This year's World Series was the most exciting ever with the beautiful Pepsi-Cola advertising on the Indian's scoreboard. Jacob's Field in Cleveland, Ohio is one of the few major league parks that serve Pepsi-Cola.

Pepsi has announced plans to open a 15-story video globe and interactive cultural museum to be completed by next summer. The \$40 million structure will be built in Atlanta, GA, hometown of that other cola! The 170-foot-diameter spherical structure will contain five theatres and more than 3,600 computer -controlled video projectors that will show programs with environmental perspectives. CLUB NEWS

THE FIRST FEST

Pepsi Fest has become an important event among Pepsi collectors and Pepsi enthusiasts alike. The reputation of this event has spread far and wide. Pepsi Fest is the place to find Pepsi collectables, meet other Pepsi collectors, and have a great time!

Pepsi Fest began purely by chance. In the fall of 1985 I was driving across the country making my usual effort to stop at as many flea markets and antique stores as possible. A little dismayed because I had been delayed by a snow storm the night before, I decided to make a flea market at the state fairgrounds in Indianapolis my destination for the day. Fortunately the weather had cleared and the snow was melting. I arrived at the fairgrounds not knowing what to expect. It was pretty much your typical flea market. I began going booth to booth asking that all too familiar question - "do you have anything Pepsi?" About two thirds of the way through the flea market I still asked the question and got the usual "sorry" in response. As I turned to go to the next booth I heard a voice ask if I'd ever heard of the Pepsi-Cola Collector's Club.

"Sure" I said.

"Do you know Bob Stoddard?" he asked.

"I'm Bob Stoddard" I replied.

The voice was that of Bill Vehling who was at that time getting ready to put out his first book on Pepsi collecting. Bill and I began corresponding over the next year on Pepsi related subjects. At one point he suggested that we have a convention in Indianapolis. My first thought was - who goes to Indianapolis? After looking at a map I realized that this

would be a central location for a lot of club members. Bill also told me that if we had a convention at the same time as the ad show, there would be plenty to do for all attendees. This made sense and I knew that we needed to have a national Pepsi Cola Collector's Club get together. Bill and his co-author Michael Hunt talked to Sheraton Hotel who said they would be very interested in hosting our event.

I felt that this event had to be more than a club convention. I wanted some kind of name that symbolized fun and light-heartedness, so I decided to call this event Pepsi Fest, combining the wonderful name Pepsi with a festival atmosphere.

After some negotiations it was set. The first Pepsi Fest would be held March 28, 1987.

After two days of room hopping, socializing, and buying Pepsi memorabilia, everyone knew Pepsi-Fest was going to be something special.

Our original Pepsi Fest was attended by approximately 70 people. Last year's Pepsi-Fest had over 700 participants. Since the first Pepsi Fest we have had a number of collectors that have attended every Pepsi Fest. The following is a list of those people:

LOCAL BOTTLES

The non Pepsi-Cola, Pepsi-Cola bottles. Sound confusing? It is. From the earliest days, most Pepsi-Cola bottlers bottled drinks other than Pepsi-Cola. Some bottled popular drinks such as Orange Crush. Others bottled their own brands or regional favorites. It is these local or regional drinks that cause all the confusion. Many eager Pepsi collectors in hot pursuit of that elusive "great find" come across these bottles marked "bottled by Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company."

The mystery begins. What is this bottle for? Is this bottle a prototype? Is it for test marketing? A new flavor? In most cases this unusual bottle was a drink offered by the local Pepsi bottler and not by the national Pepsi-Cola Company. Over the years most Pepsi-Cola bottlers have given up on bottling these other flavors. This makes these bottles a very special part of the Pepsi-Cola story. Here are some of the names used for these flavored drinks sold by local Pepsi bottlers that are no longer offered

THE TEN CENT BOTTLE


Pepsi-Cola revolutionized the soft drink industry with the twelve ounce bottle for five cents. Prior to this time most soft drinks were sold in a six ounce bottle for a nickel. Most Pepsi collectors are well aware of this fact. A lesser known fact is that just before Pepsi went to 12 ounce for 5 cents, they had offered 12 ounces for 10 cents. The ten cent bottle was only available for a brief time and very little is known about it.

