

You WILL NOT NEED a REAL ID driver's license to come to Vegas in August!

On April 27[,] 2021, The federal government extended the deadline for enforcing the REAL ID[®] requirements to fly. This means that *REACT*ers travelling to Las Vegas for the 60th Celebration will not be required to have a REAL ID[®] compliant driver's license. If you do already have that license, so much the better but don't fret over it for the conference.

The new deadline is May 3rd, 2023. First time application for a REAL ID[®] must be made in person at your local driver's license agency office. Some states are allowing renewals to be done online. Check with your state.



Beginning May 3, 2023, federal agencies will enforce the REAL ID® Act, which requires a REAL ID®, U.S. passport or another federally approved identification to board commercial flights and enter secure federal buildings.

Please note: If your driver's license or state-issued ID expired on or after March 1, 2020, and you are unable to renew at your state driver's license agency, you may still use it as acceptable identification at the checkpoint. Due to the effects of COVID-19, the Transportation Security Administration will accept expired driver's licenses or state-issued ID a year after expiration.

REAL ID Is Completely Optional

You do not need a REAL ID® driver license or identification card to do any of the following:

- Drive
- Vote
- Apply for or receive federal benefits (e.g., Veterans Affairs, Social Security Administration, etc.)
- Enter a federal facility that does not require an ID (e.g., a post office)
- Access a hospital or receive life-saving services
- Participates in law enforcement proceedings or investigations (e.g., serve on a federal jury, testify in federal court, etc.)

A REAL ID®, however, might be helpful for anyone who frequently:

- Boards a commercial airplane;
- Visits nuclear sites;
- · Visits military bases, or
- Visits federal courthouses, federal prisons or other federal facilities

Keeping all of this in mind, we will see you in Vegas on August 8th!

GORDON WEST

"GORDON WEST on REAL EMERGENCY RADIO CALLS" (appearing by Zoom at the conference)

Hear radio operators transmitting life and death radio calls during emergencies, including fires, floods, tsunamis, car crashes, and the first 911 call over two way radio. All calls were real, and offer good training on how the operator signaled for help.

Gordon West goes back to UHF CB in the early '50s, then on to 27 MHz with 11W1769, 11W2534, and KMX8483.

West was a founding member of San Pedro *REACT*, when Hallacrafters started the program. His favorite rigs were a Class A CB Vocaline, Class D CB International Crystal "Ice Box". He later added Ham Radio training as a lifelong hobby.





ANDERSON BENNETT

Anderson Bennett, retired FCC field agent, to speak on FCC enforcement then and now at 60th Anniversary Celebration

Anderson Bennett (K6IDF) is a recently retired field agent from the Federal Communications Commission. He worked primarily in the southwestern United States and personally performed hundreds of FCC investigations in the personal radio services, from 1975 to 1982 and again from 2004 to 2019. He received the FCC's Employee of the Year Award in 2016.

He promises a revealing presentation that will cover the history and evolution of the activities of the FCC's Enforcement Bureau in its efforts to manage the personal radio services as it evolved over a period of almost 40 years.


Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department

Learn how the Los Angeles County Sheriff Department Search and Rescue teams use Technology to Aid in Search and Rescue Operations. There are many different ways to search for someone lost in the forest. Searching for footprints, clues, and signs, of someone being in a particular area very vital parts of any successful search and rescue operation, however, in the 21st century, there are many technological aspects of searching that come into play. Knowing if anyone is in a specific area or not comes easily with the information gathered from cell phone providers, which is then RF mapped to determine possible areas a subject may be in. In other times using LIDAR technology to "paint" a hillside in 1-2 Hour differentials to determine anything in the first picture that has moved in the second picture. In cases where we are looking for an aircraft that has gone down we go out and DF for the plane's ELT. There are numerous ways Search and Rescue teams are able to deploy technology in the forefront of an operation to help use our time the most efficient way possible to aid in helping our patients as fast as possible.

Opening Ceremony Presentation of Colors



February 28, 2022

Dear REACT Teams and Members,

The *REACT* International 60th Anniversary Celebration Opening Ceremonies in Las Vegas on Aug 8, 2022, is seeking nominations from all teams for Flag Bearers and Honor Guards. To be considered, the nomination for the flag bearer and honor guard must come from at least two teams and preferably be approved by the Regional Director. The regional directors are encouraged to attempt to make sure all teams are represented in the nomination process. Regions 1 through 8 will represent the United States only four nominees will be selected, two primary and two alternates.

