The President's Message - August 2019

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER!

At the end of Luke 10 we are told that Jesus stopped by and visited with his friends Mary and Martha. By the conversation Jesus had with Martha, it appeared that Martha planned to feed Jesus and his 12 friends. I doubt that Jesus called ahead. I am sure Mary and Martha (maybe Lazarus too) were thrilled Jesus stopped for a short visit.

At the start of Luke 11 we are told "Now Jesus was praying in a certain place" (Luke 11:1 ESV). So it appears Jesus left Bethany and the next thing we are told He had gone off to pray by Himself. He got away for some private time. It appears that was important for Jesus to have his prayer time. The disciples took notice and finally asked him to teach them how to pray.

So here it is at the start of August. We are at peak vacation time before school starts. Before you know it teachers will be going back to school and sport teams begin practice in mid-August. The planes are full of families traveling, the Northwoods highways are packed on the weekends, and people are getting their lake time at the cabin before summer is over.

We are told by professionals that taking a vacation, taking time to relax, taking time for yourself, taking a walk, taking devotion and prayer time are all healthy things to do. Whether you are a professional church worker or not – you have vacation time coming and you should take it. People need it both physically and mentally.

Many of our church workers, as part of their benefits can participate in a program called Vitality. It is a health and wellness program that integrates healthy activities and choices into daily life and provides personalized feedback. The whole purpose of it is to keep our church workers healthy. I love it!

A part of being healthy is mental wellness. At the recent LCMS Convention in Tampa Resolution 3-04A was passed to deal with this – "To Encourage Training of our Pastors, Church Workers and Congregations to Recognize and Provide Pastoral Care for Those Suffering from Clinical Depression, Mental Illnesses, and other Mental Disorders." The resolution stated the following: "According to the National Alliance of Mental Illness, an estimated 22.1 percent of Americans ages 18 and older, about one out of five adults, suffer from an array of diagnosable mental disorders in a given year... and 70 percent have not had appropriate interventions to treat them." The result of mental disorder "has a downward spiral effect in families." The resolution encouraged that our church workers be better equipped to "provide ministry and compassionate care to those suffering from a mental disorder."

Church workers are hurting as well. In 2017, LCMS Research conducted a survey of the well-being of church workers and their spouses:

- 24% have been told by a professional that they suffer from anxiety or depression
- 33% struggle with compulsive behavior
- 26% have experienced serious marital difficulties while in ministry

Church workers are no different than the people in the pew. They too have families and they too need to be ministered to and receive compassionate care. All of us are in this together – making it through this journey of life. Healthy workers make for healthy churches.

My encouragement to you whether a lay person or professional church worker, most likely your health plan offers help in some form – so use it. Concordia Plan Services offers help for church workers. Take the time to go to their website (<u>https://www.concordiaplans.org/health.html</u>) and learn what is available as part of your paid benefit. It is there for you to use, to help you. Whatever plan you have – make use of the resources that are there for you. As God's people, we need to encourage each other. Pray. Encourage. Use the resources there for you to use. Finally, take the time to look into God's Word. It is encouraging!

Future Church Worker Grants Announced

37 grants to professional church-work students have been awarded for the 2019-20 school year, totaling just over \$101,000! Awards included 21 students attending four different Concordia University System schools (Chicago, Nebraska, St. Paul, Wisconsin) and 11 attending a seminary (two at FT. Wayne and nine at St. Louis). The other five were awarded for service at Camp Luther. These awards are outside of the fiscal budget of the North WI District, paid out from endowments created by generous donors. Churches and individuals are encouraged to donate to these established accounts to further support future church workers!

Serve in Peru?

