

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Bob Wixon's Patriot Ancestor *Henry Zartman (1745-1803) National No. 147593, State No. 1822* Henry Zartman was born about 1745 in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. He was the eldest son of Jacob, who immigrated at age 5 with his parents from Germany I 1728. The Zartmans had been winegrowers in Germany. With his parents and family, Henry moved to Northumberland County in 1768 where he became "a prominent, influential, useful and public spirited citizen in church and civic life."

Delegates from several counties were called to the state capital to consider the best means of opposing the encroachment of the mother country upon the liberties of the American people. Henry was among the delegates chosen to represent Northumberland County on the Committee of Safety from 1774-1777. He was also a Justice and a Constable from 1790-1791.

Henry married Elizabeth Hauser, whose father served in the Lancaster Militia in 1778 (at age 67). Henry's father, Jacob, also fought in the Militia at age 57, his name being listed on the 1780 payroll. Henry and Elizabeth had 9 children. He died in 1803 owning 312 acres named "Henry's Delight" and was buried in the cemetery by "Zartman's" Evangelical Church. Continued on page 3

For over 100 years a Zartman Family Reunion has been held near Brickerville, Lancaster County where the immigrant family settled in 1728, farmed, attended church and were buried. The family historian says that all Zartmans in America are descended from this single immigrant couple, Alexander and Ann Catharina and their sons Jacob and Alexander.

Chuck Walker's Patriot

Charles Robert Walker-Prescott SAR member on his 5^{5th} Great Grandfather, also born January 8.

James Barham (Jr.) was born in Southampton County, Virginia in 1764 to James (Sr.) and Mary (Thorpe) Barham. He entered the Virginia Militia on January 1, 1781, at the age of sixteen, from Southampton County. He served in Whitehead's Virginia Militia in General Nathaniel Greene's division. He was present when Cornwallis surrendered to General Greene.

"Three years after the Revolution he moved to North Carolina and lived in Wake (1785-1791), Guilford (1792-1798), and Stokes (1799-1812) Counties.

"In 1860 there was a celebration given in Springfield, Missouri. in his honor, as he was the only living Revolutionary Soldier at that time in this part of the country. He was presented with a flag, representing the original 13 states, by some young ladies of Springfield.

"James Barham remained in remarkable health throughout his senior years. It is said that at 100 years of age he could still ride horseback for a distance of 20 miles. It is further stated by filmily members that he never wore spectacles (eyeglasses) and at 100 years of age could shoot game at the distance of 100 yards.

He died at the home of his grandson, James Robinson, on Leiper Prairie, 15 miles west of Springfield in Greene County on January 8, 1865 in his 101st year and was buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. "James Barham was one of the last five surviving soldiers of the American Revolution who were on the U.S. Pension Roll. By an act of Congress approved February 27, 1865, each of the five surviving soldiers was to receive the sum of \$300 annually from the government, in addition to the pension they were already receiving. However, Barham died in January 1 865, just prior to the passing of this act, and the government had not yet received notification. The other soldiers still living in 1865 were Lemuel Cook of Clarendon, New York, age 98; Samuel Downing of Edinburg, New York, age 98; William Hutchings of Penobscot, Maine, age 100; and Alexander Maroney of Yates, New York, age 94.

Education Outreach

Steve Monez spoke to 114 students on March 28, 2017 at the Phoenix Christian Preparatory School. There were children from Kindergarten through 5th grades. The three sessions starting at 8:30 and continued through 11 am. He was invited by Kindergarten Teacher Elizabeth Gill, Paul Callahan's Niece. Paul is the SAR National Planning Committee Chairman. These children were very attentive and asked several good questions. Each Student received a pocket constitution, a money bag and a \$20 replica note printed by congress to fund the war. The students were told to read the constitution and sign the back that they promised to read or would read the constitution and sign above President George Washington's Signature.



General Washington shows a fire cake. The Soldiers and camp followers ran out of food at Valley Forge. They had flower and water and used that to bake fire cakes on Hot rocks. During this time when they had nothing else each soldier was given one fire cake, his wife received half a fire cake. Each child received a quarter of a fire cake. This was all they had each day. Many died of starvation, dysentery, and small pox.



Each student received a pocket constitution, a money bag, and a \$20. note replica of the ones used to fund the war. They received a pocket Constitution that also had the Declaration of Independence.
