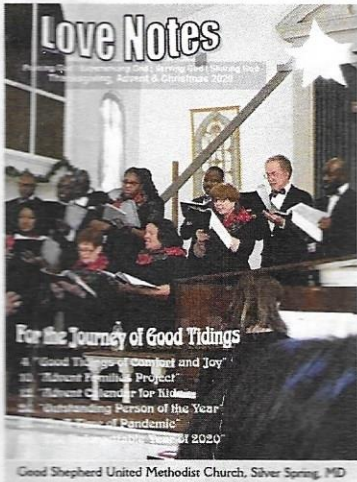

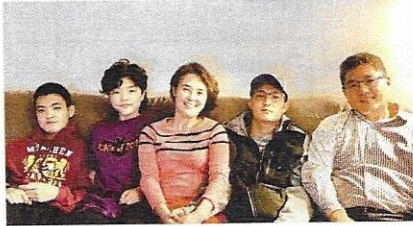

“Good Tidings of Comfort and Joy”

Friends:

Looking back last five decades of my life here in God’s good creation on earth, I just learn my years gone through the hope of good tidings.

The oldest memory brings me an image of Advent days of my father with strong and firm handgrip, hummed “Deck the halls with boughs of holly Far, la, la, la, la ...” is not so easily replaced in my heart with “Let it snow! Let it snow! Let it snow!” or “O Christmas Tree, O Christmas Tree!” – the carols I think I would sing hundred times during the season of Advent before my teen.



“Silent Night, Holy Night” should be the carol we the children and youth were asked to sing in the church with slow movement in a pretty dark stage in front of the church.

Passing through the years of Junior and Senior High, we compete one another who lifted up nice voice to scream “O Holy Night,” especially on the part of “Fall on your knees ~.”

The twenties were gone so quickly by. I remember romantic days with “white Christmas,” I’m dreaming of a white Christmas...” Often I wonder if I had longed for snow or for Jesus.

Living in American since mid 1990s, each year Christmas was an opportunity to give a gift back to Jesus because Christmas is His birthday, not mine or children of mine. I liked and still do “the Christmas Carol” Nat King Cole sang, perhaps singing in his style.

This year, COVID-19 pandemic allows me to sing more and more “God Rest Ye Merry Gentle Men Let Nothing you dismay” particularly because its refrain, “O tidings of comfort and joy ...”

Well, I would say that the carol was a voice from God. Early this week, I woke up with these two words— Comfort and Joy, when I was stuck with a main theme of new sermon series. As I had such experience almost weekly, God would give me insight for the weekly message as

I wake up with a few words in mind.

I believe that Immanuel (God-With-Us) would like us to come to a journey of Good Tidings.

How about this? Can you join me sing the carol while you read this?

*God rest ye merry gentlemen,
Let nothing you dismay.
Remember Christ our Savior
Was born on Christmas day,
To save us all from Satan’s pow’r
When we were gone astray;
O tidings of comfort and joy,
Comfort and joy,
O - tidings of **comfort and joy.***

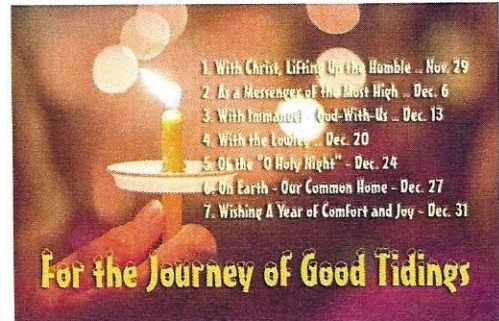

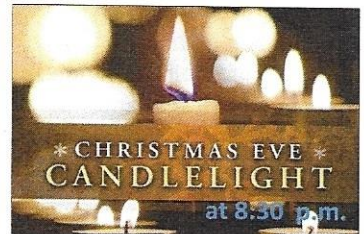

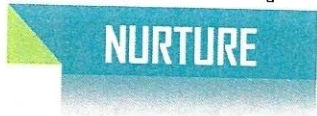
One of ways you live out scriptural ways of life is to carry your own bible. Some of you have bible app on the mobile phone. I pre-

