GOD'S MERCY: TRUTH BE TOLD



I never met it, but I heard so much about how the Church, unintentionally, ended up teaching and presenting God as a hard, judgmental, no-nonsense God. Following Vatican II, we changed our strategy and now we focus heavily on God's love, mercy and compassion, which is marvelous. The problem, however, is that we now downplay and even

outrightly ignore the reality of responsibility and consequences. We easily and comfortably forget that virtue does lie in the middle. Thus we've swung from one end of the spectrum to the other.

If we take time to sincerely read and listen to this Sunday's readings, especially 2 Samuel 12:7-13 and Luke 7:36 – 8:3, they have a lot to teach us. At the bible study last week I mentioned that we must read bible passages with the entire chapter and even book as the background, or else we'd misinterpret or even fail to understand the message the author intended for the audience and for us. Take the first reading for instance - David went from the sin of watching a woman bathing in the privacy of her home to desiring her. One thing led to another and she became pregnant. Failing to cover it up, he decided to get rid of her husband and proceeded to take her as his wife.

God was not pleased at all. So, He sent Nathan the Prophet to David. David was truly repentant and God pronounced mercy upon him. That's where the reading ends. And I thought of concentrating my reflection on God's mercy, especially since we're in the middle of the Jubilee Year of Mercy. I also know that many of us will prefer to hear that God will always forgive and forget our sins. That makes us feel okay. However, I decided to go dig deeper for a more complete message.

If you read on, verse 14 says this, "But since you have utterly spurned the Lord by this deed, the child born to you must surely die." Before that, verse 10 says, "Now, therefore, the sword shall never depart from your house, because you despised me and have taken the wife of Uriah to be your wife." The final punishment is found in verse 11, "I will bring evil upon you out of your own house. I will take your wives while you live to see it, and will give them to your neighbor"

And all three punishments all happened. Three of David's sons died violent deaths (2 Samuel 13:29; 18:14 and 1 Kings 2:25). 2 Samuel 16:22 tells how Absalom, David's son, violated David's concubines in the public. 2 Samuel 12:14 tells how the son born to David by Bathsheba did die.

In the Gospel, Jesus forgave a sinful woman who washed his feet with her hair and anointed them with costly ointment. This reading emphasizes God's deep mercy. Like this lady, we must believe in Jesus' mercy and the power of this mercy to heal us, to make us whole, to set us free, to empower us.

This is the balance I believe we need as we read this Sunday's passages and as we continue the Year of Mercy. To get hung up on the sad image of a God who is hard and judgmental is detrimental to our relationship with Him and could alienate many of God's children. To get hung up on God's mercy and compassion and fail to acknowledge our sins like David and the sinful woman is worse than the first. It's like having a deadly cancer and not even know it. And to continue to presume that there's no punishment for our freely chosen actions against God is to take God and His mercy for granted. That's how we've come to the point of dismissing Purgatory. Some people have even dismissed the reality of hell.

Fr. Andrew Apostoli gave a beautiful talk on Our Lady of Fatima on June 3rd. Part of what he mentioned was how Our Lady told the kids and the everyone to pray the rosary and do penance to avert God's punishment in the form of a second war. We know what happened. And when Russia was finally dedicated to Her Immaculate Heart, we saw the end of Communism.

Yes, our God is merciful, but we must live lives knowing that we're responsible for our actions and will one day face the consequences of bad choices. If our modern society lives with this in mind, I believe our world would be a lot better today. You and I can always lead the way.

ANTHONY OF PADUA Priest and Doctor (1195-1231)



The gospel call to leave everything and follow Christ was the rule of Anthony's life. Over and over again God called him to something new in His plan. Every time Anthony responded with renewed zeal and self-sacrificing to serve his Lord Jesus more completely.

His journey as the servant of God began as a very young man when he decided to join the Augustinians, giving up a future of wealth and power to be a servant of God. Later when the bodies of the first Franciscan martyrs went

through the Portuguese city where he was stationed, he was again filled with an intense longing to be one of those closest to Jesus himself: those who die for the Good News.

So Anthony entered the Franciscan Order and set out to preach to the Moors. But an illness prevented him from achieving that goal. He went to Italy and was stationed in a small hermitage where he spent most of his time praying, reading the Scriptures and doing menial tasks.

The call of God came again at an ordination where no one was prepared to speak. The humble and obedient Anthony hesitantly accepted the task. The years of searching for Jesus in prayer, of reading sacred Scripture and of serving Him in poverty, chastity and obedience had prepared Anthony to allow the Spirit to use his talents. Anthony's sermon was astounding to those who expected an unprepared speech and knew not the Spirit's power to give people words.

Recognized as a great man of prayer and a great Scripture and theology scholar, Anthony became the first friar to teach theology to the other friars. Soon he was called from that post to preach to the heretics, to use his profound knowledge of Scripture and theology to convert and reassure those who had been misled.

COMMENT: Anthony should be the patron of those who find their lives completely uprooted and set in a new and unexpected direction. Like all saints, he is a perfect example of turning one's life completely over to Christ. God did with Anthony as God pleased - and what God pleased was a life of spiritual power and brilliance that still attracts admiration today. He whom popular devotion has nominated as finder of lost objects found himself by losing himself totally to the providence of God.
