the living." The Buddy Poppy – a small red flower symbolic of the bloodshed in World War I by millions of Allied soldiers in defense of freedom – was originally sold to provide relief for the people of war-devastated France. Later, its sale directly benefited thousands of disabled and down-and-out American veterans.

The poppy program actually got its start on the other side of the Atlantic Ocean. Shortly after World War I, Madame E. Guerin, founder of the American and French Children's League, became concerned that the free world was "forgetting too soon those sleeping in Flanders Fields."

Inspired by Colonel John McCrae's poem, "In Flanders Field," which spoke of poppies growing in an Allied graveyard "between the crosses, row on row," Guerin decided on the poppy as the most appropriate memorial flower.

As we continue the tradition of selling the Buddy Poppies, we also have the responsibility to educate the public. The sale of the poppy is a way to remember and honor the fallen, who for our country paid the ultimate sacrifice.

- Before the Civil War ended, women's groups decorated the graves of soldiers who passed away.
- From 1868 to 1970, Memorial Day was celebrated on May 30 regardless of the day of the week. Since 1971, it's been observed on the last Monday of May.
- Memorial Day observes those who died while serving the U.S. Armed Forces while Veterans Day honors any veteran who served or is currently serving.
- Newly freed slaves in Charleston, South Carolina held one of the first Memorial Day celebrations. On May 1, 1865, freed slaves gathered with member of the U.S. Colored Troops to bury and honor fallen Union soldiers.
