THE MILITARY AVIATION MUSEUM, VIRGINIA BEACH, VA.

On 23 November 2019, I visited the Military Aviation Museum in Virginia Beach, VA. I was on a trip with my two sons, Joe and Jim, the main objective of which was to visit the National Air and Space Museum in the DC area. I had a grandson living near Norfolk, VA, so we stayed there after visiting the NASM, and afterwards, we visited the Military Aviation Museum. I had never heard of this museum before, and was very surprised to see the collection of aircraft there.

The museum is situated on a small airport in rural Virginia, with a grass runway that must have been about 5000 feet long. There were about five hangars, some being used for aircraft restoration and maintenance, but three of them were full of the museum's collection. We took a guided tour, and were allowed pretty much free run of the place. It was a cat in a fish market situation. Many of the planes are flyable, and while there, I bought a CD taken during one of their air shows, where people could watch and get very close to the airplanes on display. I will be happy to show the video at an IPMS meeting in the future, as it shows many of the airplanes in flight. But that's another story.

One thing that surprised me was the display of "Luft 46" full scale aircraft models. I could identify only a few of them, but they were mainly hanging up above the other displays. None of these aircraft was ever built and test flown, but they are certainly interesting.

This museum was established by a guy who must have had a lot of money, and he has a lot of volunteers who help restore and maintain the aircraft, and to be honest, the museum is about the best I've seen, although the planes are really packed into the hangars, and it is difficult to get really good photos of many of them. On the following Pages are a small selection of some of the aircraft on display. Enjoy.

















































German Guided Missiles of World War II Jim Pearsall

Here's another interesting and informative book by Steve Zaloga. He has done a few books for Osprey. By my count (from Wikipedia) this is his 27th Osprey title. He's doing it right.

Since Mr. Zaloga has already done Osprey books on the V-1 and V-2, these missiles are not covered in this book. But what is covered are those projects which barely made it to operational status, or weren't quite ready when VE day occurred.

Antiship Missiles

The coverage of the Fritz X and the HS 293 is very good, giving an excellent idea of how the guidance systems were developed and how effective they were. There's a table with the ships sunk or damaged by these missiles. There are 44 entries on the list, and 22 were sunk, 22 damaged. In the text it's shown that several of the damaged ships were not sunk because the missile passed completely through the hull, failing to explode. Another reason for low success numbers was that the Allies quickly developed jammers for the radio control systems for these missiles. One "missile" mentioned is the Mistel, a Ju-88 flown to the target by an attached fighter, FW-190 or Bf-109. I learned that later Mistels were radio controlled from the "parasite" fighter. There's a lot of great information in this book.





Flak Missiles

Anti-aircraft missiles had a difficult development. The problem wasn't technical, it was political. With the war going well in September of 1941, Hitler ordered the cessation of all long-term development programs. This included Flak missiles. When it became obvious that anti-aircraft guns were not working against high flying night bombers, Hitler ordered the deployment of Nebelwerfer artillery rockets to defend the Ruhr industrial region against bombers. This didn't work because the Nebelwerfers didn't have the range or speed to engage aircraft. There were four guided missile development programs which received support and funding from the Luftwaffe. They were the subsonic Henschel Schmetterling, the Rheinmetall-Borsig Rheintochter, the Messerschmitt Enzian and the supersonic Wasserfall, which was based on the V-2.

Mr. Zaloga does a very good job of showing how these projects suffered delays from many factors, including, low priorities early on, material failures, and the fact that Allied bombing made manufacturing difficult.

OVERALL EVALUATION:

Highly recommended. This part of the Luftwaffe's offense and defense later in the war has not been thoroughly covered before, and this book brings a lot of great information to the reader.

Many thanks to Osprey Publications for this outstanding book, and to IPMS USA for allowing me to review it.




The Hs 293A-1 was the standard production version of this missile and the second most widely produced German missile of World War II, after the FZG-76/V-1 cruise missile.

Fighter production had priority over Flak missiles, so many designs were obliged to use wood instead of aluminum where possible. This is evident on the wings of this Rheintochter I on display at the Udvar-Hazy Center of the National Air and Space Museum. (Author)

The C2 Wasserfall bore a strong family resemblance to the A-4V-2 ballistic missile but was considerably smaller, with mid-fuselage wings and enlarged control surfaces on the tail. This is the standard W5 configuration after the mid-body wings had been reduced to a smaller trapezoidal shape.



The test versions of the Enzian Flak missile used a modified 88mm Flak gun mount with a 6m launch rail.

Storage is often a Space Story

Storage is often a problem with finished models and to overcome this I recently purchased some display cabinets from Ikea.

I am not a big fan of Ikea as on my first visit to the store in Scotland I found it very frustrating when I could not get out without walking the entire store.

There is a rumor (unconfirmed) that their meatball specialty is actually made from shoppers who became trapped in the stores.

I bought my cabinets online and did not even have to go into the bowels of the store as they have set up a collection point just inside the door. A huge incentive for me.

Anyway I digress, I am very pleased with the self assembly cabinets with one exception, and that is the shelves are fixed and can not be moved which is OK if you have larger items to display but a waste of space if you for instance you model aircraft smaller than 1/32 or cars. I decided to add some shelves to the unit myself using the following method.



As you see from this picture there is a lot of wasted space within the cabinet so I added three mores shelves leaving the bottom shelf in place to accommodate the occasional diorama with trees/buildings that may be slightly taller.

I used actual glass for my shelves but if you don't feel confident about cutting glass then polished Perspex would do just as well—most models are not heavy so that is not a problem ,the shelves are about 15 inches by 11.75 inches. I found glass in Home depot that was 12 by 16 so I just cut it to size.

The next thing was to find a means of supporting the shelves. I latched on to These things that are used to secure wire rope, I disregarded the big clunky thing and just attached the anchors to the internal wire ladder of the cabinet

Once I had all the anchors in place and checked with a spirit level I added some soft pads to the parts where glass would touch metal.

I used some soft self adhesive Velcro bits that I had lying around but there are a host of 3M products that could do the job, the main thing is to have some cushioning between your glass shelf and the metal anchor







The shelves were then inserted along with the original ones thus doubling my storage and display capacity. It cost approximately \$15 per cabinet to add three shelves per cabinet and I am very happy with the outcome.
