QUESTION'S_{TO} ASK PRIOR TO VACCINATING

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According to the **National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986**, those administering vaccinations are required to advise patients of **all** potential adverse reactions: It is **essential** that you ask these questions.

- What are **all** the potential adverse reactions of each vaccine? (Look at manufacturer's insert)
- How many hours of training do you receive to identify and treat vaccine-related injuries?
- Do you report reactions to Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS)?
- Did you know that as of June 2016, there have been over 1,777,876 adverse reactions reported to VAERS including eczema, high fevers, paralysis, seizures and death?
- Is it true that according to the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, if there is an injury, I would have no legal recourse against the vaccine maker or your office?
- The MTHFR (methylenetetrahydrofolate reductase) genetic mutation increases the likelihood of an injury. Do you test for it prior to vaccinating?
- If they want to give your infant the Hepatitis B shot, ask, why should I
 vaccinate my baby for Hepatitis B since IV drug users and those that engage in
 promiscuous sex are more at risk for this disease?

The Vaccine Injury Compensation Program has paid out over \$3.3 billion of claims. It is critical that you have all the information necessary to validate your claim in the event of an injury. **PLEASE take the following precautions**:

- 1. Take videos of your family **prior** to vaccinating and record everyone's health status.
- 2. Record the vaccinations received on each visit, manufacturer, lot /batch numbers.
- 3. If you believe there has been an injury, record every detail.

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
