Art Uptown Gallery will present Dion Kurczek's new fluid abstract paintings in the solo exhibit Fluid Visions through April 26. An artist's reception will be held on First Friday, April 5, from 6 to 9 p.m. at the gallery, 1367 Main St., Sarasota.

Whereas many artists attempt to capture nature's intricate beauty on canvas using traditional tools brushes and palette knives — Dion takes a different approach, preferring to minimize direct application of his mediums. In his Fluid Visions exhibition, he combines brilliantly colored inks, oils, and other chemicals, guiding these materials on a  $\,$ smooth panel surface to produce striking compositions of light, darkness, and color. The resulting work is then coated in a layer of glass-like resin. This layer highlights the intricate details of the piece, as well as enhancing its contrast and vibrancy. Each painting evokes a specific feeling or image, which informs its title. But what you might discover in each Fluid Vision is limited only by your imagination.

- April 15 at 2 p.m.: The Poetry Book Club led by Georgia Court. This month we're discussing So Far So Good: Final Poems: 2014-2018 by Ursula K. Le Guin. Purchase of the book at Bookstorel required for participation. Legendary author Ursula K. Le Guin was lauded by millions for her groundbreaking science fiction novels, but she began as a poet, and wrote across genres for her entire career. In this clarifying and sublime collection—completed shortly before her death in 2018—Le Guin is unflinching in the face of mortality, and full of wonder for the mysteries beyond. Redolent of the lush natural beauty of the Pacific Northwest, with rich sounds playfully echoing myth and nursery rhyme, So Far So Good bookends a long, daring, and prolific career.
- April 16 at 11 a.m.: The Mysteries to Die For Book Club led by Elsie Souza. They're discussing Those Who Walk Away by Patricia Highsmith. Originally published in 1967, this is vintage Highsmith. Purchase of the book at Bookstore1 required

for participation. Ray Garrett, a wealthy young American living in Europe, is grieving over the death of his wife, Peggy. Ray is at a loss for why she would take her own life, but Peggy's father, Ed Coleman, a painter, has no such uncertainty—he blames Ray completely. Late one night in Rome, Coleman shoots Ray at point-blank range. He thinks he's had his revenge, but Ray survives and follows Coleman and his wealthy girlfriend to Venice. So begins an eerie game of cat and mouse.

■ April 19 at 1 p.m.: The Short and Satisfying Book Club led by Georgia Court. They're discussing Glaxo by Hernan Ronsino. Glaxo is a chilling novel of betrayal, romance, and murder, from a major Latin American writer being published in English for the first time. In a derelict town in Argentina's pampa, a decades-old betrayal simmers among a group of friends. Spinning through a series of voices and timelines, Glaxo reveals a chilling story of four boys who grow up breaking horses and idolizing John Wayne, only to become adults embroiled in illicit romances, government death squads, and, ultimately, murder. Around them, the city falls apart.

Both an austere drama and a suspenseful whodunit, Glaxo crackles with tension and mystery. And it marks the stunning English-language debut of a major Latin American writer.

In this high-spirited, kaleidoscopic story, key moments of Iranian history, politics, and culture punctuate stories of family drama and triumph. Yet it is Kimiâ herself—punk-rock aficionado, storyteller extraordinaire, a Scheherazade of our time, and above all a modern woman divided between family traditions and her own "disorientalization"--who forms the heart of this bestselling and beloved novel.