Christmas with Children & Youth

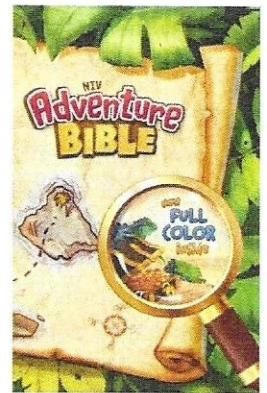

LEADERSHIP TEAM MEETING - CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING NOTES

Sunday, November 15, 2020

Via ZOOM as the Covid pandemic persists

The meeting convened at 1PM with Chair Philip Palmer Sr. leading his last meeting before his successor Christiana Tumaku-Campbell takes the chair.

ATTENDING: Pastor Park, Trustee Chair Dunstan Thomas, SPRC Chair Nathan Block, Finance Chair Andre Small, Finance Secretary Idowoo Boss-Cole, Trustees Carol Penne and Pat McConnell, Missions Chair Janice Taggart, Frances Tagoe, Sandra Craig, Suzanne Matthews-Williams, Philip Palmer Jr., Sandra Craig, Lay Leader Priscilla Michell, and Secretary Leilani McConnell.

We opened with scripture from Peter 2:14-19 and a prayer. Reports and discussion followed.

FINANCE – the church Budget for 2021 is still pending while seeking input from mission and work areas. Andre said if none are forth-coming, the monetary requests would remain the same as for 2020. (The Pastor's compensation package had been approved at Church Conference in October.)

STEWARDSHIP – Pledge Sunday was Nov. 01 but the current Covid pandemic which limits in-person attendance has also limited the incoming pledges. The Office may have some mail-in pledges not yet counted. It was suggested a letter might be sent to those who have not been attending the church or via ZOOM who have not yet pledged.

TRUSTEES – Dunstan reported that he had hired a towing service who are to install warning signs this coming week. A problem has been the number of vehicles parked in Pastor's space, handicap spaces and in front of the access to the dumpster bin in spite of their being signage to reserve them. Several cars park overnight or for several days at a time. He said towing would occur from 10 PM to 6 AM but this may be reconsidered.

We have three commercial trucks who pay us to park in the lot and the Agape congregation parks a van there. Those who are authorized will have their license tag numbers given to the towing company so they will be left alone. Pat McConnell is to create signage to indicate spaces along the north perimeter for these vehicles.

A concern is how much the church can impose regulations along Mt Pisgah Road. Montgomery County owns space 11 ft. on either side of the center of the public road and that extends into the graveled spaces on the church's east side. This includes the space in front of the dumpster. Carol Penne consulted with a Sgt. Moore from Mo. Co's 3rd District about this and he referred her to the County proper. We do not wish to face liability for illegally having vehicles towed.

It was suggested we notify our own and guest congregations of the situation. We will direct members who wish to park overnight or for extended periods to request a temporary permit from the Office which would then be posted on their vehicle to avoid towing. Dunstan added that some exit doors (entry into Jackson Building for one) need new locks.

Marcie Burroughs, Dunstan, Pat McConnell and others have been busy during the past months at sorting and disposing of accumulated items no longer useful. Some things were donated to the resale shop in Hillandale.

MISSIONS – Janice reported that the two Indian schools we have long supported were sent checks and drop-shipped school items this summer in lieu of the annual Shoe Box Project in which we collected, packed and shipped supplies ourselves.

Our partner Broad Acres School has not held in-person classes so we did not gift them with back packs this year. We did participate in Christmas in July, a Conference initiative, and gift cards for Target were donated to Broad Acres School parents so they could purchase clothing for their kids. The winter coat drive was cancelled. The Advent Family project will still happen but modified to the giving of gift cards rather than items. We will be helping two families: one with 9 members and one with 2. The Mitten Tree project to assist the Indian clinic in Wisconsin and another Indian School is pending. The Broad Acres Holiday Shop is cancelled for this year.

Christmas In April which we had joined for decades, was cancelled during the pandemic. It is uncertain whether it will be held in 2021. Moneys were set aside for the 2020 event and Janice and Treasurer Victor will determine what to do with it. As Janice said, we “are continuing God’s work as best we can.”

