district is without shelter. NEIGHBORHOOD COMINGS AND GOINGS

Spring has arrived, and it seems like summer is just around the corner. Flowers are blooming and filling the air with sweet scents. In addition to the traditional springtime treats, there is a new taste treat in the neighborhood – Mrs Chips Cookies. The shop, located on Sepulveda Boulevard near Whole Foods Market, opened in mid-March, although they have been selling their cookies online for years. KTLA featured them as a TOP PICK for the holidays in 2019. It has taken three years

for them to open their first brick-and-mortar bakery. Six different types of Chocolate Chip cookies are available, along with a Nutella, an Oatmeal Raisin, and a Snickerdoodle Chocolate Chip cookie. Customers can try one or buy a box of these delicious cookies, which are crisp on the outside and chewy on the inside. They are all hand-topped with Maldon Sea Salt flakes from England. Mrs Chips Cookies also sell by the dozen or two-dozen, and they serve coffee as well. They offer a vanilla ice cream sundae for those looking for a different kind of sweet treat. Our daughter is a vegetarian and when she was younger it was sometimes hard finding a restaurant that she loved. One of her favorite places was Kung Pao China Bistro where we would go to have the vegetarian orange shrimp. They had been open for many years but sadly Covid hit them hard, and they shut their doors a couple years ago. In their old location is now a new totally meatless option ... For those who love tacos and are looking for a vegan option, Sugar Taco on Ventura Blvd is worth a visit. After successfully launching their flagship plant-based eatery on Melrose four years ago,



this vegan Mexican restaurant features delicious tacos, fantastic nachos, and tasty agua frescas. Check out the Churros for dessert and don't miss Taco Tuesdays! Female-owned and the owner says it was always her goal to empower women investors. The menu is great and it's a nice addition to the neighborhood. My wife, my vegetarian daughter, and I went there last night for dinner. We all had the 3-taco plate with rice and beans along with a margarita. And of course, the churro donut for dessert! We all loved it and will be going back! (https://sugartaco.com/)

Boneyard Bistro on Ventura Boulevard has been one of the top restaurants in Sherman Oaks for the past 20 years. The barbecue is consistently excellent, with options like brisket, tri-tip, baby back ribs, pulled pork, and chicken. Last week, I attended a meeting hosted by the owner, Aaron, who provided food from Boneyard. During our conversation, I discovered that Monday nights are Fried Chicken Night at Boneyard. It's a sensation with one-half fried chicken served either Nashville Hot or regular. Sides include coleslaw, baked beans, potato salad, fried Mac and Cheese, or fries. I highly recommend it and suggest getting there early since they often sell out by 7 pm. (https://www.boneyardbistro.com/)

Due to the pandemic and many people working from home, many large companies are scaling back unused office space. For example, the Berkshire Hathaway office at Fulton and Ventura has been nearly empty for the last year, and has therefore been closed. There's still a Berkshire Hathaway office in Sherman Oaks on Ventura - just west of Hazeltine near Mendocino Farms.

Last but definitely not least is my final Coming and Going – the illegal billboard is back on the south wall of the old Hamburger Hamlet Building on Van Nuys Boulevard just north of Ventura Boulevard. Now as you drive on Ventura Boulevard you can look up and see another illegal sign advertising Coke. SOHA reports this every time to the Council Office and then building and safety sends out a letter and after six months to a year the sign comes down. Meanwhile the building owner collects hundreds of thousands of dollars from these illegal signs, and at most gets a misdemeanor citation from the city. This is happening all over the city and the city does nothing to fix it. They would rather have us taxpayers pay more in taxes to help fight the homeless, the potholes, and all the other issues than doing their jobs. In any other crime when does the criminal get to keep their ill-gotten loot?
