Classroom A September Newsletter

Welcome to all our new and returning families - it has been a busy September!

Grace & Courtesy

During the beginning of the school year, we typically focus on Grace & Courtesy in the classroom. The children have been learning the preliminary exercises such as unrolling/rolling a work mat, carrying a tray (work), tucking in their chair, hand washing, how to interrupt appropriately, greeting a person, etc... These lessons and presentations are given together at group time, and children are encouraged to participate and practice during the group lesson. Grace & Courtesy also includes the Ground Rules for both inside the classroom and outside on the playground. The 3 main classroom rules that we learned are: Hands are for Helping, Use Low-Quiet Voices, and Use Walking Feet. Both Ms. Alka and I give gentle reminders to the children of these rules and often our returning students help set the example for their classmates.

Peace Table

We introduced the Peace table area this past month. The Peace table is designed for the children to explore individually. It has only one chair, a small collection of peace books, and colored rocks to explore and build with. Also, as part of the Peace table, we added our classroom Stick Bundle. The bundle represents the positive energy and individual strengths of the children and teachers within the classroom. Each child chose a stick (which were previously collected from the playground) to add into the bundle and one at a time they



wrapped their stick with a multi-colored ribbon and added a personal thought or comment as they did so. For example, some children said they wanted their stick to represent feelings of helpfulness, kindness, love, or friendship in the classroom!

Yoga

Ms. Alka started her first Yoga lessons this month. These lessons typically are presented during the second group time, and then are practiced as an activity throughout the work period. A few of the poses presented were the rock, dolphin, and shark poses, along with a breathing exercise - "Smell the Flowers and Blow out the Candle". These exercises help relax both the body and mind and Ms. Alka does an amazing job with her presentations and practices.



Our first science, botany, and geography group lessons have started this past month as well. Throughout the year these group lessons will build from the previous lessons given, as well as other areas such as zoology, physical science, and history etc...

Science

We learned about Living and Non-Living things. For this lesson we read two books, "I know it is Living" and "I know it is Non-Living" to define the characteristics that distinguish livings things from non-living things. We read that if it moves on its own, grows, eats, and breathes, then it is living and if it does not, it is non-living. Sink and Float was another great presentation in September. The children then each had the opportunity to participate with these sorting activities during the group presentations and during the work period times.







Geography

In Geography, we introduced the Sandpaper Globe along with the Land, Air, & Water Activity. The Sandpaper Globe is used to help children develop a concept of the shape of the Earth (they heard it is a sphere). The rough brown areas on the globe highlight the land and the smooth blue areas are the water, and the air around the Earth is the atmosphere.

Botany

We spent a great deal of time learning about trees this month. Our first lesson involved learning the parts of the tree with our tree puzzle and a follow-up worksheet for those interested in identifying, coloring, and matching the main parts of the tree (roots, trunk, branches, and leaves). We also learned that deciduous trees lose their leaves, and that evergreen trees are always green.



Apples

Of course, we had to sample a few apples this month! Our class had a sampling of three varieties of apples: Gala, Granny Smith, and Red Delicious. Ask your child which apple was their favorite (hint – the apple prints they made represent their favorite apple)!

Autumn or Fall Equinox

Hopefully, some of you may have heard your child/ren explain Fall Equinox. We learned that the first day of fall indicates there is an equal amount of daylight and nighttime, and that the daylight hours would now become shorter throughout the season. We also discovered that the equator line divides our Earth into a Northern and Southern Hemisphere.



Afternoon Kindergarten Class





Classroom A kindergarten students are enjoying our daily chapter reading from the fictional classic, "Pippi Longstocking" by Astrid Lindgren! First we review and retell from the previous day's reading before we move on to the next reading. The students are listening for about 20 minutes per afternoon before they move onto other projects.

We learned that Pippi lives in Villa Villakulla, and she has super amazing strength. She can lift a horse that actually lives on her porch,

she has a monkey, Mr. Nilsson, that often sits on her shoulder, and she has two neighbor friends named Tommy and Annika.

Also, during our afternoon kindergarten portion of the day, the students work in their writing journals, and they are currently completing All About Me booklets!









Classroom B September Newsletter

Hello Families!

We have had a wonderful start to the school year despite the changes we made to our routines and classroom set up. The children are so adaptable and don't think twice about how the classroom differs from last year! The children are beginning to settle into the routine of the day and are transitioning well!