Region 9 will have up to 4 nominations per nation from Canada, Nepal, the Philippines, and Trinidad and Tobago. If a nation has more than one team then the nomination must come from at least two teams. We ask the Region 9 Director to approve the nominations and attempt to make sure all teams are represented in the nomination process. The two nominees per nation that are not selected will be alternates. The Opening Ceremony Subcommittee asks that the regional director or their representative submit the nominations, to *REACT* Headquarters - Opening Ceremony sub-committee.

The selection process is not completely determined, but the selection process will be equitable and fair as much as it can be made. These are the preliminary guidelines: The celebration committee members and officers of *REACT* International will vote on the nominations. Those voting will be asked to abstain from voting for members on their own team or region for the regional directors who are officers.

Requirements:

- Nominees are in good standing
- Only one honor guard will accompany the flag bearer (We understand that most honor guards have a much larger contingent) Please adapt to the 2 Person Flag team.
- Please submit a verified biography for each nominee, the Master of Ceremony will read each Biography of the Flag Bearer after the Flagbearer has posted the colors.
- Uniform: White button-up dress shirt with no shoulder straps/epaulets. A team patch if the team has one and a modest national flag or national symbol patch may be worn
- The nominee will be responsible for travel and uniform expense.
- Approval of the Regional Director
- Nominations should be submitted by April 30th to Opening Ceremony Sub-committee
- It is expected that all nominees understand the protocols for representing their Flag and following those protocols in a dignified and professional manner

VISION: looks for opportunities to grow their skills and knowledge for the betterment of their team and REACT International; a positive team player in the team.

JUDGMENT: invested in the team's success; an ambassador for the team's mission

A REACT Teams' mission is to discover; preserve and protect their community it often depends on collaborative efforts. with the team's community and is frequently growing and challenging them to continue to improve means to effectively work across technologies, cultures, and boundaries. The collaboration can be within or across teams, public service agencies, local government, and NGOs.

Your team nominee should possess these essential Skills for Success:

INTEGRITY: A positive, honest, and diplomatic when working across teams, communities, and cultures.

INCLUSIVE: Creating a sense of belonging can be especially challenging in a truly diverse community and team and requires showing respect, openness, compassion, and empathy for others even in difficult situations. In addition, serving as an ally when others are being excluded.

VISION: Means to effectively integrate the work of our teams' programs. While sharing this means supporting and embracing change, and having a long-term vision, that supports bold ideas.

COMMUNICATION: Nominees must have exceptional interpersonal skills, the ability to clearly share their knowledge—both written and verbal, in a manner that is inclusive for all participants.

Nomination:

What we're looking for: please tell us about a team that has implemented a project or solved a problem that positively impacts their team and the greater community for the past years. Consider the criteria above when making your nomination

Examples:

Perhaps they responded to an urgent need in their community and quickly formed an ad-hoc team to deliver needed results such as facilities that helped with community recovery efforts, welcoming residents back after being displaced, or coordinating community-wide efforts to keep the community safe.

Or maybe they were members of a large project committee that rolled out a community-wide solution via a platform or system.

Maybe this team assisted in building care; helping to restore essential services or clearing roadways and delivered a particularly public or heroic effort this past year.

Group Nomination: If you know others who would like to nominate this group, you may do so as a group by adding the additional nominators' names and REACT member ID numbers to the online nomination form. Additional information may be requested of these individuals as part of the review process.

Self-Nomination: If you would like to nominate your team yourself for this award, please provide the names and REACT member ID of 2-3 individuals

There is no size limit for group nominations if you provide mutual aid to another team(s). Please be aware that due to time considerations we may not be able to name each individual in the group at the awards ceremony.

Eligibility Requirements

Certifying Organizations

REACT International is a Certifying Organization and the below information is here so you know what REACT International is required to do in order to certify these awards be given to qualified members. Certifying Organization is an organization that has been granted authority through an application and review process to give out the PVSA to volunteers. Certifying Organizations verify and certify that a volunteer has met the requirements to receive a PVSA within a 12-month period specified by the Certifying Organization. Only Certifying Organizations can certify volunteers' eligibility for the PVSA and order awards.