What we do know is that Pepsi was first developed as a fountain drink. Then in 1904-1905 Pepsi-Cola was sold in six ounce bottles. This continued through the bankruptcy in 1923.

The Pepsi-Cola Company was reorganized in Richmond, Virginia, where once again Pepsi was sold in six ounce bottles for five cents. This continued until the second bankruptcy in May of 1931. At this time Charles Guth of Loft Inc. bought the Pepsi-Cola trademark and formula. Guth's original idea was to use Pepsi-Cola to replace Coca-Cola at soda fountains in Loft's chain of candy stores. It seems that Guth had no interest in bottled Pepsi-Cola at this time but records show that there were still a few of the original bottlers offering Pepsi-Cola in bottles.

No one is really sure when or why Guth decided to try and actually market Pepsi-Cola in bottles but it is believed that it was sometime in 1933. At first he considered selling the six ounce bottle for three cents but for some reason he decided to sell Pepsi-Cola in a twelve ounce bottle for ten cents. Some believe the twelve ounce bottle idea came from a used beer bottle dealer who suggested that he could give Guth a good deal on used twelve ounce bottles. So at some point in 1933 Pepsi-Cola was offered in a fancy twelve ounce bottle for ten cents. Sales were overwhelmingly bad - this was unmitigated failure.

Towards the end of 1933 it was decided to offer Pepsi-Cola in a twelve ounce bottle for five cents. No one is sure whose idea it was to drop the

price. One story suggests that the ten cent twelve ounce Pepsi bottle was being sold in a department store. In an effort to reduce unsold inventory the price was cut in half. Almost overnight the Pepsi-Cola disappeared. What an idea! This could be big - a twelve ounce bottle for five cents!

In march of 1934 the twelve ounce bottle for a nickel was test marketed in Baltimore. The answer came back quick. Pepsi was a big hit and as they say - the rest is history.

WHAT IS A PEPSI COLLECTOR?


First of all, Pepsi collectors are not made, they are born. The world is divided into two groups - the collectors and the non-collectors. Collectors are people who can't own one of something - they must have a series, a set, an assortment, etc. It usually starts when you're young with rocks, marbles, buttons, or whatever. The non-collectors are the people who throw everything away. Thanks to these people many of twentieth century collectables have become extremely rare and valuable.

Within the group of collectors known as Pepsi collectors there are two types. The collector who happens to collect Pepsi-Cola memorabilia as something to collect, and the Pepsi lover who collects Pepsi stuff because they have to. This second group normally has a romantic connection with the beverage known as Pepsi-Cola that has evolved into a need to collect the memorabilia.

The first group likes to be organized trying to collect within categories such as bottles, glasses, signs, matchbooks, and so on. The Pepsi lover-collector is obsessed. They have to have it all - from the magnificent early Pepsi collectables to a Pepsi envelope postmarked yesterday.

Both of these types of collectors make up the Pepsi-Cola Collectors Club - and that is probably why it is such a fun group.

I would call myself a Pepsi lovercollector and I'm proud to be one. Which one are you?





PCCC 12 YEARS OLD



over the last several years it has become necessary to increase our membership dues. Thank you very much for your understanding and support. Therefore, when renewal cards are sent out beginning with March 1996 renewals, the \$18 rate will be reflected. As always, you will receive a renewal card just prior to your renewal month.

We have surveyed other organizations comparable to ours and found that \$18 annual dues seem to be an average rate for bi-monthly newsletters.

The "for sale" and "wanted" section of the newsletter is designed for individuals and should not be used by businesses. Those businesses wishing to advertise in the newsletter must use the display ad rates and provide us with camera ready copy. Space is allocated on the basis of availability.

Pepsi Recipes

Country Ham

1-year old country ham. Wash & scrub, then soak overnight in water with 1 cup vinegar. Rinse and place ham in large roaster. Add as much water as possible. Combine:

32 ounces of Pepsi
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup honey
1 cup wine
1 apple, cut in half
1 orange, cut in half
3 or 4 bay leaves

Pour over ham in roaster. Cook at 190 -200 degrees for 10 to 12 hours.

