Chaplin's Corner

Masonic teaching of the Blue Lodge and multiple dependent bodies have in their liturgy the instruction "to practice those duties outside the lodge that were inculcated within it." What does this mean and how does it apply to our daily lives?

When I think of the word "practice" the imagery comes to mind of an athlete that practices the same thing over and over again until muscle memory takes control and it is automatic. A basketball player that spends hours shooting free throws — each time going through the same routine until it is automatic. Or a baseball shortstop that practices touching second and throwing to first for the double play. Practice makes the activity permanent, automatic, and performed without thought.

My father worked in a garment factory as a cutter for 45 years. His hands were enormous and strong. He taught himself to play the guitar during WWII and upon retirement he would spend hours practicing his guitar. The tips of his fingers became calloused and engraved by the marks of practicing. The hours of continual practice left permanent indentions to prove it.

It is true, practice does not make perfect. Practice makes permanent. The more hours spent in practice the less brain processing it takes to perform the task. It is automatic. Success is encoded by performing the action the right way over and over.

The teachings of our Masonic bodies call us to do the same, to practice and to train ourselves in what is good and right. Just as difficult musical renditions did not come natural to my father, so we must practice our actions to difficult situations, wearing a groove into our hears and encoding what God intends.

Like the Masonic Working Tools, the Plumb we are to walk uprightly before God and man; Squaring our hearts by the Square of Virtue; Use the Trowel to spread brotherly love; Circumscribe our hearts with the Compass that we live in due bounds.

Blue Lodge Masonry has the stated goal of "making good men, better". This is not a matter of becoming a better person. The goal is letting the teachings of the Lodge, and our relationship with God logically impact what we do every day. How do we handle a stressful negotiation, treat an irritating client, view our colleagues, no matter their position or disposition? Might these be opportunities to practice the working tools? Plumb, Square, Level, Trowel, Compass.

Can we practice Grace during turmoil? Practice contentment amongst those that grumble? Practice kindness when treated unkind? Practice joy and gratitude when faced with ungratefulness?

I have my fit-bit set to remind me to get up and walk every hour. I believe I need to add to this routine the practice of those duties inculcated in the lodge. Replacing the usual dirge with a new song. So when the inevitable happens I am ready and know it because I've practiced and it is automatic. It is engraved by the marks of practice in my heart.

"Practice these things, immerse yourself in them, so that all may see your progress" 1 Timothy 4:15





Clay Busters

The Claybusters Club is in full swing with opportunities to "put lead in the air" each month of Spring, Summer, and Fall. The Club welcomes recreational shooters, competitive shooters, and sportsmen alike. A wide range of shooting opportunities exist including Sporting Clays, Trap, Skeet, and an occasional 5 Stand. For the pistol enthusiast, outings to The Gun Garage offer an opportunity to hone one's skill at 10 and 20 yards. The Club is open to all Nobel's and their ladies.

Club President Tony Frye refers to Sporting Clays as "golf with a shotgun". That is a fair comparison Like golf courses, no two sporting clays courses are alike, and terrain and background have a lot to do with how targets are presented Since no two courses are alike, the Claybusters travel to



different courses to experience variety. Sporting clays is the closest thing to actual field shooting of all shotgun sports. Rather than having clay birds thrown from standardized distances and angles as with skeet or trap, sporting clays courses are designed to simulate the hunting of ducks, pheasants, other upland birds, and even rabbits. Mike Conley is often heard to say, "ahh, those rascal rabits."

Trapshooting is a game of movement, action, and split-second timing. It requires the accuracy and skill to repeatedly aim, fire, and break the 4 1/4 inch disc which are hurled through the air at a speed of 42mph, simulating the flight path of a bird fleeing a hunter. Our Arab expert Trapshooter Jeff Miller states, "Trapshooting's continual growth and expanding popularity is due to the fact that people of all ages, incomes, and abilities can compete. Nine-year-old boys shoot alongside 90 year old men. Many 70-year olds have been in the sport 55 years and some began just two years ago. It is much fun."







This is Who I Am:

The stories of Riley and Lily

Every year, Shriners Hospitals for Children® selects two National Patient Ambassadors to represent the health care system's patients. The ambassadors spend the year sharing their stories of perseverance in the face of adversity and the ways Shriners Hospitals for Children has made a dramatic, life-changing difference in their lives. Introducing our two new Ambassadors:

Riley

Riley, now age 17, was born with hereditary multiple exostoses (HME), a genetic condition which causes irregular bone growth. Exostoses are more commonly known as "bone spurs," which typically grow on the end of long bones during childhood and adolescence.

In Riley's case, physicians discovered growths from nearly head to toe through a full body X-ray when he was only 15 months old. Shortly thereafter, he became a patient of Shriners Hospitals for Children — Tampa.

Over time, Alfred V. Hess, M.D., the hospital's director of hand surgery, and Shriners Hospitals for Children — Tampa's Chief of Staff Maureen Maciel, M.D., have performed more than a dozen surgeries to remove growths and lengthen bones in Riley's arms and legs.

Riley has been a very active patient ambassador for the Tampa Shriners Hospital for several years. He also mentors Theodore, another child with the same rare condition, which Riley said is "one of the best things that happened to me this year." Theodore's mom said that meeting Riley and his family gave them hope.

Riley's family also supports a golf tournament organized by Riley's dad's former employer. Since 2002, the C&W Charity Golf Classic has raised more than \$500,000 to benefit the Tampa Shriners Hospital.

Riley is looking forward to the opportunity to share his story and help others as a National Patient Ambassador. He intends to remain part of the Shriners family.

"I plan on becoming a Shriner when I grow up," Riley said. I want to be known as someone who gave of his time and his money."

LILY

Lily, age 18, from Paducah, Kentucky, was born with fibular hemimelia, meaning she did not have a fibula, the outer thin bone that runs from the knee to the ankle, in her right leg. She underwent a Syme's amputation, which is an amputation done through the ankle joint that helps to preserve the heel pad, and she received her first prosthesis a few months later.

When Lily was 18 months old, she became a patient of Vishwas Talwalkar, M.D., pediatric orthopaedic surgeon at Shriners Hospitals for Children Medical Center —



Lexington. Over the years, Lily has undergone five surgeries there to straighten her remaining right leg and has received more prosthetic limbs than she can count.

Lily recently completed her freshman year at the University of Kentucky. Because of the care she received at Lexington Shriners Medical Center, she has chosen to study nursing, and minor in music. "I hope to be a nurse at Shriners Hospital after graduating," said Lily. "It is my dream to help provide the same care I received all my life to others as a way to show my gratitude for the Shriners health care system.

"Shriners Hospitals for Children has helped me to not see my leg as a handicap, and instead to look at it as a challenge," she said. "Because of Shriners Medical Center, I wake up every morning thankful for two legs instead of regretting that I only have one."

Lily is looking forward to being a National Patient Ambassador. "I am so glad I get to be a National Patient Ambassador and talk to other patients and families who are going through the same things," said Lily. "Somewhere out there is at least one person who needs to hear what I have to say."
