TUBFRIM WINNER ANNOUNCED!



As you may, Sons of Norway is an annual contributor to the Norwegian Tubfrim program, which raises money to help children. For the past 27 years, our members have been clipping canceled postage stamps and sending them to Tubfrim, who then turns around and sells them to dealers and collectors.

Originally the money went to assist children afflicted by tuberculosis. Today, however, the organization also works to improve the quality of life for children and youth living with a variety of handicaps. Sons of Norway members play an integral role in providing this much-needed assistance.

Here's some of fun facts about Sons of Norway's participation in Tubfrim:

- •From January 1, 2010 to January 31st 2011, Sons of Norway members contributed more than 4,000lbs (1,835 kilos)! That's nearly 2 TONS of postage stamps!
- •Sons of Norway's contribution equals nearly 50% of all stamps sent to Tubfrim in a given year!
- •Tubfrim has a Facebook page.
- •Tubfrim is owned by the Norwegian Health Association (Nasjonalforeningen for folkehelsen). Today the profits are used to help handicapped children and youth in Norway, and to finance the efforts to eradicate tuberculosis.

While helping children is probably incentive enough for our members, Sons of Norway does something to thank those who participate by holding an annual drawing for a free plane ticket to Norway. For every pound of stamps collected, the member or lodge is entered into the drawing which is held every January.

This year's winner was drawn during an installation ceremony held at the Sons of Norway Valhall lodge 6-025 in San Diego, California. I'm pleased to announce that the winner is Lollo Sievert, a member from Vegas Viking lodge 6-152! Congratulations, Lollo and have a great time in Norway!

SKI FOR LIGHT AND OUR MAGNIFICENT ZONE 8 MEMBERS!!!

I can't tell you how many times I heard "the Sons of Norway people are amazing" (or any number of complimentary adjectives!) from Sunday Jan 30 through Sunday Feb 6, from the participants in the 2011 Ski For Light event at Snow Mountain Ranch (SMR), Grand County, CO! There were approximately 280 participants at this year's event, and our SON efforts were to assist their DIA arrival and departure, their SMR arrival, Norway Day, and race day. We had 50 members from 6 of our 7 Colorado lodges (the 7th lodge being on Colorado's Western Slope) volunteer to help however they could throughout this week. 22 from 6 lodges: Stein Fjell - Ras & Marian Erdal, Bill Nesse & Marianne Workman-Nesse, JoAnn Kison; Vesterheim – Steve Persson; Trollheim – Kevin & Janelle Mebust, Perry Monkelien, Bjorn Dahl; Fjellheim - Michael Johaneson; Storfjell – Diane Molter; and Fjelldalen – Lloyd & Donna Newland, Heidi Erickson, Jeanne Tucker, Dan Schauer, Helen Mulhern, Bonnie Hegge, Erik Collett, Gary Atkinson, Crystal Sundet spent long days at DIA – some from 7:00AM to 7:00PM - for arrivals and delayed arrivals - on the 30th. Everyone arrived, we got them to the buses, and they were on their way to a fun-filled week! Upon arrival at SMR they were met by members of Storfjell Lodge. With close to 150 visually and/or mobility impaired individuals, approximately 20 guide dogs (luggage & dog food!) to be escorted to 3 lodges with no elevators, in the cold and dark – this would be an achievement! Alan Sommerfeld, of Storfjell Lodge in Grand County, enlisted 28 Lodge volunteers plus members of Grand Nordic Ski Club and other local friends, to assist with participant arrival at SMR and to help with Saturday's race. Lodge volunteers were Alan & Karen Sommerfeld, Jon & Lois Hodne, Ransom Rice, Ken & Muriel Johnson, Jim & Sandy Pedersen, Debbe Knutson, Kent & Debbie Wehmeyer, Steve & Joan Ophaug, Toshiko & Yasuaki Ogishi, Josh & Maria Shreve, Joe & Julie Cunningham, Marian Barry & Bud Crawford, Bob and Kathy Mean, Mike & Jacque Ossian, Gary deVries and Ryan Jones. Monday and Tuesday were brutally cold, and many of the participants were feeling the effects of the altitude and the extreme cold. Some got out and checked out the race trail, some checked out other ski locations, some stayed out of the cold!

