





We are there in disasters, we feed the hungry and we bring Christ's compassion and love. And you support these amazing ministries through your stewardship!

Our around the world cruise has opened our eyes to the work done in Africa, Asia and Central America, even in places where Lutherans are few and far between. We help children in Guatemala who are forced to flee their homes because of violence and have no place to go. We are a presence in Egypt where no one ever heard of Lutherans. We are assisting people suffering from disasters in India. You are present around the world and you are sitting in your pew. This is just a part of what your offerings do.



Our around the world cruise has shown us that Lutherans are helping one person in 50 in the United States through our Lutheran Services in America agencies and facilities. In Northwestern Ohio we support Lutheran Social Services, Filling Home, Genacross Lutheran Services (senior living services and youth and family care) and other ministries. Every time you give an offering at First Lutheran, someone is being helped and loved in Christ. That's stewardship!



HAWAII doing as a congregation? Thank you for your generosity through your tithing, commitments and offerings in and through First Lutheran Church. In 2020, you contributed \$373,679. You gave \$8715 to Lutheran Social Services (Christmas and Easter), \$739 through the Noisy Offering to various organizations, and \$37,368 to the NWO Synod [Mission Share]. You contributed countless hours, gifts, and \$1872 to provide monthly Community Dinners...and much, much more. Now that's stewardship!



The chestnuts, oaks and maple – Leaves of every name." Leaves of the World published by Readers Digest. Some shorts everyone should read once include the following: "The Snows of Kilamanjaro" by Hemingway, anything by Guy de Maupassant and O'Henry, "The Lottery" by Shirley Jackson, "The Augsberg Chalk Circle" by Bertolt Brecht (highly reminiscent of Solomon's decision when two women claimed the same baby), "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty" by Thurber, and "The Bet" by Chekhov. These titles are all part of the Readers Digest collection. The book is on the library cart.

This weekend I read <u>Trust Me</u>, a collection of short stories by John Updike. After my disappointment in Updike's <u>The Witches of Eastwick</u>, a friend loaned me the short story book. Much better reading. His descriptions are very precise. Characters are everyday people with the usual fears and frustrations. They share their thoughts completely with the reader.

And now let's talk through <u>How Can I Help?</u> by Ram Dasse and Paul Gorman; you remember, this is the book my step-son gave me for Christmas saying it changed his way of thinking and knew I would want to read it. Its basic premise is very simple: we can have no idea how common courtesies, thoughtful gestures, or the simplest moments of human affirmation affect another human being.

Why waste time wondering what we have to offer anyone under any circumstances for if we do so, we are really questioning our self-worth. Instead, our helping others should be based in Mother Teresa's philosophy that those we are helping are, just like us, children of God. Our service to others, then, is less a function of personal motive and more an expression of spontaneous appropriate CARING for one who is a reflection of God.

Sounds, simple and logical, eh? Unfortunately, our mind reacts to suffering of others with denial, abstraction, pity, professional warmth, and compulsive hyperactivity; these reactions attempt to restrict the <u>natural</u> compassion of the heart. We tend to reach out, pull back, pitting love and fear against each other. So, first, we must have compassion for ourselves. Then we look at the reality of what is in front of us and be guided by our open heart. Ask God to give us the clues to what we must do and then do so.

Finally, our immediate responsibility in service is to do what we can to alleviate the concrete conditions of human affliction. Food, shelter, health care, protection, schooling, freedom. Then, and only then, help the other to rethink his/her situation to suffer less. While listening, be careful not to slip into your own consciousness. REALLY LISTEN. STOP JUDGING. You have helped the other person realize he/she is no longer alone, and reminded that he she is not forgotten.

Learn to trust a little more – both ourselves and the process. We have much more to offer than we may realize. All we have to do is ask "How can I help?" with an open heart, and then really listen.

Oh my, so much to share and I have run out of space AGAIN. Well, until next time. Enjoy this month's celebration of our church's 175 years. Our church has quite a history. Be a part of it.