The NWD has been part of an important mission in Peru for the past few years, with President Lueck serving on their leadership team called a foro. Working in partnership with the Office of International Mission, ministry in Peru has been making an important difference. This ministry in Peru is again ready to accept service teams into special programs for the 2020 school year. The Lutheran Fathers Conference

We are now in the midst of our study of the *Augsburg Confession* and the *Apology of the Augsburg Confession*, having completed through Article XV in May and will be starting Article XVI in August. Pastor Dan Pfaffe is our study leader using the Kolb Wengert translation (Fortress Press, 2000), although some of us use older translations to prepare. For class the text is shown on a large computer screen. In preparation, read or at least look at the next five to six articles, XVI through XXI, as these are shorter. We begin with fellowship at 9:30, Matins at 10:00, study at 10:30, break for lunch at nearby restaurants, and conclude by 3PM. There is no cost and prior attendance is not required. MINISTRY COMPLEXITY

Ministry is complicated. The complexity is increasing. There is an inverse relationship—as respect for the church decreases, ministry stress increases.

Jesus understands. He faced the same reality in His role as an itinerant Rabbi. Matthew 14 shares a fitting portrayal.

Jesus faced an emotional crisis. He learned that John, His relative and advance messenger had been arrested and subsequently executed (vss.3-12). Jesus' response was to find a "solitary place" (vs.13a). Jesus needed some alone time, away from ministry demands.

The crowd lacked understanding. Jesus' private, personal needs would have to be put on hold. They sought Him out bringing their demands with them.

It was time for compassion—shared with the multitude of needy souls (vs.14). Jesus' heart was stretched as He intermingled miracles and ministry.

And then there was the practical concern (and distraction)—providing a meal for the physically hungry (vs.15). Jesus was drained but still seized the opportunity to perform a miracle.

Over 5,000 were fully fed with "five loaves and two fish" (vss.17-20a & 21). And Jesus threw in a second miracle for good measure—the disciples collected "twelve basketfuls of broken pieces" (vs.20b).

Finally it was time to dismiss the crowd (vs.23a). It was alone time again (vs.23b) for renewal.

These are the lessons we can glean here from the Master-

- 1. We do not fully control our ministry, nor should we let it control us.
- 2. The demands in ministry are varied and complex.
- 3. Jesus was a non-anxious presence amidst the demands.
- 4. Personal renewal time is a priority in ministry.
- 5. Love is at the core of meeting people's needs in ministry.

Placing Christ at the center positions us to overcome the complexity of ministry. This is what He modeled for us.

"The No-Casserole Illness and How the Church Can Respond"

It's a conversation I'll never forget. While visiting with a local pastor one day about the mental health focus of The Lutheran Foundation, he shared something he did one Sunday morning in church.

As people gathered for worship, everyone received a sheet of paper with a list of ten questions related to mental health issues. There were questions like, "Have you ever been depressed?" and "Have you ever been prescribed medication for mental health issues?" Each person was to circle any question that applied to them.

When everyone finished answering their questions, the ushers collected them. They shuffled the papers and walked to a different part of the church to pass out those same sheets of paper. Each person was now holding someone else's paper (no names were on them.) The pastor then started to read the questions, one by one, and asked people to stand up if the question he read was circled on the sheet they were holding.

When people in the congregation saw the number of people standing up in response to each question, there was an audible gasp from the congregation. "Everyone thinks they are the only one living with mental health issues," the pastor said. Too often, the stigma is so great in the church that people are afraid to talk about mental illness.

While author Amy Simpson was growing up, her mother had serious psychotic episodes and was later diagnosed with schizophrenia. The family was always active in church. But when it came to her mother's mental health issues, there was silence and shame. "We needed community and loving friendships," she says. "The church is one of the only places left in society where that is readily available — at least in theory." Amy tells her family's story in her book, *Troubled Minds: Mental Illness and the Church's Mission*. Amy says the phrase is not original with her, but she often refers to mental illness as the "no-casserole illness." It's not uncommon for people from church to bring a casserole when a family member is in the hospital, or when there has been a death in the family. But when it's mental illness, people often don't call or visit, or bring casseroles.

However, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) reports that one in five adults will experience a mental illness in any given year. That also means one in five in our churches. Most people don't realize that mental illness is more common than cancer, heart disease and diabetes combined.

The Lutheran Foundation is focused on promoting mental wellness and reducing stigma around mental illness. Starting the conversation and silencing the stigma is one step toward healing. Sometimes those caring conversations happen best across the table... over a casserole.
