OUR FAMILY LIFE!

1Sam. 1:20-22, 24-28; Psalm 84:2-3, 5-6, 9-10; 1John 3:1-2, 21-24, Luke 2:41-52

"Family is first and foremost the primary field where the seed of evangelization should be planted, therefore, married people have a special task of working for the building up of the People of God...Parents are the primary agents of evangelization and...have the responsibility and the right to give their children Christian education" Vat. II, GS, 52.

In today's second reading, St. John reminds us, "Beloved: See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. And so we are." We are indeed God's children, because like the old Christian maxim goes, "The family that prays together stays together!" The unity and the strength of a family will always be made manifest in their ability to pray and worship together as God's children. When a family prays together, it will have the strength to endure difficulties — the faith to bear with one another — the power to overcome temptation.

Today's families are challenged in so many ways. They are enticed and hypnotized by the materialistic world to spend money on unnecessary items - coerced by our technologically oriented society to spend time on video games, Internets, IPods, etc., rather than build a relationship with our fellow human beings. Many children spend time alone, rather than interact with other family members, even during major family gatherings. The nucleus family is broken! Parents are "too busy making ends meet," while on the other hand; children are "too busy expending the means." There is no time left for them to pray, eat, relax, play and/or to worship God together as a family. Sadly, there is breakdown of the traditional family and its values - filial respect for authority - exercised responsibly by parents – and a rise in a culture of youth violence. The culture that has deemphasized the importance of family values, has unintentionally, sadly, helped in shaking the moral fabric of our society. Many have lost faith in God and His Church, and even in the government. Many children may rightly feel their parents and society have let them down.

The challenges that families face today are not peculiar to our own time. even the Holy Family faced similar challenges, but the difference is that many of our family have "taken God out of the equation." On this feast of the Holy Family, and always, Christian Parents (and godparents) must remember it is the Christian marriage and the Christian family that build up the Church (and society). The vitality of the Church-as-Family can only be effective insofar as all Christian families become authentic "Domestic Churches." Hannah, in the first reading, made a promise to God, "Once the child (Samuel) is weaned, I will take him to appear before the Lord and to remain there forever; I will offer him..." She later made good on her promise. At Baptism, parents (and godparents) make a similar promise to the Lord, to raise their child in the Catholic faith and to teach them all that the Church teaches - to love God above all things and to love others as themselves. Thus, it is the primary duty of parents to devote time and energy to educating and instructing their child in the ways of the Lord. Like Hannah and Elkana, and like Mary and Joseph, they have the obligation to bring their child to the "Temple for the feast of the Passover" during Mass on Sundays and Holydays of Obligation - teach them good values direct them in the way of God. Every Christian parent should model Hannah and Mary in making good their promise to raise their child in a manner pleasing to God and beneficial to society. Parents must pray for themselves and for their child and must "rededicate" them and their entire family to the Lord. Our families must model that of Jesus, Mary and Joseph – a family of mutual respect, reverence, patience, joy, peace and love. May all our children, like Jesus, "advance in wisdom and age and favor before God and man."

YEAR OF FAITH



Time and time again we are reminded that the family is the backbone of any society. By the placement of the Feast of the Holy Family within the octave of Christmas the Church once again reminds us as well that the family is the strength of the Church through which its mission to lead all souls to Christ is fulfilled. The Second Vatican Council

teaches us about this reality in many of its documents. Especially noteworthy are the thoughts expressed by the Council Fathers in the Decree on the Apostolate of Lay People: "The mission of being the primary cell of society has been given to the family by God Himself. This mission will be accomplished if the family, by mutual affection of its members and by family prayer, presents itself as a domestic sanctuary of the Church; if the whole family takes its part in the Church's liturgical worship; if, finally it offers active hospitality, and practices justice and other good works for the benefit of its brothers suffering from want."

These words might remain pious platitudes unless as a community each family stands ready to put them into effect and witness to their truth in faith. There is an expression from Roman law that one cannot give what they do not have. Parents cannot give to their children a fruitful experience of spousal love and affection and ultimately parental love and affection unless they demonstrate it daily, especially when they might not be "feeling such." After a day of trial and tribulation it is especially important for the couple to give time to each other to vent and most importantly, to heal one Don't think that all Joseph's customers were delights or all of Mary's days were fulfilling. "Quality time" with the children is a much overused concept because many do not know what it means. To shop in the Mall is not necessarily quality time unless for example, it is an occasion for a parent to sit down with their child and discuss what is going on in their lives.

Of course, what is most important is the witnessing of Catholic values in the family. Sunday Mass should be a central event in everyone's life. A good practice might be to make sure it is followed by a leisurely breakfast during which the homily might be discussed and the points of the readings. The family gathered in prayer is certainly a good building block for the first church of a young family. There are many wonderful stories about biblical figures and saints which could be read in the evening. And it must be acknowledged that there are wonderful DVD's covering the same subjects. We have pictures of family members, what about adding some statues or pictures to the home décor reminding us of our origins and destiny. We must not forget apostolic works that can be done by families especially with their parishes: soup kitchens, midnight or breakfast runs, efforts for our domestic and foreign missions. The Holy Family has shown the way; let us follow them from here to eternity.

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
