

## **Hugh Brotherton Pioneer Player**

## Pre-Swing Motion Creates Added Bat Speed

Here's a quick tip for improving your hitting before you step into the batter's box: Add a pre-swing action so the bat will feel lighter allowing you to swing faster, be able to wait longer, and be quicker to the ball with more power.

So what makes the bat feel heavy and to swing slower? As we know the majority of the bat's weight is in the barrel region. The farther the bat barrel is away from your hands, the heavier the bat will feel.

One way to make the bat feel heavy is to place it straight back behind your head in a level position. Don't let the bat rest on the shoulder when assuming your ready position to hit. Again this heavier feeling is due to the majority of weight being toward the end and particularly if the bat is end-loaded. To swing at the ball from this position requires a large overcoming of inertia of the weight of the bat.

Hitting experts refer to this pre-swing phenomenon as the unweighting of the bat that comes prior to the actual swing. Others may see this action as the proverbial hitch in the swing or a timing mechanism which sometimes carries a bad connotation.

There are two basic ways to make the

bat feel lighter before you swing:

- 1) Moving your bat to an almost vertical position unweights the bat,
- 2) When striding forward into the ball with a weight transfer; this also unweights the bat as it's in motion moving forward toward the pitcher.

Understand that a batter can start in the flat behind the head bat position as long as when during the pre-swing the bat is tipped up toward a vertical position. This action will make the bat feel lighter during the batter's windup motion. The pre-swing movement makes the bat feel lighter due to the center of mass of the bat being brought closer to your body when it's in the vertical position.

Here's a real life example to help understand how the bat feels heavier when the barrel is held horizontally: Try holding and extending a straw broom out in front of your body while gripping it from the end of the handle. Then ask a friend to place a small brick on the broom's straw area while you're still holding the broom. You'll get a real sense of the extra weightiness than just holding the brick in your hand.

When taking your swing try and create a rhythm by waggling the bat around and moving it to nearly a vertical position.

This action is performed as you wind up and deliver the bat to the incoming ball. Also, don't step away from your hands when you stride, but let your hands travel with your body toward the pitcher. This technique also is putting the bat in motion overcoming stationary inertia.

Remember, a stationary holding position of the bat without the pre-swing activity will make it much more difficult to get the bat up to your maximum bat speed as you're battling the bat's inertia properties. Performing this pre-swing action and technique will allow you to actually swing faster as you free up the dead weight of the bat. Increasing bat speed will add exit speed to your hits making for more base hits and long bombs.

So, if you want to swing faster, you must free up the barrel by waggling it like in golf before address and bringing it to near vertical during the pre-swing. The purpose here is to get your bat moving before you begin your body rotation which begins after the front foot has landed. We don't want to begin the swing to the ball from a complete bat standstill which will result in a slower swing to the ball.

He has played senior softball for 17 years starting with Dan Smith Softball out of California. He then played with the Florida Crush. He continued his Senior Softball career with the Carolina Cobras.

In 2005 James joined

Countrywide, which evolved into Turn-Two and then Hamel's Superior Softball.

#### Mel Schiebel Pioneer Player

Schiebel has played senior softball for 18 years and currently is with the Sun City Sidewinders.

He was a softball ambassador to Germany in 2002 and has been recognized in various tournaments with 31 medals, five World Series rings and two watches. He has played for several teams in Arizona and helped raise \$252,000 to build a club house and scorers booth, helped acquire building materials recruited sponsors to raise money for league operations.

His manager said Mel is a consistent .650 -. 750 hitter and "most of his hits are for extra bases. He has an uncanny ability to find the gaps. He is a clutch player and has won more games for us than any other player."

## **Financial Choices Change With Age**

If there's one thing that becomes abundantly clear as we get older, time just seems to fly by. And while we're still in September, it won't be long before the holidays are here. And then we'll be rapidly rolling into 2017.

The first of the year is usually the time when people start thinking about their finances ... and all the changes they'll be making. But as often as not, they lose their momentum as they recuperate from the holidays.

For that reason, I think now is a good time to take a

look at your investments and to have a plan of action ready once the new year arrives.

The first thing I'd look at is your 401(k) investment plan. Whether you're still working or not, your 401(k) needs annual attention. I don't know how many people I've talked to over the years that opened a 401(k) at work, made some thoughtful investment decisions and have never made another change.

Some of these people have several hundred thousand dollars in their plans, but haven't made any change whatsoever in 20 years or more. The danger here, investment advisers say, is that while those investment choices you made way back when were good for you at the time, you're a LOT older now and likely don't want to be in the same investments today. If, for instance, you decided to allocate 60 to 80 percent of your 401(k) to stock funds when you were 45, you most likely want to take a far more conservative approach now that you're 65.

So what you need to do is to look at your last statement and see exactly where you

The driving force is the determination of each association – LVSSA and SSUSA – to produce the biggest and best tournament in the sport.


Why?



ing healthier, happier lives.

What is the secret?

