

# Day of Pentecost - May 15, 2016

On the fiftieth day of Easter we celebrate the Spirit, through whom and in whom the people of God are created and re-created. Pentecost is sometimes called the church's birthday, but might more appropriately be called its baptism day, since the gift of the Spirit is the fullness of baptism. The promised Spirit of God is poured out. The baptized have become "children of God" and "joint heirs with Christ." By the power of the Spirit we have seen the face of the Father in his only begotten Son and been saved by him. Pentecost is a day of promises fulfilled.

Before Jesus ascended into heaven, he told his disciples they would be filled with the Holy Spirit. Now, surrounded by signs of fire, wind, and a variety of languages in their midst, the people were amazed and astonished at Jesus' promise coming true. (Acts 2:1-21)



Many passages in the Bible liken God to fire. The Holy Spirit of God appeared on Sinai in flames of fire, which on Pentecost appeared on the forehead of each believer. Moses experienced God in fire; through fire the Israelites presented offerings to God; God led the people through the wilderness with a pillar of fire. #### From the Vicar...

"We're on a Mission from God."
The journey began with Advent, we survived
Christmas, and we confessed and repented our way
through Lent in order to celebrate Easter. Now May
ushers in Pentecost.

The church calendar, and the paraments in our sanctuary changed to match, marks the days and seasons of the church with particular colors. Some of these have changed a little through history, but these days: Advent is blue, Christmas and Easter are white, Lent purple, and Pentecost is red. But the season after Pentecost is green and it stays green for a long time. This period is often referred to as, "Ordinary Time."

This is also the season where summer falls and in the churches of today, many people take their vacations, travel, and plan fun and recreational activities. This makes the phrase, "Ordinary Time" seem, well, ordinary. The term, however, comes from the Latin *ordinalis*, meaning, "numbered." Nevertheless, I think we should think of this as our plain old, ordinary time in the church. There are no major holidays, and many of our usual events fall away until fall.

Except ordinary doesn't mean boring, it means typical and usual, and the fact that Pentecost falls right before one of these large blocks of "ordinary time" should tell us what the typical and usual is all about. Pentecost celebrates the day when the Holy Spirit is sent to the disciples to give



them the capacity for their mission. That means Pentecost is a celebration of the renewal of God's call to us to be about God's mission.

But the renewal is not merely a renewal of the events of Pentecost, nor just the work of the disciples. It goes back even before Christ called us to share the good news. God's mission has remained the same since the beginning. We are created as the image of God (Genesis 1) that the whole world might be blessed through us (Genesis 12) as we share the good news (Mark 16) for the healing of all (Revelation 22).

This means that the ordinary, or typical activity to which we are called is one of sharing messages of love and hope and contributing to the healing and reconciling of the world, by feeding the poor, caring for the feeble and ill, and seeking to mend broken relationships inside and outside our walls. We're on a mission from God, and it isn't a special day or event. It's an ordinary, everyday, part of our lives. And we

are given the mercy, grace, hope, peace, and love of Christ, who is always with us, to aid us in that responsibility.

#### Students Talk "Faith and Monev" by Ali Tranvik

Duke Lutherans Campus Ministry

I remember a sermon my hometown pastor once preached about money, in which she declared that Jesus talks more about money than about love. I was probably in middle school at the time, and I recall getting upset about this news, thinking "this can't be true! You're telling me God cares more about my piggy bank than my heart?" It turns out she was right. There are more than 800 passages about money (or riches, wealth, treasure) in the Bible. Jesus talks about money more than heaven and hell combined. Eleven of 39 parables are about money, and 1 of every 7 verses in the Gospel of Luke talks about money.

There are passages that discuss the fragility and futility of money in this life: "Do not store up for vourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal" (Matt. 6:19-20). And there are the uncomfortable, convicting verses like, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God" (Matt. 19:24).

Given such verses – let alone the sheer number of them – it seems clear that as people of faith, money matters. How we think theologically about money matters. How we spend it, save it, and share it *matters*.

That's what made money such a great topic for the final session of the Duke Lutherans Campus Ministry series "Faith in Everyday Life." The goal of this ecumenical program is to help connect faith with topics of our everyday lives as students – to connect Sundays with the rest of the week. So we hosted a session on "Faith and Money" in hopes that students

might leave with a greater sense of connectedness between their faith and their finances.

In our conversation, where 25 undergraduate and graduate students representing a variety of Christian traditions attended, we plunged into monetary matters, asking first what our faith has to say. As Christians, we decided, we are simultaneous participants in two different economies: our worldly economy (where money rules, scarcity motivates, and we own and deserve what's in our wallet) and God's economy (where love is the object, abundance is the assumption, and our resources are not owned or deserved, but freely given anyway). Seeing our money as a *gift* that we are mere stewards of for a time necessarily changes how we manage it, I think.

With this framework in mind, we delved into engaging conversation and heard from local speakers. One speaker reflected on



faith and money in his own faith life, and described how he transitioned from being a child attracted to the Franciscan monastic life and its renunciation of material wealth to becoming a financial adviser at Morgan Stanley. Then we got to consider our own attitudes toward money, discussing questions like:

- ► Does it matter whether we give our money to the church or to secular organizations whose mission we support? Why or why not?
- The Bible tells us to share of our time, talents, and treasure. How are these ways of giving similar and different from one another? Can we substitute one for another that is, are they interchangeable?

We ended the session by turning from our own finances to a larger economic issue that is a particularly timely topic at Duke, in Durham, and at the national level within the presidential election: living wage. A speaker who represents both the Durham People's Alliances and the Durham Living Wage Project spoke to students about the importance of a living wage, both from an economic perspective as well as a theological/ethical perspective.

Talking about money candidly in community can be difficult. But it was something that happened in a meaningful way a few Mondays ago. And that, indeed, was a gift.

You'll use less, making your cost per use much lower than it would be with a non-concentrated brand, and you'll be consuming less packaging.
