

A Musical Performance by A Jug of Punch!

Named for an Irish drinking song made famous by the Clancy Brothers, *A Jug of Punch* is an Irish-American band composed of four friends from the local session scene. The group plays and sings from the rich repertoire of music that flourished in Ireland and developed as the Irish moved across the seas to North America during the 18th and 19th centuries. The band is composed of Steve Alcorn on button accordion, Cleve Sharp on flutes and vocals, Tom Tunney on mandolin and violin, and Scott Ware on guitar and vocals. For tonight's meeting, *A Jug of Punch* will be joined by special guest Suzanne Taichert on harp and vocals.

Acclaimed as "one of the great contemporary folk voices of Ireland," Tommy O'Sullivan, "stellar guitarist," has remained one of the hidden treasures of traditional Irish music for many years. He has toured throughout



North America and Europe, appearing at many major venues and festivals. Tommy has always kept an active recording schedule and has recorded three albums as a member of *Sliabh Notes* and a duet album with *Bothy Band* piper, Paddy Keenan.

Tommy's long overdue second solo album was recorded in 2006. Entitled "Song Ablaze," it is an ambitious project with songs that range from traditional Irish and traditional American music, to the works of contemporary writers, from both sides of the Atlantic. This album also features a supporting cast of internationally acclaimed musicians.

Saundra O'Sullivan is from Houston, Texas, with Native American roots. During high school and college she sang in many choirs and was a featured soloist. Upon leaving college, Saundra pursued a career in nursing, but she always maintained a high interest in music. Her interest in traditional Irish Music led her to attend an annual Irish music retreat in Midlothian, Texas in 2007 where she met Tommy. Encouraged by Tommy, Saundra has rekindled her singing. As they explored singing together, they discovered her alto harmonies to be a perfect match for his tenor lead vocals, adding a fertile texture to the overall sound. She has now become a very welcome addition to the vibrant local music scene in Dingle, Ireland, where Saundra and Tommy now live. (They own a pub in Dingle: http://www.osullivanscourthousepub.com/)

Twenty Irish Novels to Read Before You Die

- 11. Patrick McCabe "The Butcher Boy" (1992) Set in a small town in Ireland in the late 1950s, it tells the story of Francis "Francie" Brady, a schoolboy who retreats into a violent fantasy world as his troubled home life collapses.
- 12. James Plunkett "Strumpet City" (1969) A historical novel set in Dublin at the time of the Dublin Lock-out. The novel is an epic, tracing the lives of a dozen characters as they are swept up in the tumultuous events that affected Dublin between 1907 and 1914.
- 13. C. S. Lewis "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe" (1950) This is the first published book of *The Chronicles of Narnia* and is the best known book of the series. Although it was written and published first, it is second in the series' internal chronological order, after *The Magician's Nephew. Time* magazine included the novel in its TIME 100 Best English-language Novels from 1923 to 2005. It has also been published in 47 foreign languages.
- 14. <u>Edna O'Brien</u> "The Country Girls" (1960) This is the first novel written by Irish author Edna O'Brien. It was released in 1960, and later made into a movie. It tells the story of Kate and Baba, who have spent their childhood together. As they leave the safety of their convent school in search of life and love in the big city, they struggle to maintain their somewhat tumultuous relationship.
- 15. <u>Samuel Beckett</u> "Molloy" (1951) At first the book concerns two different characters, both of whom have interior monologues. As the story moves along, the two characters are distinguished by name only as their experiences and thoughts are, to say the least, similar. The novel is set in an indeterminate place, most often identified with the Ireland of Beckett's birth. It was written in Paris, along with the other two books (*Malone Dies* and *The Unnamable*) of "The Trilogy."
- 16. <u>Patrick Kavanagh</u> "Tarry Flynn" (1948) Set in 1930s rural Ireland, this book is based on Kavanagh's experience as a young farmer in Monaghan. The story describes the life of a young farmer poet and his quest for big fields, young women, and the meaning of life.
- 17. Brian Moore "Judith Hearne" (1955) An unflinching and deeply sympathetic portrait of a woman destroyed by self and circumstance. First published in 1955, it marked Brian Moore as a major figure in English literature and established him as an astute chronicler of the human soul.
- 18. Elizabeth Bowen "The Last September" (1929) This is Elizabeth Bowen's portrait of a young woman's coming of age in a brutalized time and place, where the ordinariness of life floats like music over the impending doom of history. In 1920, at their country home in County Cork, Sir Richard Naylor and his wife, Lady Myra, and their friends maintain a skeptical attitude toward the events going on around them, but behind the facade of tennis parties and army camp dances, all know that the end is approaching—the end of British rule in the south of Ireland and the demise of a way of life that had survived for centuries.
- 19. Lawrence Sterne "Tristram Shandy" (1760) "The Life and Opinions of Tristram Shandy, Gentleman" humorously chronicles the life of Tristram Shandy; this comic account is intertwined with his thoughts and philosophies regarding various issues. The novel is typographically very unusual in a style that is Sterne's own all the way.
- 20. <u>Jennifer Johnston</u> "How Many Miles to Babylon?" (1974) The story is the complex tale of a friendship between two boys in Wicklow, Ireland, prior to and during World War I. Alec, the son of Anglo-Irish parents grows up lonely and friendless on his parents' estate in Wicklow during the early years of the 20th century.