PRAYER CHAIN – continues on Wednesday evenings.

FOOD PANTRY – has been closed during the pandemic. As a result, some food items went out-of-date or were not usable. Carol and Idowoo last week cleaned out the Pantry with Coordinator Paulette Brown’s permission. 30+ bags of food items were offered to Broad Acres School who gratefully accepted them. The shelves were cleaned and disinfected.

Folks are still bringing food items and we may suggest they refrain from doing so for the duration of the Pantry’s closure. However, Idowoo said there are several grocery gift cards available and people could donate to those instead of actual food items.

TREASURER – Victor presented Balance and Profit-and-Loss sheets comparing 2020 year-to-date with the same period of 2019. We are down some in all areas as donations have declined. He has not been able to pay the Conference apportionments for several months but hopes to begin to catch up in January. (December is often a high-giving month.) Salaries and utilities and mortgage payments are up-to-date. We had some expensive maintenance issues in 2020.

This is Victor’s last year as Treasurer. He is being succeeded by Sunil Christopher whose appointment was authorized by the Leader Council and at Charge Conference in October. Victor affirmed he wants to have a completed audit before he hands over the books to Sunil. Meanwhile he and Sunil will need a transition time to make sure the latter is fully prepared to assume the Treasurer’s role.

Once that is accomplished Sunil will become a signatory to the church's bank account and Victor's name will be removed. Accessory signatory, Vernice Lee, will be retained.

The Council thanked Victor for his diligent work for the past ten years.

Andre Small is coordinating the audit.

Victor had zeroed-out several small monetary set-asides and reassigned those monies to the general fund. Priscilla, noting a line-item for a Tabitha Circle set-aside, authorized Victor to release those monies to the general fund as well.

Pastor reported that the Endowment Fund now has \$21,522 in it.

FUTURE OF IN-PERSON SERVICES – Pastor said as response to the recent significant rise in local Covid infections, the standards for occupancy will have changed. The current direction is 25% capacity for indoor events. If we count our Sanctuary's seating capacity of 400 that would be 100 attendees. Our normal attendance had been c. 130 on a Sunday and that would mean attendance of 30 to 40 if we continue to follow the CDC guidelines for spacing. (During the pandemic we have had ZOOM and Facebook streaming of services and many people "attend" in that way.)

The Chancel Choir and Praise Band have been performing in-person recently while wearing masks and all attendees also must wear masks and have their temperatures taken. Volunteers do clean-up and sanitizing after gatherings.

There is concern that our guest congregations also follow the current standards for attendance and post-gathering clean-up and they will be consulted.

There is a Baptism scheduled for Nov. 29 and the families will be notified about the attendance numbers. We have had family units seated together rather than each person's being six feet from his or her neighbor. As we often attract large numbers of family and friends for Baptisms, they could easily affect the total allowable capacity.

Philip Sr. was applauded for his tenure as Council Chair.

No other issues were forthcoming and the meeting adjourned at 2:45 PM. [LN]

Attendees: Dunstan Thomas (chairperson), Estuardo (Stuart) Coxc Barrios, Beresford Dakin-Davis, Vernice Lee, Pat McConnell, Bintu Murphy (Guest Church Coordinator), Rev. DaeHwa Park, Carol Penne (Secretary).

With a moment of silence to honor our friend and fellow GS member Timothy Afolabi who passed away on October 11. Timothy served many roles at GS – trustee, member of United Methodist Men, usher, communion coordinator and more. Rev. Park closed the moment of silence with a prayer for Timothy and his family.

Affordable housing – Good Shepherd received information about an opportunity, endorsed by the district superintendent, to participate in an affordable housing initiative.

Action: Trustees discussed the idea and concluded that our cottage is well used at the moment and we are happy with the current arrangement that results in income for the church.

Maintenance contract with Ron Shaw – Action: Beresford will reach out to Ron to negotiate a less expensive service contract that still appreciates his working knowledge of our HVAC systems but is 1) more reflective of the work he does for us and 2) in better alignment with the church budget.

Parking and access to trash containers – during the pandemic has led many in the neighborhood to take advantage of our large parking areas. The trash company can't reach the dumpsters because of

parked cars; the trash remains. Trustees discussed several possibilities for regaining control of this area.