We learning the classroom and playground rules and are deciding how to choose a work, place it on a rug or table, clean it up and put it away. The children from last year have been wonderful role models to our two new friends as they "show them the ropes"! We also learned why our school is



called a Montessori school, and how it is named after Maria Montessori. The children know that she was a doctor who loved children so much that she made special materials just for them to use. To help explain why our school is called a Montessori school, we read a wonderful book called *Our Peaceful Classroom* by Aline Wolf.

We also talked about how we handle and work through disagreements with our friends when we read another fantastic book called *The Peace Rose* by Alicia Jewell.





The photo on the left shows the children what our classroom rules are. We hung this poster in our peace place. The photo on the right is how we sit at group time and use our whole body to listen. There are also the words to two new songs that we have been singing daily.

An important part of the Montessori curriculum is called **Grace and Courtesy**. In addition to the classroom rules, the children have also been practicing how to push in their chairs, use "walking feet", how to interrupt a child or teacher and how to say "Excuse me, I need to get by". The teachers reinforce and model these behaviors several times each day so that the children can "see as I do" and not just "what I say".

In **Geography**, we discussed how we live in a great big galaxy called the Milky Way. In our solar system, our planet is Earth. Earth is the third closest planet to the sun. We explored our two Montessori globes which sit on our Geography shelf.

One globe is brown and blue. This shows the children that the Earth is made up of water and land. We also discussed that the Earth is made of air as well. On the second globe the



land is colored. This is where we teach the children that the name for land is continent. In the Montessori curriculum, each continent is represented by a color. North America is orange. South America is pink. Europe is red. Africa is green. Asia is yellow. Australia is brown and Antarctica is white. As the year progresses, the children will learn to associate each continent with its Montessori color.

Our classroom also has a puzzle map of the world, and as we were looking at the globe, we wondered how we could make the globe flat like the puzzle. When we use the world puzzle map, Asia and Antarctica are split into two pieces but in reality they are connected. A popular Montessori lesson is to build a small Earth out of play dough to show the Earth as a sphere, then cut the earth in half and flatten each half. This shows the children how a map is made.

In **Science**, we have been talking about apples! We learned the parts of the apple and its life cycle. We also learned the names of a few of the many different varieties of apples and even had a chance to do our annual apple tasting! We tasted three different apples; golden delicious, red delicious and granny smith. We voted on the favorite apple, and there was a tie between the red delicious and the golden delicious! We concluded the month with one of the children's favorite activities - apple polishing!





In addition to apples, we learned about the concept of living and non living, and what it means to be alive. We sorted objects into each category and learned why a vacuum isn't alive even though it can move! Now that we understand what it means to be living, we have introduced the

concept of animals being either vertebrates or invertebrates. Again, we sorted the animals into groups of those that have a backbone and those that do not. During the course of the year we will learn about the classification of animals (mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish).

We acknowledged the Universal Day of Peace on Sept. 21 by learning about some wonderful peace makers like Mother Teresa, Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King, Jr. and of course, Maria Montessori.

We talked about how each of these individuals were peace makers, and what they did to bring more peace to the world. We talked about how we can be peacemakers in our classroom, and how we can be peaceful inside of ourselves. We looked at some symbols of peace, including a peace dove carrying an olive branch and the peace sign \oplus . We also read a wonderful book about how

we can be peacemakers in our own little world.
When I asked about how we could be more peaceful, the children had some really great answers. Some said that we should not hit each other, we should pick up trash when we see it, we should help someone who is hurt, and I suggested that they could help mom and dad by cleaning up their



toys or helping prepare dinner and helping with chores around the house!!

September was a fun month, but the children are really looking forward to all the fun that comes with Halloween!!

I just wanted to remind everyone that our morning recess time is around 9:20-9:55am. It is often still a bit chilly at that time so if you could send your child with a heavier coat and a sweater or a sweatshirt so that they can layer their clothes and then take a layer off if they get hot outside. I also do have extra mittens in my outside bag that I carry, but if you think your child may want to have a pair in their backpack just in case, that would be fine!

Afternoon Kindergarten

During our Kindergarten time, we explore in more depth what we are learning in the classroom. We use materials from our classroom and extensions like worksheets or projects.

This month in Kindergarten we explored the solar system, the layers or the Sun and Earth. We learned that the Earth is made up of land, air and water. We talked about the importance of trees and went outside for some tree rubbing!



In addition, we explored the differences between 2D and 3D shapes. As an extension of the shapes, we are learning about Wassily Kandinskiy and how he used a lot of shapes in his artwork. He also used bright colors to express his emotions. His paint style is called abstract expressionism and the Kindergarteners are in the process of recreating their own Kandinsky masterpiece!!