Certifying Organizations must be established and operate in the United States, its territories (Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, U.S. Virgin Islands, and Northern Mariana Islands), or on overseas U.S. military and state installations. Additionally, Certifying Organizations must receive or facilitate volunteer service.

Requirements of the Certifying Organization:

- Verify the volunteer hours required to earn the award.
- o Verify volunteers are U.S. citizens or lawfully admitted permanent U.S. residents.
- Pay the nominal cost of PVSA awards, including shipping. <u>Certifying Organizations may not charge</u> volunteers for the PVSA award and volunteers are not permitted to purchase awards.
- Receive and distribute the awards package to volunteers.
- Take the Certifying Organization e-course once every 12 months.
- Establish procedures to ensure compliance with PVSA eligibility and other program requirements.
- Conduct business both ethically and without deception. Certifying Organizations under criminal investigation, indictment or who have been convicted of a felony in any State or Federal court within the last two years are not eligible to apply or maintain the status of a certifying organization.
- Revoke a PVSA when information is presented that any awardee did not meet criteria for the Award. If the information reflecting ineligibility did not come from Points of Light or AmeriCorps, inform both parties of any such contemplated revocation and the justification prior to initiating procedures.
- Maintain a data bank that provides the capability to retrieve all information upon which an award was based, by individual awardee's name and year of the award, and certify annually to Points of Light that such data bank is being maintained and is current. The Certifying Organization shall maintain, as part of the databank, a checklist for each awardee by name reflecting that each of the required criteria for an award as detailed under "Volunteer Eligibility Criteria" has been met.
- If there is a time lag longer than 3 months between approving and purchasing the award and the actual award date, the Certifying Organization must recertify that the individual remains eligible for the award and maintains such certification in the data bank.

Failure to complete or support any of the PVSA program requirements may result in revocation of the status of the Certifying Organization and the associated volunteer awards.




Radio Communications and The Solar Cycle

The month of May is *REACT* Month, the National Disaster Prevention and Preparedness Month (NDPPM) in Trinidad and Tobago, and happens to be on the heel of a very heightened period of solar activity. In this month's article, we discuss the effects of the Sun on radio communications.

The Sun has a major effect on our habitat, the planet Earth. Arguably, it is a major contributor to life as we know it. Weather, ocean currents, season, and climatic conditions are also determined to a large extent by the Sun. Relevant to *REACT* and communicators, in general, is the effect, both positive and negative, that the Sun can have on radio waves.

The Sun goes through a cycle about every 11 years, whereby its magnetic field and activity levels change. These changes are manifested in the number and size of sunspots as well as major changes in other phenomena such as solar wind, solar flares, and coronal mass ejections (CME). The cycles go from a low period of activity to a progressively higher level of occurrences towards the peak, then drop off towards the solar minimum. We are currently at the start of Cycle 25.




Solar Cycle. Source: SWPC/NOAA

The solar wind is a continuous stream of charged particles (plasma) from the Sun that goes outwards into the solar system, towards Earth and the other planets. Coronal holes on the Sun at its poles and lower latitudes causes allowing these particles to escape and form the solar wind. The Earth's magnetic field protects us from the magnetic particles that are mostly deflected.




Solar Phenomena, including the Solar Wind. Source: SWPC/NOAA

Sunspots appear as relatively darker areas and represent lower temperatures. Remember, it is the Sun we are talking about, so lower still means an enormously high temperature. Sunspots are due to strong magnetic fields in the areas in which they occur. material is pulled back into the Sun, thus making it look darker in those spots. As sunspots represent areas where the magnetic fields are strong and concentrated, when those sunspots come into view, they release more ultraviolet (UV) radiation that impacts Earth's atmosphere in the layer referred to as the ionosphere. The ionosphere has layers, D. E. and F. The F region becomes more ionized and enhances HF radio wave propagation via a process called refr action. The radio signals are said to bounce or reflect (really refract) back to Earth, and you often hear operators referring to this as "skip" or "DX". The side of the Earth that is facing the Sun at a given time will have differences in the condition of the ionosphere compared with the side that is dark. Daily sunspot numbers and the associated solar flux index are published, which is a good guide on what to expect in terms of good or poor propagation. For the HF radio community, CBers, and amateur radio operators, high sunspot numbers are usually a good thing.