The elixir appears to contain large measures of exercise, good diet and a dash of just the right genes.

Surprisingly, the genes associated with longer life have less to do with bodily functions than with human thought, according to the Wellderly Study by the Scripps Translational Science Institute (STSI) in San Diego.

"We looked at entire genome, trying to find sites that are statistically different. The sites that showed big difference were linked to cognitive functions," said Ali Torkamani, a STSI researcher.

"The brain-body connection could be a direct biological link, or it could be the case that because the brain is functioning well, you take better care of yourself," said Torkamani.

The Scripps research into aging well has become increasingly important as the population as a whole lives longer.

The average American is living almost 30 years longer than a century ago. In 1912, the average life expectancy was 51.5 years. In 2012, the most recent study, the average American lived to be 78.8 years old.

But living longer in itself has created misery for many elderly Americans suffering from chronic diseases as they age, which has been the impetus for a raft of research similar to the Wellderly study.

And those studies are increasingly trying to find the secret of a rare breed – like

91-year-old John Rawlings.

Rawlings pitches and plays second base three days a week in San Diego, including Saturdays with "the youngsters in their early 60s."

"I come from a family of old people," said Rawlings. "My aunt lived to be 110, another lived to be 109, and my brother is 99."

Rawlings, who was part of the Scripps Welldery study, plays rover and shortstop for the 85 Southwest Stars 85+ team.

"The genetics are there, but keeping yourself in shape is very important," he said. To Rawlings, that means playing ball on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Diet is a different story.

"I'm an old farmer, I like corn on the cob and steak," said Rawlings, who was inducted into the National Senior Softball Hall of Fame in 2009. "Stay away from sugar, but salt is OK...really it is just important to have a rounded diet."

Rawlings has earned the respect of both researchers and the many in San Diego for his positive attitude and senior softball playing ability. Fittingly, he will be throwing out the first pitch for the Padres when they play the Diamondbacks on Sept. 20.

# The Best and Worst Cities to Retire

#### **Softball News Report**

As researchers study the reasons behind long, healthy lives, it is interesting to look at where seniors retire.

Some states are not surprising: Florida not only has one of the highest densities, but three of the top four "Best Cities to Retire" are in Florida.

Orlando is at the top of WalletHub's list, which judged cities based on affordability, quality of life, health care and availability of recreational opportunities.

Tampa rated the Number 2 spot and Miami was Number 4. (Scottsdale, Ariz., rated Number 3).

The American Community Survey which ranked where the overall 65+ population in America lived, contained some surprises. Seniors were not all flocking to the South. In addition to Florida, the highest densities of seniors were in West Virginia and Maine.

The American Community Survey showed where most seniors lived, but most studies have not rated where the most healthy seniors live.

One indication of where the population of healthy, active seniors live can be found by studying where most senior softball players live (See Charts on Page 1).

Using that measurement, California is – by far – the Eden of senior softball, with almost three times more senior softball players than the next state, Florida.

Florida, Arizona and Texas come in second, third and fourth and have nearly the same number of senior players.

At the other end of the spectrum, with the fewest players, are Germanay, Maine and the Yukon Territory.

are putting your money, both new funds going in and your old funds that you've had for some time. For seniors, it's important to know just how much risk you are willing to take and if you're 50 percent or more in equities, you might want to move some of your money to fixed-income investments that should have less risk and less market fluctuation.

It's important to make such changes...if needed... when you want to do it and

not when the stock market suddenly moves sharply in one direction or the other.

And while you are looking over your 401(k), you should also be looking at any other investment funds that you own. You want to make your investment decisions in correlation with each other and not treat them as totally isolated from each other.

For instance, if you have \$250,000 in your 401(k) and it's all invested in stocks, you might be OK if you have the same amount of money invested in fixed-income securities in your regular investment account, IF you truly want a 50-50 mix of the two investment strategies. However, I would think most investors would feel safer having each account in the balance they want just in case something

goes wrong.

If you decide that your old investment strategy no longer works for you, it's a nice quiet time of year when you can carefully go over your investment options. You have plenty of time to make an appointment with your financial adviser to let them know that you want to make some changes and to see what they recommend.

Moving money around quickly is never a good strategy. You want to take your time to see exactly what you might want to do and to be able to study any new investment options as well as to take a careful look at how your current investments have done.

One additional thing to consider is what retirees can expect from Social Security for 2017. The experts are warning that if inflation continues to be low, there may be little or no automatic increase in monthly retirement and disability payments.

The Social Security Act provides for an automatic boost in benefits if inflation as measured by what's called the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners increases.

If you'll recall, last year the Social Security Administration didn't give an annual cost of living increase due to low inflation rates for the first time since 2010. While Social Security benefits have increased by 3.9 percent a year since 1975, they've only gone up 2.3 percent since 2000.



Last year, teams from 42 states (including Alaska and Hawaii), from four Canadian provinces and Guam competed in Senior Softball's largest tournament ever.


This year, WMC officials are estimating that about 550 teams again will flock to this gambling mecca.