Cherry Pepsi Salad

1 cup pie cherries
3/4 cup sugar
2 cups water
2 boxes Cherry Jell-O
10 oz. Pepsi
1 small can crushed pineapple
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Bring cherries, sugar, Pepsi and water to a boil. Pour over the 2 boxes of cherry Jell-O. Chill. Add crushed pineapple and nuts.

Interview with Bob Stoddard

The following is an interview with Bob Stoddard, author of <u>Introduction</u> toPepsi Collecting.

Question - How long have you been collecting Pepsi-Cola memorabilia?

Bob - I began sometime in 1977. My first item was an Ideal 55 vending machine.

Question - What got you started collecting?

Bob - Like many other Pepsi collectors, I consume vast quantities of Pepsi-Cola. So, one day I decided to buy an old Pepsi Machine to keep my Pepsi cold. The machine, an Ideal flat-top, was wonderful. It kept my Pepsi ice cold, which is the best way to drink Pepsi! The Pepsi vending machine seemed lonely sitting there all by itself, so I decided to get a sign to hang above it. I found a nice crown (bottle cap) sign which fit perfectly.

Question - Did you start out to have a large Pepsi collection?

Bob - No, I thought I'd just buy a few more signs and that would be the end of my Pepsi decorating. After I bought a few more I was hooked. I began going to all the flea markets and swap meets to buy anything with Pepsi-Cola on it. Now, eighteen years later, I have over two thousand items in my collection.

Question - Was it hard to find Pepsi items during this period?

Bob - In those days very few dealers even thought there were any Pepsi collectables - let alone Pepsi collectors to buy them! It seemed hard then, but looking back it was actually much easier than today. There weren't as many people looking for Pepsi collectables and prices were very cheap compared to now. I could buy Pepsi and Pete cardboard signs for \$25 to \$50. If a dealer had Pepsi stuff he was much more eager to make a deal. There just weren't a lot of Pepsi collectors out there.

Question - What made you start the Pepsi-Cola Collector's Club?

Bob - I just thought that if there was a way to bring Pepsi collectors together it would make collecting easier and more interesting. At first I tried having a meeting. For two weeks I passed out fliers at all the local antique stores and flea markets. On the day of the first meeting, only three people showed up. At that point I realized that I would have to find another way to bring Pepsi collectors together. I began collecting addresses for what would become the first issue of the Pepsi-Cola newsletter.

Question - How many members are in the club today?

Bob - We have over 2,000 members in the United States, Canada, and several foreign countries.

Question - When you first started did you ever think the club would be this large?

Bob - No, I really didn't think about it. At that time I was only concerned about meeting other Pepsi collectors. I really had no thoughts about where the club would be in 2, 5, or 10 years.

Question - Are you happy with the way the club has progressed?

Bob - Yes, I am very pleased with the way the club has evolved. For the most

part, the club has become an adhesive that holds together a very diverse group of Pepsi enthusiasts. With the addition of our Pepsi Fest events, it has given people an opportunity to make a lot of new friends -in some cases, friends for life.

Question - What is your favorite Pepsi collectable?

Bob - I'm not sure I could pick out one particular item in my collection and say it is my favorite. I am very fascinated with the history of the Pepsi-Cola Co. Because of that, I am very drawn to the paper collectables. That is , the historical documents and other paper items that help to understand the history of the Pepsi-Cola Co.

Question - How does the history of the Pepsi-Cola Co. fit into Pepsi collecting?

Bob - When collecting Pepsi memorabilia, you are actually collecting pieces of Pepsi's history. The written history is what gives the memorabilia significance. The fact that Pepsi had such a tumultuous past with two bankruptcies only adds to the mystique of Pepsi collectables.

Question - Do you have any favorite memories of Pepsi collecting?

