

Rhinoceros

Rhinos live in rainforests, swamps, and grasslands in Africa and Asia. Their name means "nose horn". They all have big heads, large chests, poor eye sight, great hearing, and they all love to roll in the mud. They do this to keep from getting sunburned!

Rhinos are famous for having bad tempers, but they don't really. They startle easily because they can't see what's happening. That's why they charge.

All rhinos are herbivores (plant eaters), and eat grass and leaves. The black rhino has a special lip (prehensile) which can curl around leaves and grab onto them! This helps them tear the leaves off the trees.

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Rhinos are often killed for their horns, which has endangered some species


The Rhinoceros lives in the rainforests, swamps, and grasslands of Africa and Asia. They get their name from their horns. In Greek, rhino means nose, and ceros means horn. There are five different kinds of rhinos, but they all have big heads, large chests, poor eye sight, excellent hearing, and they all love to roll in the mud. They do this to keep from getting sunburned! Some people think rhinos have bad tempers because they often charge, but this is really just because they are nearsighted. They can't see what they are hearing, so they startle easily. A group of rhinos is called a crash! That makes sense!

All rhinos are herbivores, eating grasses and leaves. The black rhino (Africa) has a prehensile lip, which can curl around leaves and grab a hold of them! This helps him tear them off the trees.

Rhinos are often killed for their horns, which has endangered some species. The Javan rhinoceros, the only one to live in rainforests, is highly endangered.
