# Amana Church Receives National Fund Grant for Sacred Places

Tuesday the Amana Church Society Amana Colonies was awarded a grant from The National Fund for Sacred Places, a program of Partners for Sacred Places in collaboration with the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

The Amana Church was one of 15 faith communities across the country to receive a generous grant. The grant of \$70,000 toward the total project cost will be used for rehabilitation of the historical Amana Church in the village of Amana and the small Kinderschule building east of the Middle Amana Church in Middle Amana.

A fund drive has begun by the Amana Church to match those grant dollars and carry through on rehabilitation projects at both sites.

The Amana Church welcomes this grant both because it provides dollars for the preservation and rehabilitation of two of its buildings and because it provides technical assistance and training that will be invaluable as the church broadens its community outreach.

Alex Momany, President, Amana Church Board of Trustees, said of the award, "We are exceedingly grateful for this incredible opportunity and are blessed not only by this grant, but all the more, by our inspiring membership who has made all of this possible in God." He acknowledged, thanking the church's building committee, the volunteers who wrote the grant proposal and donors.

The project will begin with a complete assessment of the condition of both buildings leading to the creation of plans for all phases of the restoration work.

It will include the construction of a new handicapped ramp at the Amana Church, replacement of 28 windows in the church, repairs to wooden window frames, the removal of the 1950's era asbestos siding on the east and west annexes of the Amana Church, the construction of accessibility ramps on both the east and west annexes and the repair and replacement of soffit, facia and gutters on the south side of the church. The wood-frame Kinderschule building to the east of the Middle Amana Church will receive repairs and upgrades so that can it become the home of the Amana Colonies Food Pantry: this will include the installation of electrical wiring and an HVAC system, the repair/ replacement of four wooden window frames, sills, trim and sash and the installation of storm windows, plus the insulation of the exterior walls and the repair of the

soffit, fascia and gutters.

The Amana Colonies Food Pantry has outgrown its current location in the basement annex of the Middle Amana Church. By moving it to a larger place with easy access and separate entry, plus more room for freezers/ refrigerators, the free food pantry will be able to provide more fresh and frozen foods and offer a free space to the entire community for small social gatherings and youth club meetings. The Kinderschule, built during Amana's communal era as a preschool and daycare, is currently unoccupied.

The Amana Church, built in 1864, is the Amana Church's largest worship space. The Amana Church community meets here for special worship services, weddings, funerals, fellowship dinners and church events. It serves as home for the Amana Church's youth programs, Sunday School, summer vacation Bible camp serving all area youth, plus the weekly Monday free congregate dining programs and is used by various nonprofit groups.

"Organizations like the Amana Church Society have a true commitment to service, offer tremendous civic value to their community, and these congregations are well poised to grow and thrive in the future," said Bob Jaeger, President of Partners for Sacred Places. "We look forward to working with the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the Amana Church Society to restore their buildings, help preserve an important piece of history and support the expansion of their community offerings."





#### FALL TIPS TO ENSURE A HEALTHY GREEN YARD FOR SPRING ISU Extension and Outreach

As the leaves change, and colors of fall become more beautiful, it is also the ideal season to complete turfgrass maintenance practices. This is the most important time to focus on cultural practices of aeration, and fertilization. The work you do in the fall helps your lawn recover from summer stresses and prepares it for another lowa winter. The best ways to ensure a healthy lawn through the fall months and next spring is to start with the necessary steps.

# Thatch and Aerification

Thatch is an intermingled layer of living and dead plant material that accumulates above the soil surface. It bears a resemblance to a spongy peat moss layer. Thatch can be beneficial and problematic. Thatch supplies necessary food sources for microbes and organic matter. However, excessive thatch can harbor diseases and insects. When properly balanced, thatch promotes growth and appearance of a well-groomed lawn. Proper balance of thatch requires a combination of management practices. These include: preventing thatch buildup by reducing plant growth, adding only the necessary nitrogen fertilization, and mechanical removal of thatch when necessary. It is important to remember that tall fescue, fine fescue, and perennial ryegrass are other lawn species used in lowa that seldom develop thatch problems.

A core aerator punches hollow tines into the soil and removes small soil cores about the size of an index finger. Core aerating should not be looked upon as a method of removing large amounts of thatch. Rather, it is most effective as a means of preventing thatch from developing and reducing soil compaction. Homeowners who have lawns requiring high maintenance should have annual core aerating.

# Fertilization

The number of applications of fertilizer depends on the desires and expectations of the homeowner, soil type, cultural practices, and other factors. A single application of fertilizer in late-October or early-November containing 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet may be sufficient for low maintenance lawns. Highly maintained lawns may need additional fertilizer in the spring (0.5–0.75 pounds/N per 1,000 square feet), September (0.75–1 pounds/N per square feet), and late-October/early-November (0.75–1 pounds/N per 1,000 square feet).
