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Animal Families—African Savanna Matching Puzzles

Grades Ps-2

Fifteen puzzles help students learn the names of female, male, and baby animals of the African savanna. These cards are suitable for grades PS-2. There are two sets of the same puzzle—the first set (pages 2-5) shows puzzle cutting lines, and the second set (pages 6-9) does not. This is to allow you to use these materials in a variety of ways (see below **Uses**).

Objective: Students will learn and identify the different gender names of a variety of animals that live on the African savanna. They will learn that even animals from the same animal group may have differing labels (cats: lion, leopard, cheetah). Students will learn to read the words mother, father, baby, a, and is, along with the names of the animals.


Preparation:

- 1. Print pages 2-5 single sided on cover stock if you want to see cutting lines. If you don't want cutting lines, print pages 6-9, or print both! Make as many sets as needed (I suggest 1 set/3-4 students, or 1 set to be placed at a center).
- 2. Laminate and trim.
- 3. Cut the cards apart.
- 4. Use the image (above left) to label a zippered baggie. Store one set of cards/baggie.


Uses:

- Place at a center for individual exploration.
- Divide the class into small groups and let them work the puzzles together.
- Have students sort the pieces into animal groups, where the animals live (demonstrated by the location on the puzzle pieces), or by their gender names.
- Use the cards without cutting lines and staple them together to make a little book.
- Place the uncut cards in a pocket chart for whole class reading.
- In a small group, turn the cards upside down and have students select one at a time. If they can read the card, they may keep it. The person who has the most completed puzzles (or the most puzzle pieces) wins.
- Have small groups work with the cards and a parent volunteer who can guide discussion.






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15 Sets of Animal Family Images
