to go this way & that way -

Capsule Johnny Williamson?"

Johnny was certainly a Man For

of him being an Outside Man -  
Winter, Spring, Summer, & Fall -  
Outside working -~~

~~Then I thought of Robert Boltz's  
play entitled A Man For All  
Seasons that was made into a movie -~~

~~I looked up a summary of the play  
to refresh my mind -~~

~~Sir Thomas More was Chancellor  
of England during the 16th century  
under King Henry VIII.~~

~~King Henry wanted to divorce his  
wife & remarry - He wanted Sir  
Thomas More to agree & speak out  
in his favor.~~

~~The synopsis reads - " ... men  
like Sir Thomas More, who loves life  
yet have the moral fiber to lay  
down their lives for their principles,  
are found in every century."~~

~~I view Johnny Williamson as, such  
a man with strong moral fiber  
a man <sup>with whom</sup> who would <sup>rather</sup> die before than to  
sacrificing his principles.~~

A woman whose funeral I <sup>once</sup> held  
had written on a note for me -  
"When I die I want there to be  
a parade with me riding up front!"

Today is to be a celebration of  
Johnny's homegoing. He certainly  
was not one to seek the limelight -  
He was very <sup>modest</sup> unassuming with <sup>no pretensions</sup> no pretensions  
and <sup>unpretentious</sup> unpretentious.

As down to earth a fellow as I've  
ever met.

but today we are going to force  
him to ride up front in his  
parade  
; take the seat of honor.

If I had to choose one word to  
describe Johnny Williamson it  
would be "charisma"

Because charisma is undefinable -  
psychologist + sociologist have for years  
attempted to ~~to~~ determine - what  
is that attraction, that power,  
that magnet that draws people -

We don't have time to use all the  
words we think might define Johnny's  
Charisma - but he had it!

A humble man, sincerely loving  
and caring about people -  
An astounding down-to-earth quality

A man with amazing listening skills -

Conversing with many people is like  
trying to talk to the "Energizer bunny"  
They look around seeing what all is going  
on - you know they are not really listening to you

But when I spoke to this man he looked and listened so intently that you felt like looking away - for fear he might see into your very soul.

A knowledgeable man with a burning desire to learn right up to the end -

~~He~~ I visited Johnny on Friday before he died early Sunday morning -

The main topic of conversation was the Hebrew and Greek languages - Bro. Johnny used the term Agapee a Greek word describing God's Love -

He wanted to know if I had studied both - I told him I had taken 2 years of Greek

And he remarked "I wish I had studied Hebrew & Greek"

Seldom does a man give his own obituary, but Bro. Johnny gave me his a few weeks ago -

He was just out of the hospital & I stopped by to see him. Benny was staying with him that day -

I enquired "Where's Bro. Johnny"?

Penny looked a little dismayed as he said, "you just missed him, he pointed and said he went down that road on a tractor a minute ago - He's not too good at listening to me."

Does that sound familiar?

I drove ~~down~~ down the road + found him. He pulled the tractor up - turned it off and we began our talk -

"What in the world are you doing?"  
I asked.

"Ah, I just thought I'd break up this little ole patch - It's just right for plowing - well, maybe a little too wet in spots."

Bro. Johnny, Larry tells me you're having trouble sleeping.

Joe, I feel like I'm smothering - I'm afraid to go to sleep. I'm afraid I may not wake up.

Bro. Johnny - what difference would that make?

He gave me a slight chuckle & said -  
"Well, none really, but there's  
some people I want to tell  
good bye."

We both agreed that all of us need  
those things take care of.

We talked about the Lord Jesus  
as we often did -

All of a sudden he stopped &  
Johnny Williamson style looked  
me straight in the eyes and  
said "Joe, you know what,

Jesus suits me to a T.

I remarked

Johnny, that is good! I'm going  
to develop a sermon around that -
