# INI Café part of journey to Reconciliation

We have attended INI Cafe about five times, and hope to attend many more. It is a monthly gathering in the building belonging to the Indigenous Christian Fellowship at 3131 Dewdney Ave. This monthly cafe is hosted by ICF and Eastside with the goal of building bridges of reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous through the performing arts. Each time we get to hear an Indigenous and a non-Indigenous performer and have the option of purchasing delicious food and pop for minimal price from the canteen; and coffee is free.

Some musicians invite us to sing along and play familiar hit songs. Others play their own compositions. We laugh along with funny stories told, and cry as some of the artists share gripping stories from their own lives. Sometimes we come home with new CD's. Last month we met a family who had recently moved into the neighbourhood. We sit around tables sometimes with others we know from Eastside, sometimes with people we just met, and we've been delighted to meet up with people Sam knew from years ago. There is no admission fee; however there is opportunity for a free donation for the performers.

Hearing each other sing and listening to each other's stories is an important part of the journey toward Truth and Reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people. Check it out some time if you can!

## Leadership Team Update

ver the last year at Eastside, we have embarked on a journey to explore our community of faith. As many are aware, in 2018, Eastside faced many challenges. Our financial situation was precarious, and we heard from our community that we were facing many challenges. In response to this turmoil, the Leadership Team, in consultation with the Wascana Presbytery (now the Living Skies Region), embarked on a path to discern our path forward. This included a Joint Needs Assessment Process, a formal Review by the Living Skies Region, and the completion of the Eastside Faith Story. As well, the community responded in an amazing way, through financial contributions, engagement in this process, and an amazing demonstration of commitment to the Eastside community.

The Leadership Team, together with the Region, our Living Spirit Centre partners, the various committees in our community and many of us individually have done some soul searching. We have spent much time exploring what it means to be faithful servants of God in our time and place.

The result of this process was the recommendations continued in the <u>Eastside Faith Story</u>. These recommendations were approved by the congregation in a meeting on September

22, 2019. In a brief summary, the recommendations are as follows:

- Budgeted revenues and expenses can be supported through 2021
- 2. Eastside continue with the existing staff level, including a full time minister and a part time administrator, for the next 3 years.
- Communication around the financial wellbeing of the community should be critical moving forward.
- The community continue to hold Intergenerational engagement as a priority and consider whether this can

be developed through work with our LSC partners or the other Regina United Churches.

 We acknowledge that continued work needs to be done to balance the need for spiritual nurture and service to the broader community

On October 19, 2019 the Leadership Team, as well as representatives from the various committees at Eastside, met to develop an action plan as a result of these recommendations. These action plans are being fine-tuned, but a draft version can be found <u>here</u>

This has not been an easy path. Many of us are feeling renewed and reengaged, but many challenges remain. We appreciate that the financial distress felt in our community was the symptom of other issues that need to be addressed. Our job as a Leadership team as we move forward will be to continue to implement this action plan, and (perhaps even more importantly) to continue to listen to each and every one of you about what is working, and what is not. I wish to express my heartfelt gratitude for each and every one of you that have participated in this process and demonstrated how valued Eastside is to all of us. I believe that we are undoubtedly broken, but we do continue to be hopeful believers, and grateful servants of God.

Join us as we share in discussion, handiwork and coffee time following.


Starting in January, our craft study group will be reading *Church Forsaken: Practicing Presence in Neglected Neighbourhoods* by Jonathan Brooks.

Jonathan Brooks was raised in the Englewood neighborhood on the south side of Chicago. As soon as he was able, he left the community and moved as far away as he could. But through a remarkable turn of events, he reluctantly returned and found himself not only back in Englewood but also serving as a pastor ("Pastah J") and community leader.

In Church Forsaken, Brooks challenges local churches to rediscover that loving our neighbors means loving our neighborhoods. Unpacking the themes of Jeremiah 29, he shows how Christians can be fully present in local communities, building homes and planting gardens for the common good. His holistic vision and practical work offers good news for forgotten people and places. And community stakeholders and civic leaders will rediscover that churches are viable partners in community transformation in ways that they may never have considered.

God has always been at work in neglected neighborhoods. Join Pastah J on this journey and discover new hope for your community.
