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#### **MEMBER INFORMATION ...**

TRACHT: Our Trachtenhut



For BCE Club Members who have a Trachtenhut there is a bit of protocol to follow. The order of the required pins is as shown in this picture. It should be the BCE club pin first, then the Gauverband N.A. pin, then the feather. Personal pins are allowed, but the thinking is that they should be in 'Trachten Style'. Personal pins are never allowed during dance competitions.

When our dress code is Halbtracht, the women should wear the hat, the same as if the dress code was full Tracht. The thinking is that if there is a Steiffmieder worn, then the hat should be worn. As we know there are some exceptions to that thinking as throughout Bavaria and the Gauverband N.A. clubs have adopted their own style, but the way that BCE has adopted is hat with Steiffmieder.

For the Volkstanz women, in the spirit of uniformity and club solidarity, it would be appropriate to also wear a hat when the club attire is Halbtracht.

#### GLÜHWEIN (MULLED RED WINE) - Perfect for the upcoming Holiday Season!

1/4 Liter or 1 cup water 4 cinnamon sticks 8-10 whole cloves juice of 1 lemon 250 gr or 1 cup sugar 1 Liter or 4 cups strong tea 2 Liters or 2 qt red wine, burgundy 1/4 Liter or 1 cup rum

In a pot with the water, place cinnamon sticks cloves, lemon and sugar and let sit for 10 minutes. Prepare the strong tea. Add the tea, red wine and rum to the pot and mix. Heat gently, but do not boil. Enjoy!

#### Alfred W. Hodge, Jr. - Honorary Member of Bavarian Club Edelweiss Westchester

We announce the passing of our beloved and honorary member, Alfred W. Hodge who died on Saturday, September 17<sup>th</sup>, 2016. As Bavarian Club Edelweiss was nearing the end of the 59<sup>th</sup> Annual German American Steuben Parade in New York City, we learned of Al's passing. While we were saddened, we were comforted knowing that his spirit was with us, looking down upon us, a place that he was so accustomed to for so many years before. What a fitting day for Al Hodge to leave us....a beautiful life that came to an end.

Alfred Hodge, age 86, was a longtime resident of Hawthorne, NY. He attended local schools, graduated from New York University with a degree in Applied Science and attended Newark College of Engineering until he was drafted into the U.S. Army. He was employed by Safe Flight Instrument Company as an Engineering Supervisor. His hobbies included: archery, fishing, flying gliders and absolutely enjoyed playing Pinochle. He was a proud and active member of Bavarian Club Edelweiss where he held many positions and chaired many committees. He led our Volkstanzgruppe for fifteen years and would always share many of his jokes at probe. Al was also a Delegate to the Vereinigte Bayern von Gross NY & NJ in the 1970's. He made the best Manhattans you ever tasted which were served at off site parties and at the many Gaufeste that we attended!

Al was everyone's friend and who will never be forgotten. We will especially remember Al at every German American Steuben Parade because his spirit will always be with us.

Al is survived by his beloved wife, Edith; they were married for fifty-eight years. He is also survived by two daughters, Elicia and Jennifer and their spouses as well as four granddaughters and two sisters.

In 1997 as part of the scholarship committee, she was instrumental in establishing the Franz Stein Scholarship Award to a student from White Plains High School. She would shop, wrap and help Santa distribute the gifts and always made sure that all children would receive a gift. ## Es Weihnachtet sehr....

# The time is here but it's more than one night a year!

Christmas time in one of the greatest times of the year. Christmas time in Bavaria though, is magical! Its traditional Christkindlmarkts that usually begin on the first Sunday of Advent can get anyone into a festive spirit, especially when accompanied by snow and a steaming cup of "Gluehwein" (mulled wine).

Christmas markets actually originated in Germany. In the late Middle Ages, special "winter markets" took place in large cities lasting a day or two. These markets were originally intended for people to buy food and other provisions that would hold them over through the cold winter months. Over time, other merchants and craftsman began to sell their wares at these markets, including toys, crafts and baked goods. Though Dresden's "Striezelmarkt" in northern Germany is the documented oldest Christmas market, there are claims of Christmas markets being held in Munich even earlier in 1310 (though they remain unfounded). Today, they can be found all over the world in countries like France, Switzerland, Austria, Italy, and Belgium. The tradition has even crossed the Atlantic and is celebrated in the U.S. and Canada.

The size and length of the markets in Bavaria vary. Larger cities may have markets that begin on the first Advent weekend and run daily through Christmas eve. These cities may even have multiple markets taking place. Smaller towns may only have markets which take place on a weekend or two. Each place though will have it's typical Christmas stalls set up usually in the town square or around their church. Here is where the fun happens! Traditional foods like sausages, mulled wine, "Lebkuchen" (spice cakes), cookies and candies, as well as handcrafted Christmas ornaments, homemade items and toys can be had. A "Kripperl" (Christmas creche) with the Holy Family is usually on display somewhere and children can be found crowded around the merry-go-round or "Kettenkarousel" as many of the markets also have some type of amusement rides. Programs at all of these markets feature live music, readings, visits from Nikolaus or the Christkind and some even have pony rides, horse drawn carriage rides or even camel rides!

One of the most notable Christkindlmarkts in Bavaria is in Nuremberg. This market has been taking place since 1628. Their traditional Christmas Angel appears on the balcony of the church the Friday of the first Advent weekend signaling its opening. Specialties like their "Drei im Weggla" (3 finger sized sausages in a bun) and their well known Lebkuchen are to be enjoyed in this town.

Munich hosts its main Christkindlmarkt around the Marienplatz (but only since 1972!). Live music is played while the hundreds of people both from within and out of the country eat bratwurst and drink Glühwein. Munich is actually one of the cities that hosts numerous Christmas markets within its various

parts of town, including the "Kripperlmarkt" (creche), "Mittelaltermarkt" (Middle Ages), and "Wintertollwood" (concerts and crafts held on the Theresienwiese - think Oktoberfest) to name a few.

Regensburg is another noteworthy town to visit which holds 3 markets at the same time. The main market is held around the church square while the Lucrezia market features many handcrafted artisan items including silver and gold jewelry, clay, woodwork and other metal forged items. For an small entrance fee, one can also enjoy the "Thurn und Taxis" Christmas market held on the grounds of Schloss Emmeram. The proceeds of the entrance fee help maintain this castle. Not to be missed at any of these markets is the Regenburger "Halbmeter Wurst"!

Even our vacation-home town of Erding sports it's own Christkindlmarkt with all it's beautiful Christmas wares - none more prominent than it's own "Erdinger Weissbier". After all, it is the "Weissbierhauptstadt" of Germany!

Sadly, most of the Christmas markets in Bavaria are over by the time we Americans with kids bound to school vacation times that begin on December 22 or 23 even get to Germany. For those folks, I still have a few hot tips to enjoy this special time of year. Enjoy the "Wintermarkt" at the Munich airport which usually runs until December 30. Or head to Salzburg or many of the other Austrian large cities whose markets last till December 26. "Berchtesgadener Adventsmarkt" is another one that runs till December 31. That's where we're headed this December when we fly out! Frohe Weihnachten all!
