



### Did You Know? Designated Funds Edition

Did you know that Hope UCC has six Designated Funds that you can contribute to in memory or in honor of someone or simply as a donation? Each of these funds are restricted in how they monies can be used and require Council approval to be used. It is the intention they will provide funds for projects and other things that are not included in Hope UCC's budget. In addition to these six funds, we also have a Pastor's Discretionary Fund that relies on contributions to be sustained. Each of these funds are included in Hope's monthly financial reports which show their balances and expenditures.

• <u>Mission & Outreach Fund</u>: These funds are used for projects that provide service and outreach and facilitate the witness of the congregation through the support of mission and outreach programs beyond those covered in the operating budget.

• <u>Memorial Fund</u>: Memorial funds are those gifts given to the Church to honor the memory of a loved one. These funds are used to fund a list of special needs as recommended by the Trustees and other ministries, and approved by the Church Council.

• <u>Faith Exploration and Youth Fund</u>: This fund supports programs of an educational nature that enhance the faith formation and service programs of our children and youth and our congregation.

• <u>Worship and Music Fund</u>: Provides for the upgrading and maintenance all elements of worship including the bells and chimes, piano, and organ, the addition and maintenance of other musical instruments, technology, and for other projects that shall enrich the worship experience at Hope UCC.

• <u>Building and Maintenance Fund</u>: Provides for the funding of improvements and repairs to the church building, all the grounds of the campus, and physical plant.

• <u>Union Congregational Legacy Fund</u>: These funds are legacy funds from Union Congregational Church and will be used to fund special projects and needs as recommended by the Union Congregational Legacy Fund Committee to the Church Council for approval.

• <u>Pastor's Discretionary Fund</u>: Provides assistance in a variety of ways to members & friends of Hope UCC as well as those with no connection to our church in need of assistance. The Pastor's Discretionary Fund at Hope UCC is similar to funds held at other churches in all denominations and is set up so that the money is spent at the pastor's discretion. Council approval of expenditures is not required. This is a fund that is managed by the pastor who is expected to thoughtfully and prayerfully use this money in a way that reflects our mission.

## Happy New Year and Happy Epiphany!

Epiphany is celebrated on the 12th day of Christmas which, this year, falls on Thursday, January 6. On Epiphany we celebrate the light that is revealed through Jesus's birth. The scripture text associated with this celebration is Matthew 2:1-12 which tells the story of the Magi's visit to Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus. As has been our tradition for the past three years, we will again celebrate Epiphany by receiving Star Words for the New Year. Star Words are a spiritual tool to help guide us through the year. Star Words are available for everyone – young and old. Keep the star close all year and use it as a spiritual practice to let the word guide your prayers and bring you into a new conversation with God.
