As long as the ship keeps the water on the outside it will float. So the Christian only sinks when he lets the trouble on the inside." Trials are to make us grow and become strong. The weight of trials give our spiritual feet traction on this road from earth to Glory.

The 11th chapter of Hebrews, "Gods Hall of Fame" is the best reading I know for encouragement in the heat of the battle. All the great men and women of the Bible endured much harder afflictions than you and I and yet with ultimate victory. They turned their burdens to blessings and their trials to triumphs by trusting in God's strength and power. Is He less concerned for you and me than He was for them? I think not!





We would like to say the tour was a big success in every way. Applications for enrollment are still coming in and at this point we expect a full house. We again want to say thanks to all the pastors, churches, and people for all the kindnesses you showed to us while we were in your churches. Thanks for the financial support you gave to each of us, and the help given to the school.

I want to say a word of thanks to the young people who traveled with me on this tour: Janeece Randolph, Karen Crouse, Teloa Stanberry, Jimmy Botter, Marlan Sparks, Gerald Oaks, and Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Arnall. These young people did a great job and were great to travel with the entire time.

After all expenses of the trip were paid, it was the desire of the Bible School Board to apply the balance of the money on the note still owed on the bus. There was a balance of \$3,000.00 and when we completed the trip, Bro. Bill Hollis, Rev. Roland Busch, Rev. Ted Barker and myself went to the bank and paid the note in full. This was a happy day for all of us. Just 19 months ago this bus was purchased at a price of \$13,000.00 plus interest. We feel the people of the Apostolic Faith Movement and other interested people have done a tremendous job in paying this note off so soon. The bus is of great value to our school and movement and already over 45,000 miles have been put on it on trips with the Bible School Choir and the annual tour each year. Bloom You Are Planted

Have you considered how important the beautiful things of God's creation are to our lives? After the long grey cold winter, it is so wonderful to see every tree and flower begin to bud and bloom and literally "decorate" our world, from the busiest city to the most forgotten field or pasture.

While reading an article recently by Mrs. Ruth Peale, in which she stated the importance of us "blooming where we are planted", a special message was brought home to me as I realized that surely God has a special purpose for every daisy and buttercup as well as the orchid or the gardenia. He desires beauty from our lives regardless of "where we are planted".

Are you "planted" in a home, an office, a classroom, factory or business?" God has a special purpose for you being there. Often the statement is made "oh, I'm just a housewife" — but let me tell you, this is the highest calling of a woman's life. My family, that God has entrusted me with, are the most important people in all the world to me. Remember the home and family were instituted before any other career and if I can give of my best to my family and children I believe God will honor and bring greater joy to my life for that than any other thing in the world.

What about the preparation we make in serving a meal to our families? Do we save the good table cloth and the best china for company? Shouldn't we treat our family as company; after all they should mean so much more to us than any guest we could serve. There is something special about putting a candle on the table every now and then — that can make even left-overs seem like a banquet. And as I sat in that hospital room one night and looked at all the beautiful flowers that had been sent in — somehow the radiance of that nurse's life outshown every blossom in the room.

Let us pray that God will use our lives to bless and enrich the lives of others, for we may be the only blossom He has in that particular spot. - A DEACON MUST BE A MAN OF -
- GOOD REPORT (Acts 6:3)—He must be a man of good reputation among those in the church as well as those outside the church.
- 2. "FULL OF THE HOLY SPIRIT" (Acts 6:3) Littleness in the church is harmful. Churches should choose "big men" as deacons; men who have experienced redemption through Christ; men whose lives are directed by and surrendered to the Holy Spirit.
- 3. "FULL OF WISDOM" (Acts 6:3) More than human wisdom is needed. What is needed is wisdom that comes from the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit.
- 4. "FULL OF FAITH" (Acts 6:5) A man who is filled with faith is confident of the ultimate triumph of righteousness.
- 5. "GRAVE" (I Timothy 3:8) He should be able to consider seriously the important things of life. He places great value on spiritual matters.
- 6. "NOT DOUBLE-TONGUES" (I Timothy 3.8) He is dependable and responsible.
- 7. "NOT GIVEN TO MUCH WINE" (I Timothy 3:8) Not only is total abstinence required, but disassociation from any connection with the alcoholic beverage industry.
- 8. "NOT GREEDY OF FILTHY LUCRE" (I Timothy 3:8) His business dealings must be honorable and fair and considerate
- 9. A HOLDER OF THE FAITH (I Timothy 3:9) The deacon must be a man of conviction. He believes the basic Bible doctrines as his church interprets them.
- 10. TESTED AND PROVED (I Timothy 3:10) He should, through his life and practice, prove himself qualified and worthy for the office of deacon.
- 11. "BLAMELESS" (I Timothy 3:10) His life and service should be so exemplary that no charge can be brought against him.
- 12. HOME LIFE (I Timothy 3:11,12) All qualifications will find their best expressions in the home where every man has his best opportunity to be a Christian influence.
- 13. "HUSBAND OF ONE WIFE" (I Timothy 3:12) The deacon's home is to be an example of unity and solidarity in God's will.
- 14. RULE THEIR CHILDREN AND THEIR HOUSES (I Timothy 3:12) He will manage his home well. He is loved and respected by his wife and children. He should be firm, but with the compassion and tenderness of Christ.





