



CHINNOR CENTRE DAY CARE ACTIVITIES

The Friendship Club Managers Rowen and Emily have put together an exciting programme for the autumn and winter. This includes: Art Therapy; Hands on Heritage; the talking libraries; music therapy; seated yoga and relaxation; and falls prevention workshops. Grant funding from South Oxford District Council has enabled the Stroke Club to run a coordinated programme, 'living well after a stroke'. OPENREACH ULTRAFAST FIBRE BROADBAND PROJECT

There have been a number of difficulties with Openreach and their contractors (particularly in relation to underground works for ducting) in delivering the fibre broadband to the Crown and Stert Ends of the village. There has been no real progress for some months even with our constant badgering.

Recently we elevated the problems to Openreach's CEO and seem to now have some action and commitments. The ducting/underground works will be completed between the 8th and 12th September, this will require some works in the highway and some of this will need to be controlled by traffic lights, but no road closure is required. The fibre installation will be completed by 16th September and the scheme tested by 20th September.

Everyone who wants to in the village should be able to sign up to ultra-fast broadband within a couple of weeks after that, when the final administration has been completed. We will keep you posted.

Let's hope they deliver this time!!!!!

FAREWELL AND CONDOLENCES TO A SPECIAL GUY - GEORGE BOYTER


Artist, teacher, and a kind, wonderful friend.

Many of you will have known George. Perhaps eating with his late wife Mancy or drinking with his friends and family in one of our two pubs. He lived locally in both Postcombe and Aston Rowant.

George led regular art classes in the OST for a number of years, teaching various artistic skills to a group of local ladies. At a special WI evening many members were invited to draw likeness portraits of fellow members!



In January, George suffered a severe stroke from which he has not recovered and he sadly passed earlier this month. Our thoughts go out to his three grown up children – May, Fran and Fin and other members of his family. He is now reunited with his lovely wife Mandy who died in 2019. God bless a true Gentleman and friend of many.





A LITTLE BIT OF SYDENHAM HISTORY WRITTEN BY JUNE CRAY, CIRCA 1980

William Grendon, in 1374, was "outlawed for debt" and in the early 1600s, when Robert Coney was serving the parish, the revenue from church lands, intended for the upkeep of St. Mary's, was misappropriated for a period of ten years. William Stevenson did rather well; though he was vicar of Bledlow he was made curate of Sydenham in 1677, and received a stipend of £20 a year.

He neglected the parish and the parishioners petitioned in 1711 for a replacement, a villager named Alfred Carpenter. He had a licence to preach but was not liked by everyone, for Martha Taylor charged him with "immorality" and subsequently paid damages for defamation. However, the vicar of Thame charged him with being "a heavy drinker, a common railer and sower of discord" and Carpenter was duly unfrocked.

A hundred years ago the need for a permanent parson was recognised for "the younger population were in an almost perfectly wild state, and it became almost dangerous for a stranger to pass through the village, nor could he do so without meeting with some extraordinary rudeness". So the vicarage was established and Sydenham became a place of safety once more and soon after, in 1849, the school was opened.

The village was growing. Though we were still very much a farming community, a number of rural craftsmen and traders were established and another census, in 1851, reveals there were six bricklayers, two shoe-makers, a blacksmith, a baker, a miller, three beer retailers and two publicans, at The Sun and The Four Horseshoes, a pub near the post office which lost its licence in 1912. Fortunately, The Sun is still there, an "ale-house" since at least 1642.

Just how the village grew is shown by the school which needed enlarging in 1886, "to take 100 children" and its door remained open for 99 years though teachers complained of "irregular attendance" through agricultural work and there were very few in class when the time for "acorn picking" came around.

Arthur King left the school when he was 12, as a ploughboy on Manor Farm with 15 other hands – ploughmen, cowmen, carters and daymen and shepherds. "I used to walk to work, by oil lamp in the winter, and be back home again by seven for breakfast," says Arthur.

"It was hard work for two and sixpence a week (12.5p) and we had to walk everywhere. A pony and trap to take us to Thame or Chinnor was a luxury and I remember my mother spending hours and hours at lace-making to sell a bolt at the Thame auction for a couple of shillings. We were hard up but happy, we made our own fun and this was always a beautiful village, a lovely place to live."

So it is today. Much has changed yet so much remains unaltered. Our daily lives stretch beyond its boundaries, in some cases thousands of miles beyond. But at the end of the day, with a mixture of gentle relief and great pleasure, it is lovely to come home to Sydenham.