Solar flares occur in the area of sunspots, where there is a sudden burst of intense high-energy radiation. Flares appear as very bright and emit hard X-rays and can be classified according to the amount of flux. Solar flares can be C-Class (smallest), M-Class (medium), and the strongest of them all the X-Class (biggest) flare. It takes just about 8 minutes for the X-Rays to arrive on Earth, as the radiation travels at the speed of light, so there is no warning, and it affects us just as it is observed. Such radiation from flares cause ionizes the lower D region of the ionosphere, causing HF radio waves to be absorbed. If the D absorption is severe enough, like the X-Class flare, a radio blackout can occur. Fortunately, the effects are of relatively short duration.





As at writing, we have seen 4 X-Class flares for the year, all occurring in the past couple of weeks...and we are likely to see more and larger flares going forward as we climb in the Solar Cycle 25!

Coronal mass ejections (CMEs) are explosive events that eject a large amount of solar material. These particles are charged and can cause a shock wave and a significant increase in the speed of the solar wind. Earth's magnetic field can be affected. It makes a big difference if the CME is Earth-facing. If the CME is from an area towards the limb that is either now coming into or out of view, then the effects will be much less. The A and K indices are published and can be monitored for the effects of CMEs. The maximum usable frequencies (MUFs) can also be influenced. Auroral activity is also heightened with the arrival of the particles from a CME. It takes several hours to days for such particles to reach the Earth, thus giving some warning. It should be noted that CMEs do not always occur with solar flares.

There are many other possible negative effects due to the Sun's electromagnetic activities, such as affecting satellites and the electrical power grid, that we should, as communicators and volunteers in emergency and disaster management, be aware of. Hopefully, the information in this article will open your appetite to explore the relationship between the Sun and radio communications a bit further.

Happy *REACT* Month!

You never know where that opportunity will pop up.

I have spoken in this column before how easy it can be to get a 'star' to do a PSA (Pubic Service announcement) for your Team. Pay attention to the events happening in your area and when you see one where a celebrity will be, go there! Be prepared with a recorder of some kind, a microphone if needed and most importantly, A SCRIPT of what you want to star to say, assuming he or she agrees to help you.

I have always said, success is 10% prep and 90% hutzpah! Never be afraid to approach a star and ask them to help. They are human beings just like you! In the past, I have gotten country music star LeRoy Van Dyke and NBC Radio Talknet host Bruce Williams to do PSAs for me.

NEWS MEDIA

Cultivate a relationship with a newspaper reporter or TV or Radio reporter in your town. Buy them a piece of pie and a coffee. Talk to them and tell them what your Team is all about, what you do and why.

enough that they wouldn't appreciate a free cup of coffee and pie now and then!

And if they LIKE YOU, they are more likely to do stories for you. FREE publicity!

Important tip: When you call them, ask one very important question before you do anything else ... "Are you on deadline?" If they are, tell them you'll call back later.

Take my word for it, a working reporter will greatly appreciate that courtesy!

And last, but not least... FACEBOOK.

Yes, it can be a PITA at times but it can also be the best way to publicize your Team.

The Program Director showed us the button to push to talk to Post news of your events but be sure to include PICTURES and DETAILS. You were there but your reader on Facebook might not have been. Remember the '5 Ws and H" of writing—Who, What, Where, When, Why and How.

After coming back to the convention hotel, we were accosted Tell people WHAT you were doing in the pictures, WHY you were doing it, WHERE you were doing it, WHEN you did it, WHO was there and HOW you did it. Answer those 6 question in your article and it will be a success. Type it up as if you were telling someone in person what you did.

> And be sure to use one of *REACT*'s approved logos in your post! No, you are not claiming to represent REACT International in your post, you are representing your Team.

National *REACT* Month 60 Years of Public Service Through Communications

By the REACT Warning Team Heritage Project



1964 - REACT is an entirely voluntary organization. The individual REACT Teams agreed to work toward a 24-hour monitoring system on channel nine as part of their agreement with *REACT* Headquarters. Through *REACT* Headquarters, 40,000 active REACT members had organized into 1,000 local teams throughout the United States and Canada. Sponsorship of *REACT* was made in1961 by General Motors as a public service and as a highway safety research project. As early as 1964, REACT required all of its teams to monitor a single channel, channel 9. All who needed assistance were encouraged to call on channel 9. Thus emerged the concept of a single national emergency channel.



