First Reading: Jeremiah 31:7-14

God promises to bring Israel back to its land from the most remote parts of exile. In Zion Israel will rejoice over God's gifts of food and livestock. Young women will express their joy in dancing; God will give gladness instead of sorrow.

⁷Thus says the LORD: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, "Save, O LORD, your people, the remnant of Israel."

⁸See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labor, together; a great company, they shall return here. ⁹With weeping they shall come, and with consolations I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn. ¹⁰Hear the word of the LORD, O nations, and declare it in the coastlands far away; say, "He who scattered Israel will gather him, and will keep him as a shepherd a flock." ¹¹For the LORD has ransomed Jacob, and has redeemed him from hands too strong for him. ¹²They shall come and sing aloud on the height of Zion, and they shall be radiant over the goodness of the LORD, over the grain, the wine, and the oil, and over the young of the flock and the herd; their life shall become like a watered garden, and they shall never languish again. ¹³Then shall the young women rejoice in the dance, and the young men and the old shall be merry. I will turn their mourning into joy, I will comfort them, and give them gladness for sorrow. ¹⁴I will give the priests their fill of fatness, and my people shall be satisfied with my bounty, says the LORD.

Psalm 147:12-20

Second Reading: Ephesians 1:3-14

In Jesus, all of God's plans and purposes have been made know as heaven and earth are united in Christ. Through Jesus, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. ⁵He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, ⁶to the

¹²Worship the LORD, O Jerusalem; praise your God, O Zion,

¹³who has strengthened the bars of your gates and has blessed your children within you.

¹⁴God has established peace on your borders and satisfies you with the finest wheat.

¹⁵God sends out a command to the earth, a word that runs very swiftly.

¹⁶God gives snow like wool, scattering frost like ashes.

¹⁷God scatters hail like bread crumbs. Who can stand against God's cold?

¹⁸The LORD sends forth the word and melts them; the wind blows, and the waters flow.

¹⁹God declares the word to Jacob, statutes and judgments to Israel.

²⁰The LORD has not done so to any other nation; they do not know God's judgments. Hallelujah!

praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace ⁸that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight ⁹he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. ¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

The Holy Gospel according to John 1:[1-9] 10-18 Glory to you O Lord

John begins his gospel with this prologue: a hymn to the Word through whom all things were created. This Word became flesh and brought grace and truth to the world.

[¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ¹in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. ¹There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ³He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ³He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ¹The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.]

¹⁰He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹²But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵(John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.'") ¹⁶From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known. The word of the Lord.......

Praise to you O Christ

Sermon

Last Friday a New Year began for us, full of promise and hope and life. Of all the words in the bible the words of John's prologue are definitely some of my favorites: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being." I think that I like these words so much because they echo the words of Genesis 1: "In the beginning God created..." In Genesis, God speaks, and creation happens.

God speaks and creation happens, the spoken "Word of God" does the work of forming everything. The spoken "Word of God" was God. "And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." John says: God's Word became human in Jesus...from the very beginning...

Words matter. I was taught to think before I begin to speak. This was instilled in me as a child and affirmed in my former career. This is difficult thing to do and I do make mistakes, however it is a good practice to think before speaking and I do tend to weigh my words before a meeting, a phone call or a written note.

I never understood the old childhood chant "sticks and stones may break your bones but words will never hurt you." Words and insults do hurt. In our culture, words are cheap and many people do not think before they speak. Hate speech is a real thing and the media platforms all knows how influential it is. Words can hurt and words..... can also heal. God's Word creates and heals.

When most of us think of "God's Word" or hear the phrase "Word of God" we think of the written scripture. The printed Word of God called the bible which was made for us from the accounts of thousands of people who held a deep faith in God and passed down history, wisdom and stories to reveal God in different ways. The bible is inspired by God and reveals Jesus to us. John speaks to us, but not about the words of the bible that isn't yet written or printed. John tells us that the "Word of God" is all that is created.

I heard a prayer once that I say very often before falling asleep and when I wake up in the morning "Thank you Lord for all that was, all that is and all that ever will be". This prayer makes me feel connected to creation and the "Word of God" the creator.

I come to you today in written word and/or on this computer in a visual way. We would all much rather be in the sanctuary of St. Mark's hearing and meditating on today's words. And as true as that is, John's gospel reminds us that the "Word of God" is far beyond any church sanctuary or gathering. The "Word of God" is in all that is created. It is in the light of the snow

under a grey sky during this time of year. The "Word of God" is in the phone calls we make to share care and love for each other. The "Word of God" most certainly is in a child born in Bethlehem who is hope for the world.

In other gospel accounts Matthew traces the genealogy of Jesus back to Abraham. Luke goes all the way back to Adam. But John traces Jesus' origin all the way back to the spoken "Word of God" in the beginning. "What has come into being in him—the Word, this spoken creating Word of God—was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." Throughout the Gospel of John, Jesus identifies himself with these words: "I am the light... I am the life" Jesus is the Word and the Word walked, and continues to walk among us.

This is the final Sunday of the Christmas season. Soon I will put away my nativity set. As I do, I will reflect on a poem that reflects on John's prologue and helps us to transition from Christmas back into the New Year and the days ahead:

"The Work of Christmas" by Howard Thurman

When the song of the angels is stilled,
when the star in the sky is gone,
when the kings and princes are home,
when the shepherds are back with their flocks,
the work of Christmas begins:
to find the lost,
to heal the broken,
to feed the hungry,
to release the prisoner,
to rebuild the nations,
to bring peace among the people,
to make music in the heart.

Amen.

By the leading of a star he was shown forth to all nations; in the waters of the Jordan you proclaimed him your beloved Son; and in the miracle of water turned to wine he revealed your glory.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me. Blessing

Almighty God, who sent the Holy Spirit to Mary, proclaimed joy through the angels, sent the shepherds with good news, and led the magi by a star, bless you this day + through the Word made flesh. **Amen.**

Dismissal

Go in peace. Share the gift of Jesus. Thanks be to God.