The office of deacon is almost as old as the church (Acts 6:1-7). Though preceded by the clergy in both history and position, the opportunities for service are many at this level of lay participation.

Some pastors experience communication failure with their deacon boards and vice-versa. A contributing cause may stem from a lack of understanding the role of deacon.

Purpose

The Early Church recorded phenomenal growth. As the disciples continued to multiply, a complaint arose from the Grecians who felt their widows received less food than the Hebrews in the daily distribution.

The church initiated action to select a committee of capable men to resolve this conflict and bring unity between factions. The qualifications, destined to stand the test of time, would require men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost, and endowed with wisdom.

These laymen would fulfill a supporting role to the clergy, complementing the work of the ministry. Appointed to the business at hand in serving tables, they would release the spiritual leaders to give full attention to prayer and propagation of the Word.

The individuals chosen were men stable in the faith as were their pastors. They were temperate, earnest, with character and abilities already proved by lesser responsibilities. It was required that they have good wives and families as examples to the congregation. Men of like caliber are still in demand 20 centuries later.

Practice

Duties of deacons are multiple and may vary with each assembly. However, several basic principles guide their activities toward common goals—the glory of God and the welfare of the church.

Faithfulness is the prime quality looked for in men who serve the house of God. Regular and special meetings of the official board require their presence, punctuality, and participation. The pastor finds these occasions beneficial as he seeks their advice and counsel.

Confidence is mandatory in certain matters under discussion or review, while a steady hand is necessary in problem areas. As good stewards, deacons are often called upon to approve expenditures

In many assemblies they serve as the pulpit committee in times of pastoral change to interview applicants and recommend a candidate.

Loyalty is another important ractor in good deacons. Respect for their position begins with acknowledgment of the pastor as the spiritual leader of the church. They support him publicly and privately.

In making decisions, the board looks for the most good for the most people, and what is best in God's will. Never would they act because of anger or duress, but always prayerfully, making decisions with respect and support for majority rule.

Responsiveness is an admirable trait in religious leaders, especially deacons. They should always be sensitive to the needs and opinions

of the congregation, and inform the pastor when called upon. Their perspective should be an objective overview unaffected by personal prejudice.

Good deacons give attention to the maintenance of physical facilities while aware of growth needs and future planning. They also seek ways to better care for the temporal needs of their pastor, with an annual review of salary and benefits. Alert laymen can spare their minister embarrassment with awareness of his financial situation in light of changing economy.

Privilege

Deaconship should be regarded by all who enter as an open door for Christian service rendered unto the Lord and the church. It must never be looked upon as a burden. As an act of appreciation for the confidence of his fellow members, the deacon should be regular in church attendance.

The deacon should acquaint himself with the local constitution and and acquire a general knowledge of current bylaw agreements and related precedents. He should always be willing to serve the church within this framework but should not be offended if awarded a sabbatical through a rotating system or by choice of the voting constituency.

The office must seek the man, not the man seek the office. Regard for this unwritten law has spared many men the frustrations found in roots of bitterness springing up from political intrigue. At any point of their service or the cessation of it, good deacons encourage support for present church leaders, promote unity, and build an atmosphere of optimism in the work of God.

Deaconship requires those exceptional individuals who refuse anything which may be contrary to scriptural precepts, but are equally unwilling to reject categorically everything that does not immediate-

ly conform to their own personal tastes. These must be godly men, subordinate to the pastor, subject to the people, yet sensitive to the will of God. They thus become true servants of Christ's kingdom on earth

The Living Bible paraphrases well the benefits and dividends of this ministry: "Those who do well as deacons will be well rewarded both by respect from others and also by developing their own confidence and bold trust in the Lord" (1 Timothy 3:13).

'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." John 1:1. But God sent His Son into the world, to give his life that we might each one accept salvation and have eternal life.
