Egg Harbor City opens Nature Trail at City Lake Park



SustainableEHC, the city's green team, July 14 held the grand opening of the newly marked Nature Trail at City Lake Park.

About 30 residents attended the ribbon cutting ceremony, which included comments from Mayor Lisa Jiampetti, green team members who worked on the trail project, and funders from SustainableJersey and Atlantic City Electric.

The project included the installation of a trail head kiosk where a map of the trail and rules and regulations are posted, interpretive signage for Landing Creek and the Mountain Laurel loop, directional signage along the 2-mile trail made by resident woodworker David Williams, and benches made from recycled oak trees by Schairer Bros. Sawmill.

Friends of Egg Harbor City Lake Park assisted with several cleanups along the trail.

Mayor's Wellness Walk Route traverses city streets



For those not interested in taking a 2-mile walk in the woods, as part of the Mayor's Wellness Campaign, Mayor Lisa Jiampetti has established the 2-mile east-west Mayor's Walk Route along city streets.

Don your walking shoes and head out the starting point at Peace Pilgrim Park on the 500-block London Avenue, where a map of the route is posted.

The walk takes you along some of the city's less traveled streets, including Claudius and Diesterweg streets.

The walk loop heads east toward Havana Avenue, travels south to Campe Street and back London Avenue at Peace Pilgrim Park. A longer route travels past London Avenue to Washington Avenue and back to the park.

City Council to hold second public hearing on \$940,000 bond ordinance

The City Council July 13 held a public hearing and adopted an ordinance appropriating \$940,000 for various capital improvements and equipment purchases.

Due to errors in publishing in the Hammonton Gazette, the city's official newspaper, the ordinance was re-advertised according to law in the Gazette and The Press of Atlantic City for a second public hearing to be held 7 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 10.

The ordinance appropriates funds to purchase a street sweeper and several public safety cameras, wetlands restoration, and make improvements that will benefit the city's youngest citizens, as well as improve access to recreation for people with disabilities.

The capital expenditures come on the heels of the sale of the city's water and sewer utility to New Jersey American Water Company. The sale was approved by the NJ Board of Public Utilities and Department of Community Affairs, which required the city to use the proceeds of the \$21.8 million sale to pay off all of the city's existing debt and use 50% of the remainder of



27th annual EHC Olympics

The 27th annual Egg Harbor City Olympics will be held 10 a.m. Saturday, **Aug. 12** at City Lake Park.

The event includes fun kids' games on the beach and in the water, such as sack races, yard-dashes, handstands in the water and a swim to and from the dock.

The first EHC Olympics, started during the 1996 Olympic Games held in Atlanta, Georgia. It featured athlete and football coach Gary Melton carrying the Olympic torch he carried across New Jersey before the opening of the Olympic games.

Subsequent years featured notable area athletes, including World Champion rower Matt Guerrieri, a Junior Olympian swimmer and Absegami and Cedar Creek championship athletic teams.

Sponsored by the Egg Harbor City Municipal Alliance, the games are open to children pre-k to middle school, and include T-shirts, prizes and free lunch.

There is no cost to

the proceeds for community projects.

The ordinance will also appropriate funds for the demolition of an unsafe building on Philadelphia Avenue, electrical upgrades at the campground at City Lake Park, and improvements to the city's recreational complex at Key-Rec field.

The city has already contracted with KC Signs & Awnings to install a new electronic scoreboard at Key-Rec at a cost of \$32,680 through a cooperative purchasing agreement with Hunterdon County Educational Services Commission. Other improvements at the recreational facility are planned for the kitchen and snack bar operated by the Crusaders Youth Athletic Organization.

The City Council held a special public meeting March 30 at the Teamsters Local 331 Union Hall to discuss needed improvements, estimate costs and prioritize projects.

The council reviewed a long list of needed improvements and agreed to six major projects:

- wetlands restoration at the old water treatment plant on Liverpool Avenue and Claudius Street at an estimated cost of \$125,000;
- improvements at Key-Rec totaling \$300,000;
- purchase a new street sweeper for approximately \$200,000;
- electrical upgrades at the campground at a cost of \$175,000;
- provide a cash match for a \$400,000 grant received for ADA improvements at City Lake Park totaling \$40,000;
- demolish the old Weisbecker's dry cleaner building on Philadelphia Avenue at a cost of \$50,000; and
- install additional security cameras in the Downtown Commercial District at a cost of \$50,000.

NJ offers back-to-school tax holiday



With the back-to-school season right around the corner, the NJ Department of the Treasury is offering parents, teachers and students a 10-day back-to-school sales tax holiday Saturday, Aug. 27 through Monday, Sept. 5.

The tax holiday will cut the cost for the most essential items needed for educational success, and will apply to items bought both in-store and online.

Tax exempt supplies and equipment include:

- school supplies, such as pens and pencils, notebooks and binders;
- school art supplies, such as paints and paintbrushes, clay and glazes;
- school instructional materials, such as reference books, reference maps, globes, textbooks and workbooks;
- computers priced less than \$3,000; and
- computer storage equipment, printers and personal digital assistants priced less than \$1,000.