REACT Teams quickly found their services needed for more than highway safety. Mike Reese of Herndon (Va.) REACT mans the base station for his Team as they provide communications supportfor the 12th Annual Reston International Soccer Tournament, involving 76 youth soccer teams from across the country.

1969, thousands of volunteer monitors were handling emergency calls, with approximately two million radios in use. A *REACT* study showed that, as early as 1966, 1,800,000 incidents were handled annually on channel 9

The Birth of Channel 9

1964 – In a letter to REACT Teams, founder Pete Kreer suggests that CB Channel 9 be used for all emergency communications. The word spread through other media and by CB operators themselves; at the time, there were only 560,000 licensed CB operators in the US. REACT had grown to 600 Teams.

1967 — REACT petitions the FCC to officially design ate CB Channel 9 as reserved for emergency communications.

1969 – REACT, General Motors, and the Ohio State Police carried out a research project to show the effectiveness of CB radio for highway safety. Ohio troopers had CB's installed in their patrol cars for direct communication with the public. 1970 – The FCC establishes official rules, reserving CB Channel 9 for femergencies and assistance to traveless.

1977 - *REACT* launched its highway Safety Break program in cooperation with the American Trucking Association. *REACT* developed the NEAR (National Emergency Aid Radio) safety program for the U.S. government

A Team History: Ramsey County (Minn.)

Ramsey County REACT, serving the seven-county Twin Cities area of Minnesota, was chartered on May 10, 1974, and became incorporated in June of 1975. The Charter Members were Larry Andrele, Jim Brown, Jim Southworth and E. L. Esherich and Bill Mc Keon, none of whom are still with the team. Present members are Paul Oby, Gene Hess, Rick Link, Joyce Reed and Paul Munns.

We started doing communications for special events with the Roseville, Minn., Police Reserve as they had no communications training at the time and were unfamiliar with most any two-way radio service. Eventually their training included communications so we started doing Safety Breaks and communications for March of Dimes events as well as monitoring CB channel 9. Currently, we monitor CB channel 9, do three Safety Breaks each year, communications for the Rice Steet Parade in late July, answer phones for our local Public Television's four Membership Drives yearly, attend the International Convention, attend State Council meetings, belong to Minnesota VOAD, have a display at two Harmfects each year, have a display at the Association of Minnesota Emergency Managers, and participate in a disaster scene communications class annually, as well as any other events that we are asked to do whenever possible.

There were no uniform standards for SKYWARN that began in 1969. The program was struggling to establish a nationwide presence. The National Weather Service asked *REACT* International if they could assist, so in 1974 *REACT* surveyed its teams for the NWS in an effort to recruit them into the SKYWARN program. The *REACT* effort added several teams to National Weather Service resources. Altogether 93 *REACT* Skywarn teams were recruited by REACT Headquarters from *REACT* Teams on the east coast, 50 from the southern region, and six from the western region initially. Yeilding approximately 6000 *REACT* members who provided hazardous ground truth observations for the NWS offices initially.

REACT's Expanding Communications Capabilities



1980-1990 Although *REACT* Teams continue to monitor citizens' band radio frequencies; many have expanded their capability to serve all communications modes that the public uses. The '80s and '90s developed Emergency Communications capabilities with FRS or GMRS / FRS Combo Radios. No license is required when using the FRS low .5W power channels. For example, an RRI program called National SOS urges citizens to use FRS channel 1 in emergencies when regular phones and cell phones fail.

MURS or Multi-Use Radio Service Radios is underutilized, and some thought it would become the next CB radio band. Still, inexpensive radios were not yet plentiful at this time. At 2 watts, it has an increased range than FRS and is better in outdoor environments.

Teams widely used GMRS and continued to look at new technologies to assist their mission. Many *REACT* Teams still utilize General Mobile Radio Service (GMRS) radios in the 462 MHz UHF band. These are classified as commercial radios and require a license. The effective use of GMRS radios has improved by using repeaters and the 50 watts of power allowed.



Cellular phone service has nearly eliminated the need for Citizens Band monitoring and GMRS Radios. As all our partners were experiencing, fewer and fewer people were willing to volunteer for the good of their community.



Beverly F. Roland 1956-2022




