STATE OF THE BIRDS 2022

On October 12, the North American Bird Conservation Initiative released the 2022 State of the Birds Report for the U.S. A coalition of 33 federal and state agencies, bird-focused partnerships and nonprofit organizations, including the National Audubon Society, produced the report. It provides a stark reminder that many North American bird species are in trouble.

The report includes a list of 90 North American species that, between 1970 and 2019, lost 50% or more of their populations. Of those 90 species, the report singles out 70 as "Tipping Point" species. They include:

- 39 species for which current monitoring indicates they are on a trajectory to lose another 50% percent or more of their remnant populations in the next 50 years; and
- 31 species that already have perilously small populations and continue to face high threats, but lack sufficient monitoring data.

In the discussion below, Tipping Point species appear in red type.

Urgent action is needed to help Tipping Point species before they become endangered. In fact, one – the Lesser Prairie-Chicken – is already in the process of being added to the federal list of endangered and threatened species. On November 25, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service published a final rule listing one distinct population segment of this species (eastern New Mexico and southwest Texas Panhandle) as endangered and another (southeastern Colorado, southcentral to western Kansas, western Oklahoma and the northeast Texas Panhandle) as threatened. The rule becomes effective January 24, 2023.

BIRDATHON 2022 UPDATE

Congratulations to all on a good Birdathon again this year. We especially thank our sponsors and counters without whom the Birdathon would not be possible. We appreciate your participation and support for our conservation and education endeavors. Thanks, too, for our hard-working members who handle the details, especially Jane Fowler who handles the mailings.

This year presented some challenges. We had to dodge rainstorms and poor lighting because of the cloud cover. Still, some of the counters did well. The fall migration seemed to be light, but we had some early winter migrants.

Our net receipts totaled \$5,300. The money will go to chapter operations, Rio Bosque Wetlands Park, Audubon Texas, and Second Chance Wildlife Rescue.

Species seen by at least one counter were tallied. A total of 145 species were seen, compared to 122 last year.

The highest number of species seen by an individual or party were again John Kiseda, John Groves, Joe Cancellare, and Richard Hermosillo with 114. The most money was raised by Joe Cancellare. The unusual birds seen this year were the Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Common Raven, Blue-headed Vireo, Juniper Titmouse, Northern Parula, Bronzed Cowbird, White-throated Sparrow, and Lewis's Woodpecker.



AT FEATHER LAKE

After some modest partial flooding in September and October, the next long dry spell at Feather Lake has begun.

You can check out the dry basin at our next workday on **Sat.**, **December 10**, starting at **2 p.m**. The dry basin, of course, provides favorable conditions for trash removal, but, in the interests of variety, we'll stay in the uplands this time and

prune along the trail that encircles the lake. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North

Several birds found in Trans-Pecos Texas are among the 90 declining species. Nesting birds fall into three groups: waterbirds (Western Grebe, Clark's Grebe), birds that nest in Trans-Pecos mountain ranges (Olivesided Flycatcher, Black-chinned Sparrow and Grace's Warbler) and one grassland species (Mountain Plover).

Regular migrants or winter residents in the Trans-Pecos include Rufous Hummingbird, Stilt Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper, Semipalmated Sandpiper (rare), Short-billed Dowitcher (rare), Long-billed Dowitcher, Lesser Yellowlegs, Chestnut-collared Longspur, Thick-billed Longspur and Baird's Sparrow (rare). Irruptive fall/winter visitors include Pinyon Jay and Evening Grosbeak.

The report looks at trends for grassland birds, aridland birds, western forest birds, eastern forest birds, waterfowl and waterbirds, Hawaiian birds, and seabirds. All are in decline <u>except</u> waterfowl and waterbirds. Therein lies a ray of hope. As the report points out, "The long-term recovery of waterfowl and waterbird populations is largely due to successful policy (such as the North American Wetlands Conservation Act and U.S. Farm Bill conservation programs), along with coordinated efforts by public-private partnerships under the North American Waterfowl Management Plan." We need to extend and apply that model more effectively to other habitats and bird groups.


Cell 1 is just starting the flood.

The upstream half of the rebuilt former river bend within the park has plenty of water backed up behind multiple beaver dams. The downstream half of the old river bend has only limited water.