Action:

Bintu will find out a towing company.

Beresford will look into getting “no parking on specific and days and times” signs.

Pat will come up with temporary no parking messages.

Carol will talk to the local police about what the church can and can't do to control parking on our property.

Status of guest churches –

Comforter's House Chapel continues to meet each Sunday; Without authorization they changed locks on the doors to their chapel without providing copies to us.

Action: Dunstan will contact Pastor Joseph to obtain copies of the new keys.

Messengers of God has not reached out about returning to the building.

Agape SDA Church notified Rev. Park that they plan to return to the building on Saturday, Nov. 1. Trustees are concerned because we have not received notification from them.

Action: Both Bintu and Dunstan will contact Pastor Manuel about their re-entry plans.

Security cameras – Dunstan asked about the status of this project.

Action: Stuart will install the final two cameras in early November.

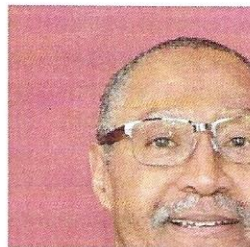

We are grateful for technology that has enabled us to "attend" via internet streaming services, but we miss the face-to-face greetings, the hugs, the bustle of conversations and the food! We pray in the new year we may again enjoy them.

Several of us have gone back to church within the constraints imposed by the Covid pandemic and we thank Elizabeth Schneider for her efforts in resuming the Praise Band and Chancel Choir and those who are participating so far. We are also grateful to Pastor Park and the volunteers who facilitate the Sunday gatherings. The rest of us, me and Patrick in particular, will continue to participate remotely for the time being, hoping for the anticipated anti-vaccine's availability.

Lots of good works have happened while the church was closed and later when partly re-opened. Lots of "stuff" was cleared out and lots of refurbishing accomplished. Dunstan Thomas, Marcie Burroughs, Carol Penne, Idowoo Boss-Cole, Pat McConnell and a few others did most of this. Marcie in particular spent days happily painting. The Food Pantry, closed for months, was cleaned out and usable food items were given to Broad Acres School who gratefully accepted it. Our traditional Mission projects, modified due to the pandemic, continued and as Advent approaches, we will support two Broad Acres families via gift cards rather than gifts.

While the women did not meet, I did attend two Church Women United events via streaming service, most recently on Nov. 06, "World Friendship Day". Items will be collected for Central Union Mission in DC and the Crossways Community in Kensington. (See reference after this article.)

We we have been mostly staying at home since March except for grocery or pharmacy runs, and we have stayed in touch with family and friends by telephone and ZOOM, and emails and snail mail.

I walk the neighborhood most days and have met lots of folks and their dogs who live near by. We all are frustrated by being inside so much and many who work are doing so from home. The teenagers we hired to do mowing are schooling at home, too.

I have gotten to know the streets of my community much better and I enjoy the colorful mail boxes and landscaping. Lots of Black Lives Matter signs and political signs (for only one of the candidates) and recently some cleverly carved pumpkins. We finally got some color in the trees before they lost their leaves. In summer I saw our small herd of deer quite often and on occasion red foxes.

Some days it is so quiet, just the odd twittering birds. More often the beltway noise and lately leaf blowers remind me we live in an urban area. I enjoy pondering the wet spots left on the tarmac after rains – they are like a Rorschach tests and my imagination is challenged. I was fascinated the other morning by watching a Disney-like dance of fallen leaves that had been

picked up by a vortex of wind. On one corner I pass frequently was a bed of black-eyed-Susans that bloomed nearly all summer. I regularly walk through the little undeveloped wooded lot down our hill that connects our street with the one to the east. (where I usually saw the deer). One day I was stopped by an elaborate spider web (and its creator) across the path so I had to invent a detour. I wonder how the spider gets the first strands connected from one end to the other, sometimes more than a foot apart. Do they jump? Do they swing? I may ask Wikipedia.

