Tuesday, June 28 - Singer/songwriter/historian **WARREN NELSON** and son **ROWAN NELSON-FERRIS** present stories and original songs about the great bygone days of the railroads. Warren Nelson is co-creator of *On The Velvet*, a railroad musical first produced in 1992. His garage is made of roundhouse doors from the Soo Line roundhouse in Ashland, and he has a wooden caboose in his yard!



Tuesday, July 12 - The hour-long Brownstone Days trolley ride through Washburn is free to all. Join **SHARON STEWART** for a narrated tour to see Washburn's architecture and history. Experience the same trip that Brownstone Days visitors take - virtually. Even locals learn at least one new thing when they take this ride.



Tuesday, Aug 2 - Join the WHA Kiosk Committee—**PATRA HOLTER, GINNY PEDERSEN, LYNN ADAMS** and **SHARON STEWART**— as they describe the process from conception to finish for the beautiful, interchangeable window display panels for the kiosk. Researched and developed by the committee, the panels support the mission of telling the compelling stories of Washburn's heritage.



Tuesday, Aug. 9 - In less than 30 days of taking office, President Franklin Roosevelt pushed through Congress the most popular New Deal recovery program of the great depression, the Emergency Recovery Work Act, the authorization for the Civilian Conservation Corps. In 1933, the men of Company 640 marched from the Omaha station on 1st Ave. E. in Washburn 17 miles to the former homestead of Ora and Lizzie Brinks in the barrens to begin their 6 month enlistment in the CCC. **PETE MANN's** program will explore the presence of the CCC in Bayfield County and the establishment of Camp Brinks.

The WHA kiosk is located near the corner of Bayfield Street and 3rd Avenue West in Wikdal Park. It is a colorful and helpful source of information for Washburn residents and visitors. The WHA Kiosk Committee continues to develop new display panels with invaluable assistance from Susan Mackreth of the Washburn Historical Museum. To date, we have completed 21 panels on topics ranging from Brownstone to the City Band.




Buildings and Sites Committee

The Buildings and Sites Committee has been busy keeping the heritage of the Washburn Area alive. In February, businesses were invited to submit an application for a facade grant. WHA approved \$10,000 for this grant cycle. A total of 13 exciting proposals were submitted requesting over \$78,000. After review, two grants were selected: Patsy's Bar and Grill and Chequamegon Picture Framing. Watch each of these businesses make improvements to their building facade in the upcoming months.

The second major activity was the May celebration of Historic Preservation Month. In partnership with the Washburn Public Library, a series of activities were held at the library. Included were presentations on the history of the library (Pete Mann), why libraries are important (Darrell Pendergrass), and stories about Mae Greenwood, who served as librarian for over 60 years (Dick Olson). In addition, Friends of the Library, headed by Diane Posner, sponsored a lunch for the community in appreciation for their support of the library and arranged for the Garland City Consort to play a concert at the library. Our final activity was to post numbers to identify the historic buildings featured in our self-guided walking or driving tour map.

School Programs Begin at Houghton Depot

After three years of work by volunteers and paid contractors, the Houghton Depot is ready for school programs. Washburn, South Shore, and Bayfield 4th graders and LaPointe Elementary School each came to the Houghton Depot for a two-hour, hands-on program. The program focuses on the impact the Omaha Train had on the development of Houghton Village where the depot was located and the rest of the Bayfield Peninsula between 1883 and 1978.

Students looked at a 1897 map of Houghton Village drawn as Carl Frostman remembered it. They looked at a 1900 census record to find residents who lived in Houghton Village and became detectives by trying to find those names etched on the walls as graffiti from 1905 to 1934. They also sorted brownstone into various grades and saw how brownstone was cut and removed from quarries.

They learned about the Omaha train, its first arrival to Bayfield and discovered many of the items that were carried to and from the towns along the Peninsula, including the first car that was brought to Bayfield.

They also had an opportunity to learn how communication between depots, train employees, and passengers relied on lanterns, Morse Code and train whistles. Before their visit ended, a train layout was lowered from the ceiling and they blew their train whistles as a 1913 period train went around the track.

Members of the Bayview History Committee wish to extend a thank you to all who have been involved in helping to make the restoration of the Houghton Depot a reality.



Houghton Depot Grand Opening

June 11, 2022 - 11 AM

The Houghton Depot served the Bayview community from about 1902 until 1934. At that time it was moved across the street to become the living room of a private home. In 1984 it was vacated and began to deteriorate. In 2019, the Bayview History Committee took on the project of saving the last remaining depot on the Bayfield Peninsula. The depot was moved to Bayview Town Park, where volunteers and contractors worked over 1500 hours to restore it. Though only a black and white photo of the depot was found, paint found under the corner boards revealed an ocher color, the color we used on the exterior siding.

On June 11, 2022, a grand opening ceremony with a ribbon cutting, food, and music will celebrate the complete restoration and fulfillment of the Washburn Heritage Association's vision to keep the heritage of the Washburn area alive. Once again the sound of the "Scoot" will be heard. The event begins at 11 am with ribbon cutting at 11:30 am. A new kiosk on the north side of the depot will list upcoming events and open houses.
