MINUTES OF REGULAR SESSION OF COUNCIL WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 11, 2017

Regular session of Borough Council convened at 7:30 pm. Present were Councilors Melissa Morgan, Chris Ponchak, Tim Sloss, Janice Matyasovsky, and Larry Sikorski; Mayor Jane Weigand; Solicitor Matt Racunas; and Engineer Don Glenn.

PUBLIC COMMENTS.

Tara Marie Eiben, 302 Owens Avenue, said she had sent three letters to Chief Riley. Officer Ray Johnson said she is harassing the police. Ms. Eiben said she called one time for the Chief, and she didn't want to deal with Officer Johnson. Ms. Eiben said she was cited and had to go to the Magistrate. Officer Johnson lied, and now she has to pay the fine. Mr. Racunas said council cannot comment; that is a personnel issue. Ms. Eiben said the Magistrate told her to come and address council. She had two thefts on her property, and it seems like nobody cares. Mr. Sikorski said the Mayor will address the police about it.

Jesse Lape, 1027 Glenn Avenue, said that Mr. Glenn met with him about the pipe the borough will be installing that he can tap into. Mr. Glenn said it has all been resolved. There has been no change in the scope of work. Mr. Lape thought there would be two catch basins installed, but Mr. Glenn said one. Mr. Lape said the sanitary sewer line in the Port Vue section is still exposed; the McKeesport Municipal Authority owns it, but is not fixing it. Mr. Lape doesn't think it is a good idea to sell our sewer system to the McKeesport Municipal Authority.

Anne Marie Sowa, 2900 Valley Street, asked why there are cross-walks; are they for people to be protected? Mr. Sikorski said he believes it is state law that traffic yields to pedestrians. Mrs. Sowa said she was told by the Chief that there have to be signs for the police to enforce it. Mrs. Sowa said it is a huge problem; the police can't be at every stop to watch the children every morning. How are we going to enforce it? Mr. Sloss suggested that they put the standing signs back that were once used on the cross-walks. Mrs. Weigand agreed and said she will talk to the Chief about it. Mrs. Sowa said they have talked about the cat issue for three months; she still has six on her property. Mr. Sikorski said that has been solved tonight at the Work Session. Mrs. Morgan asked if she has called 9-1-1 about it. Mrs. Sowa said she was told by a police officer that she had to pay for the cage, just in case it is someone's pet. Mr. Ponchak said to call 9-1-1. The Animal Control Officer will come out and get them.

SOLICITOR RACUNAS'S REPORT.

Mr. Racunas presented Ordinance 2017-04, adopting the Code of Ordinances. Mrs. Matyasovsky made a motion to adopt the ordinance. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ponchak and passed unanimously.

Mr. Racunas presented the Second Amendment to the Municipal Authority Agreement, and called for a motion to accept it, subject to our proposed language changes, and their approval. Mrs. Matyasovsky made a motion to accept the Second Amendment. The motion was seconded by Mr. Sloss and passed unanimously.

ENGINEER GLENN'S REPORT.

RFPs for several projects were sent out, and Mr. Glenn called for a motion to accept the following RFPs:

For the Liberty Way storm sewer, the lowest bidder was State Pipe at a cost of \$265 per hour for hi-pressure cleaning and \$230 per hour for light cleaning & televising. Mrs.

Matyasovsky made a motion to accept the bid from State Pipe. The motion was seconded by Mr. Sloss and passed unanimously.

For the Glenn Avenue concrete slurry mix, the lowest bidder was Lawson Excavating at a cost of \$4,290. Mrs. Morgan made a motion to accept the bid from Lawson Excavating. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ponchak and passed unanimously.

For the stone rip-rap restoration of the embankment along Glenn Avenue, the lowest bidder was Murin and Murn at a cost of \$52 per ton; there is a total of 336 ton. Mr. Ponchak made a motion to accept the bid from Murin and Murn. The motion was seconded by Mr. Sloss and passed unanimously.

Mr. Glenn asked if council desires to proceed with the PennVest application for the loan to repair the sewer deficiencies. The application will require input from the Borough Secretary, Glenn Engineering, and Solicitor Racunas to electronically file it. Mrs. Matyasovsky made a motion to proceed with the application. The motion was seconded by Mr. Sloss. When roll call was taken, Mrs. Morgan initially "passed" her turn. The motion passed by a vote of 4-0-1, with Mr. Sloss, Mrs. Matyasovsky, Mr. Sikorski, and Mrs. Morgan voting yes, and Mr. Ponchak voting "present". Mrs. Morgan said that it's not that she is for keeping the system or selling it, but there are still a lot of questions and they wanted to hear back from PA American Water. Mr. Glenn explained that Act 537 requirements must be met by December 31 of this year, which is not going to happen, so they have applied to DEP for an extension. If the deadline is not met, the borough would be under a consent order. Mr. Glenn said that council has done the right thing. This will only continue the process for the loan and possible grant. Until then, council can still reject the loan.

There was no Old Business, New Business, or Correspondence to discuss.

Mrs. Matyasovsky made a motion to accept the typed minutes from the Regular Session on September 13, 2017. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Morgan and passed unanimously.

A motion to adjourn was made by Mrs. Morgan and seconded by Mr. Sloss. All were in favor and the meeting adjourned at 8:00 pm.