Friday celebrates Norway. Storfjell members outdid themselves, providing Norwegian cookies and riskrem for their Friday lunch. Friday evening Storfjell members and friends, Dist 6 President **Lyle Berge**, and Zone 8 Director **Crystal Sundet** joined them for their Norway Night Dinner and a short program from the Norwegian skiers. There were 12 participants from Norway – most of them guides. Saturday was the final race – it was cold and windy - and snowing! Alan, Debbe, Ransom, Muriel, Kenn and Kent were ski marshals along the race trail. On Sunday – when the participants returned to DIA – they had had a good week.

Our eastern slope volunteers were at DIA waiting for buses at 7:30-8:00AM on Sunday. After 18 hours of blowing snow, the 1st bus arrived late, but everyone made their flights. TV and radio reported that Berthoud Pass (the route from SMR!) closed – it closed just before the 2nd bus got there and they were told to turn around and go through Kremmling. Arriving 4 hours later – all had missed their flights and had to re-book for later flights. The last 2 buses didn't even make it up to SMR before the pass was closed. So we stayed at the airport – tending to those with late departures and waiting to hear when the pass would re-open. Late afternoon it was finally determined that the people still waiting at SMR for the last 2 buses would be bussed back to Denver yet that night, but to airport hotels, and they would be rescheduling their travel for Monday. Fortunately there were many guides on those buses, but it was a bitter-sweet ending for those of us wanting to be of help to these participants. It was a great week, and as your Zone 8 Director, I thank all of you who so willingly gave of your time!

IN MEMORIAM

William Dean Hill February 29, 1928 - February 7, 2011



William Dean Hill, 82, passed away Feb. 7, 2011. Survived by his siblings, Patricia Salvucci of Denver, Shirley (Robert) Kettner of McMinnville, Ore., Louise (Earl) Potter of Lakewood, Mary (Marvin) Motz of Alamosa, James (Janet) Hill of Toledo, Ohio and John (Cheryl) Hill of Phoenix, Ariz.; and sister-in-law, Linda Hill of Silver Spring, Md., Preceded in death by his brother, Perry Hill. William was born to Perry and Helen Hill on Feb. 29, 1928, in Hartman, Colo.

He was raised on a farm in Las Animas, Colorado, educated at Ft. Hays College in Kansas and at USC in Pueblo. He retired as a Master Sargent after a 27 year military career in the US Army as a counterintelligence investigator and a historian in retirement. He spent over half his military service in the US in Kentucky, Maryland, Georgia, California, Colorado, and two long tours at the Pentagon. Overseas he served in Korea at Pusan after the Korean War was over, then 2 tours on Okinawa. His last Asian assignment was in Vietnam and from there he was sent to Germany. After returning to the Pentagon he worked for the Department of Defense. He was awarded 2 Army Commendation medals and a DOD Commendation medal.

Bill was a member of Christ The King Church, Sons of Norway, Pikes Peak Posse of Westerners and he was a life member of the American Legion, serving as Adjutant for about 8 years. But most importantly, Bill loved his family. In his love of children, he always remembered nieces and nephews and grand-nieces and nephews on their birthdays.

A funeral Mass was held at Christ the King Church. Interment will be at Arlington National Cemetery.

The agreement comes as one of many instances when Norway has played an important role in supporting UNICEF's educational development efforts in poor countries. Norwegian Minister of Environment and International Development Erik Solheim says, "More children than ever before now have the opportunity to go to school. However, we must remember that a great deal remains to be done before we can say that we are satisfied. All children must have the opportunity to go to school, including those that are most vulnerable. We must also seek to further improve the quality of schools."

Solheim also points out that in situations of crisis and conflict, like the earthquake in Haiti, schools do much more than provide a place of learning. "After a disaster, schools can often be a safe haven for children. Here they can find protection, support, and not least health care and food," says Solheim.

Norway is the second largest donor to UNICEF, providing a total of NOK 1.3 billion a year. Adapted from NRK
