ENCOURGE your children

It's August! What are the important days to celebrate? Here is what I learned: S'mores Day is Aug. 10; Best Friends Day is Aug. 15; Cupcake Day is Aug. 19 and Bacon Day is Aug. 31.

It is also time for school to start again and for taking advantage of all the back-toschool specials to get ready for the year.

Our students — our children — and the learning process certainly took a hit because of the pandemic. Many students around the country learned in front of a computer screen. There were also students who attended in-person classes and followed protocols to be together in school.

So what is ahead for us this coming year? I asked our district expert, DJ Schult, who serves as my assistant working with our schools and educators, for his thoughts. He has experience as a father of three high school graduates and educator, including 10 years as a Lutheran school teacher, seven years as a principal and eight years as our education executive. I asked DJ what he sees as the top challenges coming into the 2021-22 school year. Here are his thoughts:

- ► Mental health: "Teachers are exhausted, principals are burned out and students have been disrupted. How will we meet all the needs?"
- ► Our methods and practices: "We have learned some things that can improve student achievement (less structure, more projects) but will we go back to what we always did?"
- ► Navigating social justice: "So much is happening with race and social issues. Are we ready to help our students understand it all with a Christian worldview?"

I also asked DJ what would his advice be to parents (and grandparents) on what should be their priorities for the school year. Here is his list:

▶ Reduce the chaos:

- Develop a family schedule for the week and review it every Sunday.
- Avoid overscheduling events.
- Find a place for daily items: keys, backpack, lunchbox, shoes and dirty clothes
- ▶ Realize quality time and quantity time matter:
 - Be where you are.
 - Ask questions and listen. Repeat.
 - Intentionally infuse your Christian faith into daily conversations.
 - Say "I love you" the first and last time you see them each day.
- ► Encourage, encourage, encourage:
 - The world will not do this for you.
 - Pray with them and for them, without ceasing.

The theme for National Lutheran Schools Week this year (and the 2022 National Youth Gathering) is "In All Things," based on Col. 1:15-20. The apostle Paul wrote:

In him all things hold together.

This certainly will be a theme to remind our children that Jesus cares for them and the world around them, and that He will walk and be with them.

May God be with our children and their parents and our teachers in the new school year. Please include them in your prayers.

Katie is a member of the Army ROTC program at the University of Wisconsin–Stevens Point and the Wisconsin Army National Guard. In October, she learned that her unit had the possibility of being deployed to the Middle East in the spring of 2021. Katie had a whirlwind of thoughts, emotions and decisions to sort out. Then after several days of intensive training at Fort McCoy in March, the orders were given to her unit that they would be indeed deploying at the end of the month for at least 12 to 14 months.

'In All Things'

LCMS School Ministry has released the 2021–2022 edition of Chapel Talks for Lutheran Schools, an annual resource designed

to assist Lutheran schools with weekly chapel.

Under the theme "In All Things," the resource includes devotions for every week of the school year as well as for Christmas. The theme, which will also be used during National Lutheran Schools Week and at the 2022 LCMS Youth Gathering, is based on Col. 1:15–20:

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities — all things were created through him and for him. And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together.

And he is the head of the body,



the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross.

Drawing on the theme, each devotion is organized around various types of "things":

- "First Things" are introductory thoughts or activities that connect to the week's theme;
- "The Main Thing" shares Law and Gospel exploration of the text and brings Christ and His redemptive work to the students;

- "All Things in Jesus' Name" offers a petition relevant to the theme; and
- "More Things" provides suggestions for carrying the devotion beyond the chapel setting through additional activities, further reflection and study.

Chapel Talks was written by the Rev. Bob Riggert, a former Lutheran teacher, principal, parish pastor and district education executive who has written the last seven editions of the resource. It includes a new hymn by Jeffrey Burkhart, "In All Things Jesus Christ Is Found," sung to the tune WAS GOTT TUD ("What God Ordains Is Always Good," *LSB* 760).

Riggert writes in the introduction: "'In All Things' is a confession of Christ's redemptive work ... a celebration of the Christ for youth, children and adults of the church ... [and] an opportunity for Lutheran schools to worship Christ in all things."
