### **Sunday Reflection – Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time**

What is the message of the parable of the vineyard (Mt.21:33-43)? Jesus' story about an absentee landlord and his not-so-good tenants would have made sense to his audience. The hills of Galilee were lined with numerous vineyards, and it was quite common for the owners to let out their estates to tenants. Many did it for the sole purpose of collecting rent.

Readings for Next Sunday, October 11, 2020 Isaiah 25:6-10a Philippians 4:12-14, 19-20 Matthew 22:1-10

Why did this parable cause offense to the scribes and Pharisees? It contained both a prophetic message and a warning. Isaiah had spoken of the house of Israel as "the vineyard of the Lord" (Isaiah 5:7). Jesus' listeners would have likely understood this parable as referring to God's dealing with a stubborn and rebellious people.

This parable speaks to us today as well. It richly conveys some important truths about God and the way he deals with his people. First, it tells us of God's generosity and trust. The vineyard is well equipped with everything the tenants need. The owner went away and left the vineyard in the hands of the tenants. God, likewise, trusts us enough to give us freedom to run life as we choose. This parable also tells us of God's patience and justice. Not once, but many times he forgives the tenants their debts. But while the tenants take advantage of the owner's patience, his judgment and justice prevail in the end. Let us pray today: Lord Jesus Christ, we thank you for all the benefits which you have given us. May we know you more clearly, love you more dearly, follow you more nearly, and live according to your holy will.

## **Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary - October 7**

The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, celebrated on October 7, was instituted by Pope St. Pius V in thanksgiving for the great naval victory over the Turks at the battle of Lepanto on this day in the year 1570, a favor due to the recitation of the Rosary. This victory saved Europe from being overrun by the forces of Islam.

Lepanto, perhaps the most complete victory ever gained over the Ottoman Empire, on October 7, 1571, is commemorated by the invocation "Help of Christians," inserted in the Litany of Loretto. At Belgrade the Turks were defeated on the Feast of Our Lady ad Nives in 1716. A second victory



gained that year on the Octave of the Assumption determined Pope Clement XI to command the Feast of the Rosary to be celebrated by the universal Church. Leo XIII added the invocation "Queen of the most Holy Rosary, pray for us," to the Litany of Loretto. The Feast is in reality a great festival of thanksgiving for the signal and countless benefits bestowed on Christendom through the Rosary of our blessed Queen.

In modern times successive popes have urged the faithful to pray the Rosary. It is a form of contemplative prayer, mental and vocal prayer, which brings down God's blessing on the Church. It is a biblically inspired prayer which is centered on meditation on the salvific mysteries of Christ in union with Mary, who was so closely associated with her Son in his redeeming activity.

- The birthstone for October is the pink tourmaline and the opal; the traditional flower for October is the marigold.
- Special occasions in October include Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Fire Prevention Week (week of 10/4), Columbus Day (10/12), National Boss's Day (10/16) and Halloween (10/31).

## **Upcoming Sacraments Course**

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has partnered with Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation (VLCFF) to offer internet-based, distance -learning programs that support both catechists and those seeking to deepen their faith.

The upcoming five-week course will run from October 18 through November 21 and is a look at the history and theology of the sacraments. Beginning with a look at the Liturgy, we will then explore Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation (the sacraments of Initiation). We will then look at the sacraments of healing, that is, the Sacrament of Reconciliation and the Sacrament of the Sick. Finally, we will examine the sacraments of communion, also known as the Sacrament of Marriage and the Sacrament of Holy Orders.

If you are a catechist, work with the RCIA, couples preparing for marriage, parents preparing to baptize their children, or are an adult interested in deepening your faith, please join fellow Catholics from across the Diocese as we learn more about our Tradition.

This course is a hybrid model. It is composed of both weekly live two-hour Zoom lectures as well as a rich variety of online course materials and discussion experiences.

This course is underwritten by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston who pays 100% of the tuition and the cost of the books associated with the course. The course instructor is Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu.