Bob - Yes, I have many favorite memories but a few stand out more than others. I'll never forget finding my Pepsi festoon. (#1736 in Introduction to Pepsi Collecting). Sometime around 1981 I was checking out one of the local antique malls which usually had more junk than good stuff. I was about half way through the mall when I looked into one of the side rooms. My eyes were sweeping the room when I spotted the festoon. My heart began to pound so hard I thought I was going to stop breathing! A Pepsi festoon hanging there just waiting for me to buy it! It

was \$135 and I had to put it on layaway!

Another memory that is very special to me is the first Pepsi Fest. Scared to death of what would happen when we got to Indianapolis, I wondered if anyone would even come. I wondered if everything would work out. My fears were misplaced. We had a great turnout of Pepsi collectors. Plenty of Pepsi memorabilia was available for sale or trade. We thought we were in Pepsi heaven!

Question - Over the years you have met many fascinating people involved in the world of Pepsi. Is there anyone who particularly captured your interest?

Bob - Yes it's true, I have met many fascinating people in the Pepsi World presidents of Pepsi-Cola, past and present Pepsi-Cola bottlers, and members of the Bradham family. My biggest thrill was to receive a letter from Walter Mack inviting me to meet with him in New York! I knew Walter Mack had been the president of Pepsi-Cola from 1939-1950 and that he had been instrumental in developing Pepsi and Pete and the Pepsi jingle, but I did not know he was still alive! So, when I received the letter I knew I had to get to New York and see him! I called him right away and made plans to visit him in New York. What a memorable experience that was - sitting in the office of Walter Mack and listening to him talk about his days with Pepsi-Cola. His recollections of people and events that shaped Pepsi's history fascinating to hear. I just could not believe that I was getting this information directly from the person responsible for making it happen. This event was pivotal in creating a desire in me to research further the history of Pepsi-Cola.

Question - Has your collection ever

been on display for the public to view?

Bob - Yes, I have displayed some of my collection at various events, such as the Los Angeles County Fair, the Winter Carnival in Minneapolis, MN, the opening of the Pepsi-Cola regional office in Pittsburgh, PA, at Pepsi-Cola Headquarters in Somers, NY, the Flagstaff, AZ Pepsi's 50th Anniversary party, and at several Pepsi bottler conventions.

Question - Do you have everything there is to collect Pepsi?

Bob - No. That is the exciting part of collecting Pepsi memorabilia. No one really knows what is out there. There are a number of things I am still looking for, but in the process of looking I find things I never knew about. That is probably what keeps me searching.

Question - Do you ever think about selling your collection?

Bob - Although my collection has appreciated in value over the years, the financial aspect is meaningless to me. I collect Pepsi-Cola because I love it. As long as I am enjoying it, I will continue to collect it!

Question - You have written one book on Pepsi collecting. Are there any plans for another?

Bob - Yes, I am currently working on a second book on Pepsi-Cola memorabilia. This book should be completed before summer of this year. I hope to make this book the most comprehensive book ever done on Pepsi collectables. It will be a hardback book in full color. Also, I am working on the history of the franchise bottlers of Pepsi-Cola. I am in the process of researching and gathering information for this book. This is

scheduled to be completed by 1997.

Question - Do you have any advice for the collector starting out today?

Bob - This is a very tough time to start collecting Pepsi memorabilia. Over the past five years prices have skyrocketed. This makes it difficult for the new collector to begin. However, if you really love Pepsi memorabilia, then I would suggest to collect only what you like. Don't buy what people tell you that you ought to have in your collection. Buy the best quality item you can afford. Be patient - it takes a long time to build a good collection. It will happen if you stay with it! Be careful who you do business with. There are a lot of unscrupulous antique dealers out there. Learn who the good ones are - they can be of great help to you in building your collection.

Question - What do you foresee as the future of Pepsi collecting?

Bob - The future of Pepsi collecting looks very exciting. As we approach the 100th anniversary of Pepsi-Cola, the demand for Pepsi-Cola memorabilia will become greater than ever. This increase in demand will bring about new finds of previously unknown Pepsi artifacts. Unfortunately, with increase in demand comes increase in prices.

Question - What are your goals for the Pepsi-Cola Collector's Club in 1996?

Bob - At the top of my list is improving the newsletter. I hope to make The Pepsi Express more attractive and more informative.


