4th Sunday of Lent - Year B 13th - 14th March 2021

First Reading: 2 Chronicles 36:14-16.19-23

The wrath and mercy of the Lord are revealed in the exile and liberation of his people.

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy. Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its Sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.' And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfill the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

When we were dead through sins, he brought us to life.

God loved us with so much love that he was generous with his mercy: when we were dead through our sins, he brought us to life with Christ - it is through grace that you have been saved - and raised us up with him and gave us a place with him in heaven, in Christ Jesus. This was to show for all ages to come, through his goodness towards us in Christ Jesus, how infinitely rich he is in grace. Because it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith; not by anything of your own, but by a gift from God; not by anything that you have done, so that nobody can claim the credit. We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it.

Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son. On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil. And indeed, For ever they are praising you everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed; but the man who lives by the truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God.'



4TH SUNDAY OF LENT - YEAR B 13th - 14th March 2021

REJOICE! IN AND THROUGH JESUS WE ARE SAVED!

In the first reading, taken from the Second Book of Chronicles, we learn the compassion and patience of God. God chose Cyrus the Great, a pagan conqueror, to become the instrument of His mercy to, and salvation of, His chosen people exiled in Babylon. In today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 137), the Psalmist voices the pain of exile the captives of Judah suffered. In the second reading, Paul tells us that God is so rich in mercy that He has granted us eternal salvation and eternal life as a free gift through Christ Jesus.

In today's Gospel, Jesus, the Son of God, becomes the agent of God's salvation, not just for one sinful nation but for the sinfulness of the whole world. Through John 3:16, the Gospel teaches us that God has expressed His love, mercy and compassion for us by giving His only Son for our salvation. Nicodemus, a Pharisee and member of the Sanhedrin, meets Jesus by night and begins a long religious discussion. Jesus explains to him that he must believe Jesus' words because Jesus is the Son of God, and, by referring to the story of Moses and the bronze serpent (Nm 21:1-9), further explains God's plan of salvation. Just as God saved the victims of serpent bite from death through the bonze serpent, He is going to save mankind from its sins by per-

mitting the crucifixion and death of His Son Jesus, because the love of God for mankind is that great.

We need to love the cross, the symbol of God's forgiving and merciful love: As a forceful reminder not only of God's love and mercy, but also of the price of our salvation, the crucifix invites us to more than simple generosity and compassion. It inspires us to remove the suffering of other people's misery. It encourages us not only to feel deep sorrow for another's suffering, but also to try our best to remove that suffering. Hence, let us love the cross, wear its image and carry our own daily cross with joy, while helping others to carry their heavier crosses. We need to reciprocate God's love by loving others. God's love is unconditional, universal, forgiving and merciful. Let us try to make an earnest attempt to include these qualities in sharing our love with others. Our rebirth by water and the Spirit must be an ongoing process. That is, we must lead a life of repentance and conversion which will

bring us, with the help of the Holy Spirit living within us, to an ongoing renewal of life through prayer, Bible reading, frequenting the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Holy Eucharist and doing corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

2021 Patrick Oration

On the feast of St Patrick, patron saint of the Archdiocese of Melbourne, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli will deliver the 2021 Patrick Oration.

The last Patrick Oration was held two years ago and since the 2019 Patrick Oration, the world has been shaken by the COVID pandemic, with Victorians experiencing one of the world's strictest lockdowns. And it is only in recent months that parish communities have been able to return to public worship.

Looking ahead to this year's Patrick Oration, the Archbishop acknowledged the dramatic changes that have taken place since 2019.

'I spoke then about needing to set out for new territory and to plant the seeds of the Gospel in amongst our people, in our families, in our local communities and amongst all those who seek to know Jesus,' said Archbishop Comensoli. 'Well, none of us expected COVID – and that has shifted us in such a dramatic way this past year.

'Once again, I will take the opportunity to set a sense of where I see us at this moment, and how we move forward. 'We might call it the Patrick Oration: COVID edition.'

The 2021 Patrick Oration will be held on Wednesday 17th March. The broadcast begins at 7.30pm and can be viewed on community channel C31 (channel 44 on digital TV) and via <u>YouTube</u> at 7.30pm.



National Consultation for Women

Catholic women are being invited to participate in a national consultation with two bishops later this month and to mark their diaries for a national gathering in September. The national consultation, which will take place on March 27 via Zoom, invites women to articulate and celebrate their contribution to and vision for the mission of the Catholic Church in Australia. Bishop Michael Morrissey, the Bishop Delegate for Women, said he is looking forward to hearing from Catholic women from across the country.

'The thoughts, the voices and the actions of women within the Catholic Church are absolutely central to our life and mission, and the national consultation invites a sharing and listening that will benefit the whole Church,' he said. 'This process is something new, embracing the changing technological landscape, and seeking to remove some of the obstacles like distance and access. 'All the bishops have women acting in senior roles within their dioceses; this conversation provides another forum for broader national conversation.'

Clara Geoghegan, the executive secretary of the Bishops Commission and the coordinator of the consultation, said women she had spoken with were supportive of the idea of a national conversation.

'Our Church has become increasingly comfortable with the notion of listening and dialogue, in part because of the Plenary Council's invitation to engage in that way,' she said.

'Women are looking forward to the opportunity to speak with the two bishops and with one another and, as invited by the great document <u>Gaudium et Spes</u>, to share their joys and their hopes, their griefs and their anxieties, for the Church in Australia.'

Bishop Morrissey said the Catholic Women's Gathering will follow a format developed for the inaugural Catholic Men's Gathering held last year.

'Indeed, the idea for the Catholic Men's Gathering came off the back of the successful Catholic Women's Colloquium, which was established many years ago,' he said.

The Women's Gathering will be held on September 11th, with more information to be published in the coming weeks.
