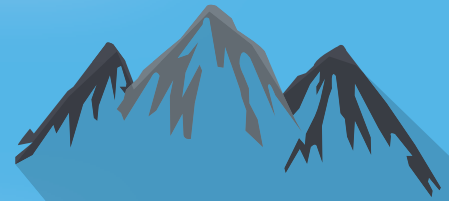
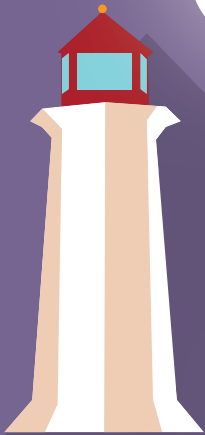

Indoor Exhibit Space (Contact the Commercial Director above)

The 2017 New Hamburg Fall Fair Indoor Display area will only be available for "static" display. Do you need to let the Fair Attendee's know something about your Business, your Services, or your Not-For-Profit Agency, this is a wonderful medium to do so with requiring and attending staff or volunteer. As about the excellent rates!

Set-up (for both Indoor and Outdoor) must be completed by 4:30 pm Friday, September 15, 2017. Dismantling will take place after 5:00 pm on Sunday, September 17, 2017 (not prior to the time). Limited electrical hook-up is available and extension cords are not supplied. Outdoor Vendors can utilize their own power source (i.e. Generators, Truck Engine support, etc.) presuming they do not interfere with our attendees enjoyment of the fair.

Indoor Exhibit owners and Representatives will have pre-arranged opportunities prior to the start of each "Fair Day" to review display status, restock and refill hand-outs, remove filled sign-up sheets, etc..This needs to be completed prior to the opening to the public. The contact phone number noted above will be used as an emergency contact for urgent issues regarding your display.

1. Every article to be entered for the competition must be the property of the person whose name is on the entry ticket.
2. Exhibitors must pick up their exhibits between 3:30 pm and 6:00 pm on Monday, September 18, 2017. **NO EARLIER!** Exhibits not picked up by 6:00 pm will NOT be the responsibility of the Home Craft Committee.
3. Every person not necessarily required in the judging area must withdraw while the judges are officiating.
4. No person shall be the judge of their own property nor be allowed to exhibit and judge in the same class.
5. Persons interfering with the judges shall forfeit the right to any prizes to which they may be otherwise entitled.
6. Only one entry shall be allowed to an exhibitor in one section of the arena classes.
7. In addition to the stated prizes offered in the listed categories, judges may award additional prizes they consider worthy and the directors shall determine the prize. Judges shall have the power to grant or withhold any prizes in case of inferiority in any class.
8. Although directors will take responsible precautions to ensure the safety of articles exhibited, they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owners must take the risk of exhibiting them and should any articles be lost or stolen the directors will give every assistance in their power towards recovery of the same but will not make any payment of value thereof.
9. The animals or articles to which prizes are awarded shall be distinguished by attaching stickers or ribbons to the respective animals or articles.
10. The decision of the judges shall be final as to the awarding of prizes. No appeal shall be considered except in the case of a protest. All protests shall be made in writing and delivered to the fair office on the grounds within 1 day after the judge made the award. Any exhibitor making such protest will be required to deposit with the Secretary, along with the protest a sum of \$20 to cover costs and if said is not sustained, the said among protest will be retained by the WAS. The President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Director in charge of the department shall be a standing committee to hear and decided all protests.
11. The WAS will withhold 10% of prize money received from cattle, sheep, heavy and light horse winnings. There will be no prize money withheld from entries in the-junior Home Craft division and 4-H. For all other arena exhibitors, any prize money received over \$10 will have 10% withheld to cover administration costs.
12. In the case of bad or unfavorable weather or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying the expenses and all prizes in full after paying the expenses, a proportionate amount, exclusive of membership will be deducted from such prizes to enable the Directors to balance the accounts without loss. The Directors feel that this course is the most equitable and fair one that can be adopted, as any deduction will fall proportionately on all those participating in the amounts collected and not leave the whole sum to be a debt to bear heavily on the WAS and thus impair its usefulness.
13. While the Directors of the WAS will use every available means to prevent accidents in and or about the grounds, it must be distinctly understood that all persons going on to or upon the show grounds must personally assume all risk of accidents or injury from an cause whatsoever.
14. The WAS recommends that all exhibitors and competitors maintain a minimum liability of \$1 million insurance.
15. Absolutely NO alcohol or drugs on fair grounds.

All information collected by the Wilmot Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other persons related directly to the business of WAS will be solely used for the purpose of promotion of the New Hamburg Fall Fair and for the maintenance of their files and database. Any member, exhibitor, sponsors or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the New Hamburg Fall Fair their names and photos may be published for these reasons only. None of this information will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

How do I enter my items for judging in Home Craft?

1. Obtain an Exhibitor number. This can be done by visiting the registration table inside the arena doors on Thursday Sept 14th between 4:00pm and 8:00pm. Each individual person needs their own number.

If you have exhibited in the past, please do not assume your number will be the same. Please confirm with the registration table.

2. Ensure each item you are entering has an Entry Tag (smaller brown tags, example on page 8). This tag needs to include your item's Class, Section, Article Description and your Exhibitor Number. ***These tags are available ahead of time at the New Hamburg Office Pro and will also be available on the Thursday night drop off night***
3. Complete your 'New Hamburg Fall Fair Entry Form' (the 8.5" x 11" page). There is an example of an entry form on page 10 and a blank one on page 9 for your use. These will also be available on Thursday night drop off night. Again, EACH EXHIBITOR needs their own individual form.

Please remember to complete ALL of the following information:

- Exhibitor Number
- Address
- Name
- Age (if Jr categories)
- Phone Number
- Class and Section for EACH ITEM ENTERED

Please do your best to not miss an item. You should have one line for every item you are entering. i.e. if you have 5 items to enter in the fair, you need to have 5 lines on this form.

5. Take your items to the drop off tables in the arena

- B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
- C. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the fair on sign provided by OMS.
- D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OMS Convention.
- E. Upon making an entry on to the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- F. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

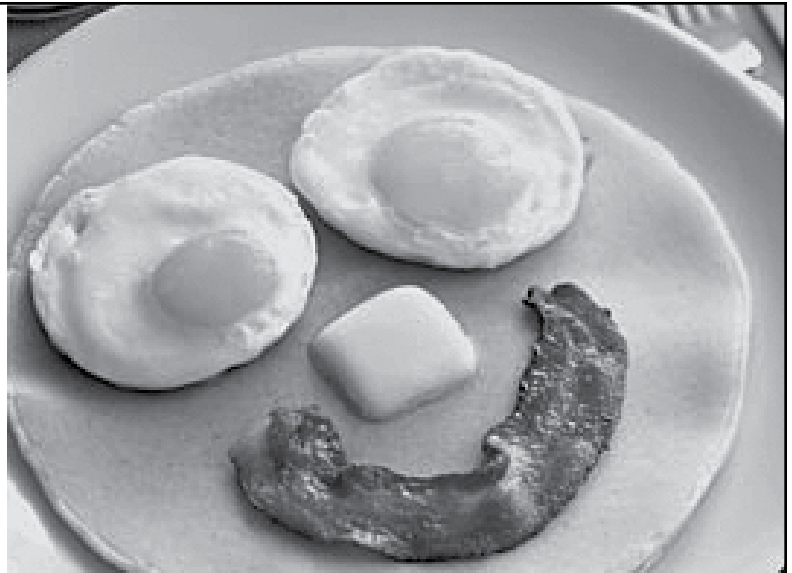
