STATEHOUSE – there are regular tours every hour between 10:00 am and 3:00pm weekdays.



BASIC WSCO MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION:

Membership Benefits include a subscription to WSCO's newsletter, *Dragon Tales*, a vote at the Annual Meeting (except children under 16), advance notice of WSCO events, a membership roster, and great new friends. Note - to present an item for discussion at a Board meeting, arrangements must be made in advance with the current President.

CENTRAL OHIO WELSH CELEBRATE

Brilliant sunshine, reflecting the oranges and golds of Ohio Fall, provided a beautiful backdrop as many with a Welsh connection gathered and lifted their voices in song the weekend of October 15 and 16, 2016.

Sponsored by the Welsh Society of Central Ohio the Celebration was held on the campus of Central College Presbyterian Church in Westerville, Ohio. Trefor John Williams from Trefor, Wales, now residing with his wife, Barbara, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was guest conductor for the weekend.

On Saturday afternoon, many gathered in the more than century old chapel for a Ysgol Gan. Under the direction of Mr. Williams, with his great skill as music director and educator, the very best that voices could offer emerged. Pianist Cynthia Williamson served as talented accompanist for the event.

The resulting hwyl from the Ysgol Gan flowed into Sunday afternoon as a large crowd filled the main sanctuary of Central College Presbyterian for the annual Gymanfa Ganu. With Trefor Williams conducting and James Hildreth, one of the country's premier organist accompanying, voices were raised in fourpart harmony and praise. Special instrumental music was provided by James Hildreth on piano and his wife and flautist, Valerie Adams. Together they perform as *Duo Celeste*. It was a stunningly beautiful afternoon for all in attendance.

An abundant Te Bach followed the Gymanfa. This years' Te Bach' was particularly special. Those gathered, lovingly and joyfully, celebrated the life and service of Peggy Speakman. Peggy, who passed in early September, orchestrated many, many Te Bachs, locally and nationally, through the years.

A Child's Summer in Wales, Redux

I grew up in an Air Force family, and my mother was from Llandoverly, Carmarthanshire, Wales. Because my father wanted to enable her spending time with her family, he would seek assignment in the UK, or in Germany, so that she was close enough to visit.

We moved to Hale, Cheshire, in 1956, and I was fortunate to spend most of the next several summers in Llandoverly, staying with my grandfather, but spending most of my time with cousins.

I have identical twin grandsons who were 12 last summer, and, having just retired, I was fortunate to be able to take them on a trip to Wales at the end of the summer. Because they live in NYC, where school does not start until after Labor Day, we were able to take the trip in late August-early September. We were also able to stay with my cousin, Philip Williams, and they got the flavor of everyday life, rather than staying in hotels and eating all meals in restaurants.

We spent most of our time in the area around Llandoverly, including the Brecon Beacons, which are close. We went to the Brecon Beacons National Park, and we rode on narrow gauge railroad with a steam engine. We toured the Big Pit, a national park in a coal mine, and went through Llanelly House, restored to magnificence. We toured caves, Cardiff Castle, and the local hills. One of my perennial favorites is Carreg Cennan, once thought to be the most impregnable castle in Europe.

I am going to be giving a talk about this trip at the St. David's Day Celebration, and showing pictures. We were fortunate to have had lovely weather, so come to see my pictures of rural Wales.

Study Abroad in Wales

Coming from Southeastern Ohio and the prevailing influence of Welsh culture surrounding me as I aged, I began to form a bond with Wales. This was the main reason I decided to study abroad at the University of Wales Trinity Saint David (UWTSD) through the University of Rio Grande – not only because of the diversity that is experienced through studying abroad, but also that it was a study abroad in *Wales*. On my first day in Carmarthen, I stared up at the bright, yawning sunrise and understood something different about the sky.



Friendships were made in those first few days of arrival. International students clustered together, sharing hopes for what adventures may be taken during our stay in Wales. As I rode the bus headed for Llansteffan Castle, piled in beside other students from foreign places, there was the knowledge that by the time I returned home I would know each one of their names. We shared stories as we watched the miles pass from the windows, not understanding yet how many stories we would make together as the three months of the semester progressed.

As an acting student, I found the majority of my time spent in studio rooms or the open space of a stage, inviting me to step outside of my comfort zone and flourish within the new concepts and methods that were presented to me at UWTSD. I had the opportunity to learn from professionals and form lasting relationships with the other students with whom I was given the opportunity to collaborate. As we sat backstage in a darkening theatre, friendships were formed and professional networks were expanded, despite the mismatched accents mingling in the air around us.

It was during the Cultural Program offered through UWTSD's International Office that I found something beyond the extraordinary views of new places. I found something worth picking up and putting in my pocket, metaphorically speaking. I found the edges of my perception of the world stretched and my perception of myself altered. I remembered all those Christmases I sang in the Welsh language with other youths in the community about the beauty of Wales, not fully understanding. I stood in the seaside town of Tenby, staring out to the ocean and I finally understood the meaning of each one of those hymns, poems, and quotes I had performed for audiences.

Studying abroad in Wales invited me to grow not only in my chosen field of study, but as a friend and as a person. Diolch yn fawr to the Welsh Society of Central Ohio for their support in making the opportunity possible.