It has been hard not to be anxious or deeply depressed by the Covid and its effects on families and businesses and the stress of the recent election. Reading stories of lives well lived I see in the Washington Post, the outpouring of care and concern so many offer in response to the pandemic. has helped. I try to find something to laugh at or celebrate every day. I am closer (via ZOOM) to my nieces and nephews and brother – we “see” each other Sunday evenings. We have plenty to eat, a steady retirement income, a house and access to books and picture puzzles and TV movies to amuse us. We have had need of medical help this year and are grateful for being able to access it and to the care and concern we received from those professionals. We lost a sister / sister-in-law and a few friends to eternal life but are grateful for their long lives and our place in them. And we are grateful for having church every Sunday.

I admit to wondering what God is up to with this virus and the animus the country is experiencing, et al, but I appreciate the

insights Pastor shares with us every week and I apologize to God for doubting Him.

The world turns in spite of us and the elegant cycle of life goes on. We will soon acknowledge the major holidays. May we find joy in them even though we won't celebrate as usual.

Budget – Rev. Park complimented the trustees on their leadership during 2020 and thanked us for all our hard work cleaning and sprucing up the church..He suggested including capital improvement expenditures (such as new doors to replace ones that are in bad shape).

Playground – Trustees discussed the possibility of removing the playground equipment from the property. Rev. Park advised us of a grant program through the Baltimore-Washington Conference that would provide resources to improve the area. Two possibilities: install new play equipment or install a pavilion that could serve as a place for children and families to sit, as a place for musical concerts, etc. The goal would be to create a space that could be used by the church and surrounding community.

Action: Rev. Park will look into the details of the grant program.

Stoves –

- The industrial stove removed from the kitchen last year is still sitting on the lower patio outside of the Shepherd's Nook.

Action: Beresford will investigate getting a scrap metal dealer or someone to remove it.

- Two new stoves donated by Stuart's mother last year remain stored.

Action: Stuart's mother will remove them by October 21.

Memorial plaque for Timothy – Dunstan asked for details on how memorial garden plaques are ordered and paid for. He would like the trustees to cover the cost of one for Timothy.

Action: Pastor Park recommended Dunstan will follow up with Marcie.

 Rev. DaeHwa Park, Amy Caruso, and I met today for the cluster meeting. We missed those of you who could not make it. I introduced Beryl Thorton-Proctor, who is College Park's PMM Intern from Wesley. Mostly we caught up on how we and our congregations are doing.

Cristin, DaeHwa suggested that the churches could give gift cards for food for the students from University of Maryland for their use during prep for exams. If that is something they could use, he needs to know so he can request it at their council meeting. College Park and Mowatt would be interested in providing cards as well.

Good Shepherd reports that they have been meeting with a combination of in person and part on line. They have been celebrating Holy Communion monthly outside and were able to have two baptisms before the weather gets too cold. They are even considering replacing an old playground that is in disrepair with a concrete pad and canopy as a place for community gatherings and concerts. Congregational giving is holding at about 90% but the lack of rental income from use of the church is hurting them.

College Park and Mowatt were meeting together. We have been celebrating Communion in person on the first of the month, outside. But now with the colder weather and the new restrictions on gatherings in PG County, we are returning to all on-line services on Zoom and then posted on Facebook.

The remodeling is almost completed at College Park. The children's guild plans to open for 50 children age 3-5 in January. They hope to get licensed for 120 by next September. Their break even is 100 so if they don't get their permit, I don't know what they will do. But the new rooms are large and beautiful. The church can find uses for them if the Guild should leave.

Nueva Vida is mostly meeting outside, but the new requirement to wear masks and increased distancing outside will probably cause them to worship on line as well. The outdoor worship has led to two new families joining them on Sundays. They are collecting money to send to Honduras to help with the flooding from the hurricanes.

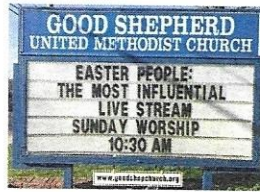

Green shade of the flames indicates God's Kingdom like "green pastures" to be unfolded as we do ministry together. The blue shade of the cross is consisted of the first two Greek letters of Christ, Xp. Through Christ the living water (John 7:38) the gathering of the faithful disciples shall bear fruits that last. (John 15:16; Psalm 1:3; 23:2; Galatians 5:22-23; Revelation 22:1-3). This vision of God's Kingdom comes from Jesus Christ, the starting point of our faith journey.
